

There were almost 150 attendees at the three Certified Mentor training sessions. Attendance and attention were very good in all classes. Each attendee took home with them a CD that included all the non-proprietary sessions and PDF copies of the Mentor and Student guides to be used to train mentors in the program. We have only a few requests for access into the system. There are also many who have not accessed the OMC even once. If this is due to faulty login codes we need to know you are having trouble. This may be because you are accessing using a different e-mail address you used on your initial request. We have had several inquiries as to the status of lapel pins and completion certificates. The company we contracted with to manufacture the lapel pins gave us the best deal concerning pin design and price. This is necessary because we do not have mailing addresses for each of you.

Over the next few months we will update the OMC site with a new course that covers the Certified Mentor training. Each of you will be given access to the course material. We will also create a list of Certified Mentors using the same district layout as the Board of Custodians uses. We will post your name, Lodge name and number and e-mail address. The Creigh Notebook; Iowa's Hand-written Copy of the Francken Manuscript by Bill Kreuger, Assistant Librarian

As the Assistant Librarian for the Iowa Masonic Library, I get many requests for information in regard to the history of Masonry or items in our collection that are related to that history. A recent request from a colleague has led to a most fascinating discovery. We here in Iowa have the next best thing to an original copy of the Francken Manuscript. We have a copy of one of the original Francken manuscripts that was made from an existing copy purchased from D. Broughton of Belfast, Ireland by Enoch T. Carson. A description of this manuscript is found on page 506 of the London Freemasons Magazine for 1855 under the title "A Curious Book."

According to S. Brent Morris, "the Francken Manuscripts contain the earliest English versions of 21 degrees from 4th, 'Secret Master,' to 25th, 'The Royal Secret or Knights of St. Andrews.' Several manuscripts of the degrees were written by Francken. Working with Stephen Morin, who had received a patent from the Grand Lodge of France, Francken wrote a manuscript giving the rituals for the 15th through 25th degrees in 1771. Francken wrote at least two other manuscripts, one in 1783 and another about 1786. These last two manuscripts included all the degrees from the 4th to the 25th.

The request that started this interesting journey follows:

Hi Bill.

Long time no speak! I hope all's well with you. I have a question for you that may be related to your collections.

In the January 1950 issue of the Iowa Masonic Library Bulletin, on pages 396-7, there's an article by Ward K. St. Clair, titled "The Francken Rituals." The first two paragraphs describe a notebook written by Alfred Creigh (1810-1889) which apparently contains the text of the Francken MS. The second paragraph notes that he was copying from the Francken MS which was, at that time, owned by Enoch Terry Carson - which we know is the 1783 Francken MS which is now in our collection. I am writing something about the various copies of the 1783 Francken MS that have been created over the years and I am quite curious about this one.

Is there any chance that this Creigh notebook is in your collection?

I knew that we had some manuscripts or notebooks in our ritual collection in the Rare Book Vault that had either been written by Creigh, or copied by him. I found the following items listed in our Ritual index:

- "Creigh, Alfred and Sheville, John

S.E.M. degree manuscript sheets (from Creigh) which are a copy of the ritual. Authorization from Creigh to Iowa men to confer same (Langridge, Guilbert, Woodward) dated 1860 or 1866."

- "Knights Templar. 1851. Manuscript (Alfred Creigh). Notebook containing copies of letters and other documents in addition to rituals..."

- "Tuilleur, compiled by Alfred Creigh from various sources, March 28, 1859. Vol. 1."

- "Tuilleur, compiled by Alfred Creigh from various sources. April 21, 1865, Vol. 2."

- Tuilleur compiled by Alfred Creigh from England and Canada Vol. 3 April 21, 1865."

- "Manuscript book, prepared by Alfred Creigh containing Statutes and Regulations and the Rituals of the 4th to 25th Degrees of the Rite of Perfection as taught by H.A. Franchen 1783."

I wasn't sure if the last book on this list was the one that Jeff was interested in. In looking through it, it is a hardbound book, approximately 28 cm. in height, with lined and numbered pages on the inside. The outside cover and fore edge of the book are marbled. There is no title on the spine. The first two pages of the book (not numbered) are like a scrapbook where calling cards and notices have been pasted in; the earliest date for these items is 1851. The handwriting starts on p.1 – almost like a title page of a printed book, which reads as follows: "Constitutions of the Grand Chapter of the Princes of the Royal Secret with Laws for the Government of Lodges of Perfection, transmitted from the Royal Council at Berlin to Stephen Morin under the C.C. near the B.B. 25th of the 7 month 1762, also the ceremony of

(listing of degrees 4th -25th) to which is added the home of Submission – home of obligation for an Israelite – the History of the MSS book, from which is transcribed with remarks upon the Word. Carefully transcribed by Alfred Creigh LLD 33. Harrisburg, Penna Feb. 4, 1866." On page 286 is a letter from E.T. Carson of Cincinnati to Alfred Creigh, dated January 8, 1866 indicating how he (Creigh) received the copy for transcription.

