

Pillars of the Library

The three principal officers in a Lodge are represented by three columns representing Wisdom, Strength, and Beauty. These columns correspond with three orders of architecture revered by Masons. They are Doric, Ionic, and Corinthian. There should be Wisdom to contrive, Strength to support, and Beauty to adorn all important undertakings. With that in mind, I propose that we contrive a plan to support a fund to adorn that magnificent edifice we all own in Cedar Rapids, the Iowa Masonic Library and Museums.

My proposal is a three-year plan dedicated to raising money to perpetuate the upkeep of the Iowa Masonic Library and Museum Building. My goal is to raise \$500,000.00 a year for each of the next 3 years. I am asking 500 members of the Craft or Lodges as a whole to each donate \$1000.00 per year to the Iowa Masonic Library and Museums Building Endowment Fund. As a gift for your generous contribution, you will receive a column representing one of the original orders of architecture. The first year you will receive a Doric column followed by an Ionic and Corinthian. The Iowa Masonic Library and Museums Building Endowment Fund is a 501(c)(3) corporation so your gift is completely tax deductible.

I hope that you wish to participate in this program. We have a premier Library and Museum, but it requires a substantial amount of funding for upkeep and repair. All you need to do is send your check for \$1000.00 to the Grand Secretary's office designated to IMLMBEF. This program is purely voluntary, but think of the enormity of the situation. Don't let the lapse of time, the ruthless hand of ignorance, or just plain apathy let our Library "fall in utter ruin". Please give generously and help insure the future of our lowa Masonic heritage.

I was truly humbled when Most Worshipful Brother Charles D.Yates asked me to be his Chairman of the Committee on Division and Reference. I do not take the job lightly and will serve the Craft of Iowa with Fidelity. I thank the Brethren of this Grand Jurisdiction for putting their confidence in me by electing me to this High Station.

My theme this year is "Let's Try Masonry". It will focus on one main premise, "The Brotherhood of Man under the Fatherhood of God". We are all Brothers who "Meet on the Level, Act by the Plumb, and Part upon the Square". From the time we signed our petition, stood at the door of the Lodge to receive our first lesson, knelt in the center of the Lodge to pray, and took our obligations at the altar, we are taught that God should be in our thoughts and actions in all we do and say. The proposed amendment to raise the per capita from \$35.00 a year to \$50.00 a year passed 338

in favor, 63 opposed and 3 scattered.

The proposed restoration of the 50 year dues failed 183 in favor, 221 opposed and 5 scattered.

The proposed increase to raise the per capita from \$35.00 to \$40.00 was withdrawn.

The proposal to do away with One-Day Classes, be able to do business in all three degrees, return to the posting lecture failed 144 in favor, 262 opposed, 2 scattered.

The proposal to freeze 50 year membership dues failed by show of hands 0 in favor and all opposed. The proposal to Amend the Constitution to eliminate One-Day Classes was withdrawn. An invitation to meet in Cedar Rapids for the 172nd Annual Communication was accepted.

Grand lodge closed at 11:15 A.M.

Grand Treasurer William K. Paisley





Park It! Exhibit at Iowa Masonic Library and Museums By Bill Kreuger

On Monday March 21, 2016, the Iowa Masonic Library and Museums will open a new exhibit entitled "Park It!: the Amazing True Adventures of Wallace Winkie, Driving Instructor." This is a traveling exhibit that is making its way around the state of Iowa. It will be at the Iowa Masonic Library and Museums until the end of the year.



Wallace (Wink) Winkie was a driving instructor for the Belle Plaine School District from 1953-1982. After his death in 2013, many of his former students wrote down their memories and stories they remembered about him. Many of them were humorous and were often passed from person to person during his almost 30 year career at Belle Plaine Junior and Senior High School. Those memories were gathered into a book, entitled Park It! which was published in 2013. Additionally, many of the illustrations and stories from the book were used to create a traveling exhibit. The exhibit has most recently been at the lowa Transportation Museum in Grinnell and at the National Sprint Car Hall of Fame and Museum in Knoxville, lowa.

The inspiration for the book and exhibit came as a result of the 50th reunion of the Belle Plaine High School class of 1959. Classmates began collecting the stories they had heard and remembered over the years. These were presented to Mrs. Beverly Winkie so she could put them into a book. With the aid of family and volunteers from the community of Belle Plaine that helped to collect the stories from former students and

Farmers Lodge No.168 Courage Ride

The year 2015 marked the 10th Anniversary of the annual Courage Ride and Farmers Lodge No.168 has been involved almost from the start. This year Farmers Lodge again hosted the main lunch stop at North English, serving chicken and hamburgers, salads, watermelon, dessert and refreshments



to the nearly 400 riders who rode the long routes ranging from 59 miles to 110 miles through the Eastern lowa countryside. This year the Courage Ride raised over \$50,000 for the University of lowa Holden Comprehensive Cancer Center Sarcoma Research and Registry, and over \$300,000 to date. This is one of several volunteer philanthropy events the brothers of Farmers Lodge help organize each year, fundraising for another organization. Lodge members and families show up to work the day prior and day of the event and support the planning effort throughout the year.

