#### Chapter 15

Resolutions and Interpretations
Section 3. Decisions and Opinions of the Grand Master

- a. Defined. A "decision" must arise on a controverted point or question to which there are parties having conflicting interests with the right to seek a review in the Grand Lodge. Other rulings of the Grand Master are "Opinions."
- b. Opinions. Opinions are either "official" or "unofficial."
  - 1. Official Opinions. The Master of a lodge may inquire of the Grand Master as to law for the government of his lodge in a particular case. An Opinion of the Grand Master in rely thereto is "Official."
  - 2. Unofficial Opinions. Answers by the Grand Master to letters from other members of a lodge giving his opinion as to law or fact are "unofficial."

#### CHAPTER 10 VACANCIES IN OFFICE

- An office in a subordinate lodge shall become vacant when the incumbent resigns or ceases to be a member of the lodge in which he holds office.
- Section 1. RESIGNATION OF OFFICERS. In a subordinate lodge a resignation by an officer if made in open lodge may be oral; otherwise it shall be in writing, deposited with the Secretary at a stated communication of the lodge, and shall at once take effect. When one of the three principal officers shall resign, or his office becomes vacant, a successor shall be chosen before another principal officer may resign.
- Section 2. ELECTIVE OFFICERS. Whenever a vacancy occurs in an elective office in a subordinate lodge, the Master shall order an election to fill such vacancy and also any other vacancy that may result from such election. Such order must be made at a stated communication of the lodge, and the election shall be held at the next stated communication thereafter. The Grand Master may vary this rule in special cases at his discretion. If authority is granted to hold such election at a special communication, the dispensation therefore shall require that every member of the lodge shall be notified in writing not less than five days prior to such communication.
- Section 4. INSTALLATION OF OFFICERS. Officers elected or appointed to fill vacancies must be installed as soon as practicable thereafter. The Master of each lodge shall have full authority to install such officers of his lodge without a special dispensation, it is my "Official Opinion" that Chapter 10, Section 1 and Chapter 10, Section 2, make no allowance for an Elective Officer to return to his office, displacing the properly elected and successor, after a properly submitted resignation by said Elective Officer.

As a result we allow men with backgrounds unbecoming a good Mason. I therefore recommend, the Grand Lodge of lowa require each new petitioner to supply with his petition a criminal background check. In this way a Lodge will have a more accurate picture of a petitioner's history which would not normally be available to the Lodge.

### REPORT OF THE GRAND SECRETARY AND GRAND LIBRARIAN

William R. Crawford presented his report as Grand Secretary and Grand Librarian.

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

I invite you to review to the Report of the Grand Secretary and Librarian found beginning on Page 29 of your Book of Preliminary Reports.

There is a pair of items that I would like to share with you.

First, last month while attending the Grand Chapter/Grand Council banquet at Ames, a brother came to our table during the program and wanted to know if I had a petition on me. Of course, I had a pocket petition along with a 10 Reasons card that I gave him. After the program was over the brother came to report that someone had completed a petition and that it will be with Arcadia Lodge No. 249 in Ames.

Brothers, there are good men out there that would like to become Masons. They don't always know how. One of the tools is to carry a pocket petition with you most of the time. Let me ask, "How many of you are carrying one?" Let's see a show of hands. If you need a supply, please go to the Lodge Service Committee table in Room 23 and get some. Be prepared!

The other item is to thank a group of brothers from around the state. I don't know all of your names so won't try to list any. These are the brothers that are sharing information about degree work, activities, etc. through e-mails or other social media, not just with the lodge, but with brothers from neighboring and area lodges. We are seeing that almost without exception, they are helping their own lodge AND helping the other lodges. Be sure and tell these brothers thank you and that their efforts are very much appreciated.

Thank you.

It was a shock on April 30 to receive an e-mail from the Chairman of the Trustees stating: "The Trustees of the Grand Lodge of lowa have decided to submit the name of Thomas P. Youngblut of Jesup to be placed on the ballot at the 2012 Grand Lodge Annual Communication for the position of Grand Secretary." This came out of the blue and like a lightening bolt, and was disappointing to say the least. A big thank you goes to all who have shown support since that time.

Like Dickens wrote in "A Tale of Two Cities" it has been the best of times and it has been the worst of times when looking at the lodges that constitute lowa Masonry. There is a long list of lodges that are doing well and very well. At the same time, five lodges have closed through consolidation and at least one more is in the process. The future for a few

more is questionable. The good news is that two new lodges have been Instituted this spring. They are Woodrow Morris Lodge U.D. and Albert Pike Lodge U.D. located in North Liberty and Cedar Rapids respectively. If someone has interest in forming a new lodge, please contact the Grand Secretary's Office for information and assistance.