It turns out that this was the notebook that Jeff was looking for. Over the next few days, Jeff and I remained in contact about this manuscript. Jeff was interested in knowing whether any drawings were in the notebook. There were several, two were done on something like an onion skin paper – thin and translucent. These two drawings were tipped into the book after being copied by Creigh.

Two other drawings in the book were of the "Mysterious Ladder" and an Encampment, which seems to be a series of geometric figures with flags attached at different locations. One more drawing that is tipped into the inside back cover of the book is labeled "Table of Shew Bread."

All of these drawings are present in the original Francken manuscript that is owned by the Scottish Rite Masonic Museum and Library in Lexington, Mass. Jeff thinks that Creigh must have used the onion skin papers to trace the original drawings in the manuscript. The other drawings are drawn on pages of Creigh's notebook and seem to be carefully done copies of those in the Francken manuscript.

Jeff will be writing an article about the various copies of the 1783 manuscript, as indicated in his original inquiry. The item in our collection will be included in that piece. I am always happy to help out and especially so when the inquiry leads me to find out more about our wonderful collection here in lowa.

"Study Club"

A Study Club is an organized group which studies Masonry in the same manner that a seminar class in college studies a subject, or a men's Bible class in church studies the Bible. It has (usually) a president, a secretary-treasurer, and a director; follows a course of study; listens to papers or talks on each particular subject in the course, discusses, asks questions. The expenses, which usually are small, are prorated among the members.

"Lodge of Sorrow"

For nearly two centuries lodges here and there across America have held once a year (usually on a Sunday afternoon) a ceremonious occasion called a Lodge of Sorrow. It is held in memory of the lodge's members who have died during the year. A ritual is used; lodge officers, speakers, and musicians keep themselves in the background as much as possible; at the forefront of attention is the memory of those who have gone on to the Grand Lodge Above. A number of rituals are available, some of them very old.

"Cowan"

Cowan is Old Scotch for Mason without the word. Cowan appears in print as early in 1598. It represented an ignorant Mason who put stones together without mortar, or piled rough stones from the field into a wall without working them square and true. Universally, it is used in English-speaking Grand Lodges as the name of one who cannot be admitted to a lodge.

"Warden"

The Name, "Warden," is derived from the Saxon word, "weard," meaning warder or guard. The "gu," instead of "w," comes from the Norman French, where the "gu," sound usually replaces the English "w."

In the lodge at York Minster in the 1300s, there were two principal officers, principal and secondary masons, who were responsible for notifying the building owner of any defects in the work and of any absences, which needed deductions from wages.

The agreement between the lodge and the Dean and Chapter refers to them as Masters of the masons. In 1370, the Chapter records show a mason had to be approved by the common assent of the Master and Wardens of the work and by the Master Masons before he could be employed. During the 1400s, there are regular references to a Warden or Wardens of the lodge.

Other records show that, by the 1500s, there were two Wardens and that they were supervisors of the work. In some places, there appear to have been wardens for each of the three classes of masons – those who prepared stones, the setters who put them in place, and the roughlayers who were responsible for the rubble filling the walls.

It was not uncommon for the Warden to be promoted to Master to fill a vacancy.

In English practice, the Master appoints Wardens. In Scotland, New Zealand and most American jurisdictions, the Wardens are elected.

"Speculative"

Speculative is something theoretical, and the opposite of practical. Speculative Masonry began with the practice of admitting men to membership in operative lodges who were not practical builders, stonecutters, architects, etc., but who were interested in the moral, ethical, and philosophical teachings of the Fraternity.

"Fraternity"

A fraternity is any society in which the members act toward each other in a brotherly way, are brotherlike, comprise a brotherhood. Freemasonry has been a fraternity from its beginning.

"Hele"

The word is pronounced to rhyme with hail. It comes from the Anglo-Saxon word helan, meaning to cover; to conceal.

With the title of Past Master you are accorded the accolade of "Worshipful," indicating that you are an honored and respected Brother. It is a reputation which you must continually strive to uphold.

"Worshipful"

It is from the Anglo-Saxon words *weorthe* meaning worth, and *scipe* meaning ship. Hence, it is a state of worthiness entitled to respect. This is a term of respect for the Master of a lodge.

"Order of the Garter"

Edward III of England founded the Order of the Garter in 1349 for himself and twenty-five Knights of the Garter.