Iowa Masonic Library and Museums Building Endowment Fund

The Iowa Masonic Library was started with the humble appropriation of five dollars from the Grand Lodge in 1845. The library grew without a home for 40 years, following the travels of Grand Secretary T. S. Parvin. Its first permanent home was a building constructed in Cedar Rapids in 1884. The library rapidly outgrew available space, requiring an annex to hold part of the collection. It became (and remains) one the premiere Masonic Libraries in the WORLD. Iowa Masons should be extremely proud of their accomplishment in creating this world renowned collection.

Recognizing the need for larger (and safer) accommodations, the Grand Lodge completed construction of a new building on the same site in 1955. The building, funded by a small appropriation attached to the dues of each Mason in the state, was built to compliment and visually enhance the magnificent collection of books and museum artifacts which it housed.

Having wisely funded the construction of a wonderful home for the library and museums, the Masons of 1955 then made a terrible mistake. Rather than continuing the small appropriation from dues to create a permanent fund to maintain the building, they chose to trust that membership growth in the fraternity would provide adequate future funding. That has clearly proven to be a very bad decision.


To rectify the resulting shortfall, and to relieve future demands on the Board of Trustees for funding repairs and improvements, the Grand Lodge created the Iowa Masonic Library and Museums Building Endowment Fund (IMLMBEF) in 1993 and appointed a Board of Directors to raise and administer the fund in support of the portion of the building which housed the library and museums. This fund was incorporated as a 501(c) 3 corporation in 1999. The fund's status as a charitable corporation was confirmed by the IRS in 2003.

Initially, the Board of Directors estimated that a fund balance of one million dollars would be adequate to meet funding needs for the future. Had the fund actually attained that balance within a couple years that would have been true. Investment gains would have increased the fund faster than inflation, while investment income would have been available for building repair and improvement. However, the one million dollar goal was not achieved at that time. Through prudent investment (and some small donations), the fund has now reached a balance of more than six hundred thousand dollars. However, this is now 2014. The one million dollar goal in 1999 correlates to approximately three million dollars today. That means the fund is more than two million dollars short of a sustainable balance which could provide significant support for the building. For example, a fund of that size could have paid for the new handicap access ramp for the building out of a single year's earnings. However, since the fund is too small to support that, the Grand Master and his Lady were forced to appeal to donations from the craft.

So... thus begins our appeal to you, the Masons of Iowa, for support. The new board of directors has elected to put an emphasis on fund raising for the next several years to attempt to gain that three million dollar balance. Only YOUR support can make that happen. Do not neglect the fund raising efforts of the Grand Master. Those are certainly worthy causes. But if you can, make a donation to the IMLMBEF. The simplest way to do that is to make a donation along with your dues payment. Your dues notice has a place to note donations. Just write IMLMBEF in the blank, and add your donation. Our Most Valuable Asset: Friendship

Freemasonry has many facets which have attracted men of good will of every race, religion, political view, and social position into its ranks throughout the world for many years. Every member has his own individual reason for joining the Craft, but generally its chief appeal is the philosophy of life taught by the Craft with its visible exhibition by Freemasons in their exemplary conduct in the everyday world. All these items are important, but to the nonmember who has given this matter any thought whatsoever it soon becomes apparent that the greatest asset in Freemasonry is the spirit of friendship that exists between Freemasons in their relationship with one another and their attitude of thoughtfulness for the welfare of others. For example, many years ago the words "Mason" and "friendship" were often used synonymously.

Our historical background supports this view. Dr. James Anderson in his Constitutions of the Free Masons, published in 1723, reflected the traditional fundamental principles of the Craft when he stated in the first Charge that "Masonry becomes the Center of Union and the Means of conciliating true friendship among persons that must have remain'd at a perpetual Distance." And in the 1738 edition of the same book, the wording was changed slightly but the meaning was the same when he stated "Thus Masonry is the Center of their Union and the happy Means of conciliating Persons that otherwise must have remain'd at a perpetual Distance." This idea was not new with Anderson since the idea of friendship prevailed in the Ancient Manuscripts which required the members to address themselves as "brothers," attend to their religious duties, respect other members of the Craft, and that all lodge members be considerate of each other both inside and outside the Craft. There were also provisions that members help each other in finding employment or giving work to members seeking employment or to give them money to enable them to travel to the next place where employment might be available. Furthermore, when the Grand Lodge was formed in 1717, in London, the leaders adopted a non-sectarian rule and also prohibited the discussion of political matters in the lodge. These new rules were intended to eliminate friction and disharmony among the members and further promoted the idea of friendship. Requiring a belief in God, teaching that all men are brothers, and that we should always be kind and charitable towards others has created an atmosphere of harmony among the members and has promoted the development of warm and enduring friendships between the members of the Craft. It has also encouraged our members to be good neighbors, good citizens, and to be loyal to established government.