Many lodges are having degree work, some with a lot of petitions to work their way through, and yet there is a shortage of brothers who can or are able to assist in degree conferrals. There is a need for brothers to learn parts in the ritual, and a need for brothers to be willing to help teach those who want to learn parts. There is an on-going need for brothers to become Masonic Instructors to replace those brothers who have passed away. There is a need for brothers that are willing to befriend neighboring lodges that are struggling. A friend can make all the difference in fanning the spark of Masonry.

There are several brothers across the state making positive differences with their willingness to communicate with area brothers informing them of meetings, degree work, and activities. These e-mails are helping all of the lodges in those areas. They have led to more brothers meeting, traveling, and assisting one another. Thank you for your efforts. They are appreciated.

The Grand Secretary's Office continues to receive e-mails and contacts from men who are interested in seeking Masonic Light. Thanks to the local brothers that are willing to follow up with these leads.

Iowa Masonry is a bottom up organization with the Craft having the power to control our future. Lodges have a variety of personalities, which leads to strength from sharing ideas and programs. It is a true strength that brothers are willing to bring forth and share ideas.

Possibly because of the deadline date change last year, there has been a spike in the number of suspensions for non-payment of dues. Brothers, it often does take personal contact to keep a brother as a member of the Fraternity. If a lodge does not give its members a sense of "what am I missing if I am not there" it is more likely to lose members. What "it" is varies from lodge to lodge, but is needed for a successful lodge.

I attended the North American Conference of Grand Secretaries at Atlanta, Georgia in February, and was Chaplain. I have been honored by being again elected as the Chaplain for the 2013 Conference at Kansas City. The Conference is an educational conference for the Grand Secretaries and I found the most valuable program this year was information on the I.R.S. and its reporting requirements.

The Library and Museums and Administrative Office are very fortunate to have volunteers who assist with a variety of projects. We lost a good brother, friend, and dedicated volunteer when Brother Norman Hammond passed away on January 10. Florence Jacobs and Connie Shears continue to help with a variety of projects. Janet Zahrt helps in the Library

organizing collections. Thanks to Paul Nielsen, Steve Nielsen, and Dennis Zahrt, P.G.M., for their work in restoring items. The work of these and the other volunteers is very much appreciated.

Grand Master Jerry L. Levay has a dual connected theme of "Masonry in the Military" and "Supporting those who Serve," reminding us of the connection between Masonry and the military that goes back to before the American Revolution. His effort to assist wounded soldiers has been well received and will help veterans who have suffered severe injuries while serving our country.

Iowa Masons are fortunate to have a dedicated and hard-working staff. No other Grand Lodge has a better staff!

Deputy Grand Secretary Tim S. Anderson continues to work long hours on behalf of the Masonic Family, sharing his love for the Fraternity with lodges and the appendant bodies. His work with lodges has helped several regain their health. His background is very helpful in taking care of the building.

Karen Davies is the bookkeeper, administrative assistant, and scholarship program coordinator as well as the friendly voice that you usually hear when calling the office. She loves assisting lodges in promoting their events.

Ivette Radziunas handles membership records and related information, and has become well-known to the lodge secretaries as she works with them and answers their questions. She has developed a network of her counterparts in many of the Grand Jurisdictions which is expediting membership related requests.

Assistant Librarian Bill Kreuger is recognized as an authority on many library topics including disaster preparedness and often is contacted for advice. He represents the Iowa Masonic Library and Museums in various capacities across the state and even the region. You are encouraged to read the Grand Librarian's report that he prepared at my request.

Tim Hoppes is the Custodian/Maintenance person, and continues to keep the building and grounds looking great! The rose garden continues to be an example of his green thumb. Tim is active in the Salvation Army, and its charitable work in the community.

There is always a long list of persons to thank for the work and commitment to Iowa Masonry. First of all, thank you to Grand Master Jerry L. Levay and his lady Sue as they lead Iowa Masonry this year. The 2011-12 Grand Lodge Family represents Iowa Masonry well while traveling across the state.

Thanks to all who submitted stories and pictures for the Grand Lodge Bulletin. Thank you to LuCinda Friess and Marsha Miller, Administrators of the Perry and Bettendorf Homes respectively, for their cooperation. Thanks to the Custodians of the Work for their work is sharing and teaching the ritual. Thank you to the brothers that serve on the standing boards and committees for their efforts. Thanks to all who support and to

help to build the Masonic Family. Again, a big thank you goes to the volunteers who have assisted at the Iowa Masonic Library and Museums for all the wonderful work that you do. Thank you to the lodge secretaries for their efforts, and for providing information on a timely basis.

A very special thank you goes to my wife Elaine for her love, support, and assistance throughout the year.

#### **DEGREE STATISTICS/MEMBERSHIP**

Gains for 2011 included 577 Raisings, Affiliations of 344, and Restorations of 229; or total increases of 1,150. Losses included 913 deaths, 398 Demissions and Plural Terminations, 711 Suspensions for Non-Payment of Dues, and 7 Withdrawals and Expulsions; or total decreases of 2,029. This activity resulted in a net loss of 879 members leaving a membership of 20,844.