There are many definitions of the word "friend." It means one who is in a warm personal relationship with another person. It means a person who is ready to assist you in your plans. Many years ago an English periodical had a contest and offered a prize to the person submitting the best definition of the word "friend." Here are a few of the definitions which were sent to the publication:

"One who multiplies joys, divides grief, and whose honesty is inviolable."

"One who understands our silence."

"A watch which beats true and for all time and never runs down."

And here is the definition that won first prize: "A friend is the one who comes in when the whole world has gone out."

Many years ago, my father stated to me that the most valuable thing anyone can have is to have a friend. But then he added that in order to have a friend, you must be a friend. On other occasions he would say that a friend is worth more than a thousand ducats. You will note that the idea is in the nature of a two-way street. Freemasonry with its emphasis on the obligations we owe to others exemplifies this idea of the value of friendship in the strongest way possible.

The true value of friends cannot be underestimated. There is nothing worse than being alone or having the feeling that there is no one around that you can rely on for help or companionship. Nothing can be more depressing then the feeling that there is no one that cares about your welfare. On the positive side, the mere fact that one knows that he has friends is a comforting feeling. So that the possession of friends is an absolute necessity in life in order to be happy.

The member who becomes active in his Masonic lodge and engages in its work by necessity will be in contact constantly with other members who are also similarly engaged. Taking part in meaningful and worthwhile projects with other good men creates a comaraderie between them which blossoms forth into intangible and unexpressed respect by one person for another. Because of these projects, Freemasonry offers unlimited opportunity for the creation of warm and close friendships among its members. The Mason who does not regularly attend lodge meetings and also engages in some work for the lodge and its members misses one of the valuable assets which the lodge has to offer its

members. The opportunity to make friends.

Another element which contributes to this development of close friendships within the Craft, is the philosophy that Masons are taught to be charitable and that this word is to be construed in its broadest sense. To the Mason it means more than just giving alms; it means more than writing a check for a worthy cause. It means that you will go that extra mile to help another person in need of help beyond any call of duty. It means that you will listen to a Brother's troubles as he seeks to unburden himelf of his feeling or desire to talk things over with someone. It means to sympathize with a person who is in pain or in trouble and thereby help him to lighten the burden. The lesson of the faithful breast and the listening ear are always before us.

When a Mason meets another Mason for the first time, he knows that the other person believes in God, that he therefore believes that all men are brothers, and that as a result he must be kind to other persons and help them in every possible way. Such knowledge is bound to bring the two persons closer together for they instinctively realize that they have many beliefs in common. You know without any express statement that a spiritual tie exists between Masons because you can expect honorable conduct from the new contact.

For one who travels extensively, Masonic friendship manifests itself time and again. Whether it is visiting a Masonic lodge or attending a meeting of an appendant body, or in the market place, when you meet another Mason you always feel a kinship with him. You always find the door open with a welcome sign. This can be valuable if you are in a strange place. It becomes doubly valuable if you are in need of suggestions, advice or help of some kind. You not only have a comfortable feeling because you know help is near, but there is also a feeling of trust and faith that is so valuable in all human relationships. Non-Masons often have observed that there exists between Masons an elusive something that creates a spirit of friendly relations between Masons. It is to be noted that strangers who meet and discover that both are members of the Craft immediately feel a kinship with each other. Masons recognize this mutual feeling and describe it as the "tie that binds" but this general description mystifies and intrigues non-members. He notes the friendly feeling that exists between the members though they may have just met, but he does not realize that when Masons meet for the first time they instinctively feel a close relationship because of the unique teaching methods used in the conferring of the three degrees, whereby certain obligations are assumed which bind Masons to a high moral code which makes them better men on the spiritual and moral level.

This valuable asset of Freemasonry too often is so obscured that few of our members are aware of it. We should call this to their attention. Having a large number of friends will make a person happier, a better person, and happy persons help make this a better place in which to live. This elusive element of Freemasonry is the most valuable asset that each of us has as a member of the Craft and it is also one of the most valuable assets of Freemasonry as an organization.