#### PETITIONS FOR THE DEGREES

Reported were 626 petitions in 2011, with 6 rejections.

# Report of the Iowa Masonic Library and Museums (Prepared by William R. Kreuger, Assistant Librarian, at the request of William R. Crawford, Grand Secretary/Librarian)

The year 2011-12 has been a very busy one for the lowa Masonic Library and Museums. We continue to serve both Masons and non-Masons by providing information and materials as requested. In most cases we are able to fulfill requests in a very timely manner. In fact, we are often complimented on the speed in which we are able to fulfill requests and/or answer questions. Typical examples of requests include:

- Helping patrons with Masonic history, either lodge or history of ancestors or relatives.
- Providing book and reading materials to patrons.
- Guiding patrons in the library stacks
- Providing research information to patrons.

It seems that we have had many requests this year from Prince Hall Masons requesting information about and copies of their various Grand Lodge proceedings from our Prince Hall collection. We have scanned most of those materials using our book scanner and make them available as a PDF. We have been working to link the individual PDF files with the Library's electronic card catalog to make it easier to search for printable materials. Among the researchers who have visited our library during the past year is Alton Roundtree, who is continuing his research on the history of Prince Hall Grand Lodges and the National Compact.

The Library has continued an active collecting program. During the past year, from June 2011 to June 2012, we have added 818 titles to the collection. Many of those titles are part of either the Harvey Collection of Landscape Architecture or the Walkes Collection of Prince Hall Masonry. During the year, we added 338 titles to the Harvey Collection and 353 titles to the Walkes Collection.

In the museum collection, we added 14 different collections during 2011 and 6 different collections this year, so far. Among the items collected last year:

- Gothic style Master's chair from Trinity Lodge No. 208
- Inlaid wooden tray with a picture of the front of the Iowa Masonic Library carved into it.
- Framed panoramic photograph of the Grand Lodge of North Dakota annual meeting in 1924.

Among the items collected this year include:

- Scottish Rite watch fob of T. S. Parvin, Consistory in Sioux City, IA, c. 1910.
- Scrapbook of mostly Masonic cards and materials.
- ID card of Erika Koberl dated April 1943, from Germany.

We are continuing work on the conversion of the Index Rerum periodical citations from hand-written format to a digital format. This project received funding from the Masonic Charitable Educational Corporation (MCEC) again this year. As mentioned in the report last year, the project will allow researchers to find articles from the many Masonic periodicals housed in the library collection.

Since January 2011, we have been working on a project to bind many of our Masonic and non-Masonic periodicals that have been neglected. Thus far, over 100 titles have been bound. Thank you to the lowa Masonic Library Association for their underwriting of the project.

During the past year we had more than 650 visitors tour the library and museums. Included were several group tours from the local area, students from Coe College, as well as Masonic lodges from various parts of Iowa.

In the fall of 2011 and spring of 2012 we had two students from the Public History program of the University of Northern Iowa working as volunteers, learning about both museum practices and research. In the fall of 2011, Andrew Romitti cataloged a portion of our World War I collection and did research on James Norman Hall of Colfax, Iowa. In the spring of 2012, Alaina Schneider helped to encapsulate a portion of our World War I poster collection and did research on and cataloged the posters that she encapsulated.

The lowa Masonic Library and Museums continues good relations with other libraries, museums and Masonic libraries. The Assistant Librarian attended the annual meeting of the Masonic Library and Museum Association in Winnipeg, Manitoba in late September 2011. He attended as president of this organization, created the agenda for and chaired the annual MLMA meeting. He is now past-president of the organization, having served a two-year term.

The Assistant Librarian is also president of the Iowa Conservation and Preservation Consortium (ICPC), a state-wide organization that helps promote the conservation and preservation of archival and library related materials. He helped to plan a conference entitled "Disasters Happen" that was held in Cedar Rapids on April 19-20, 2012. The conference was a combined effort of the Iowa Library Association, the Iowa Museum Association, and the ICPC.

In March and April 2012, the Assistant Librarian served as a judge for the local and state History Day competitions. The local History Day event was held in mid-March at the Old State Capitol in Iowa City, while the state competition was held in Des Moines at the State Historical Society Building in late April.

The Iowa Masonic Library and Museums continues its membership in several national, state and local organizations. These include the Masonic Library and Museum Association, the Iowa Library Association, the Iowa Conservation and Preservation Consortium, the Iowa Museum Association, the Iowa Cultural Corridor Alliance, the Cedar Rapids Area Convention and Visitors Bureau, and the Silos and Smokestacks National Heritage Area.

Volunteers for the Iowa Masonic Library and Museums have continued to provide help and support. There are several individuals who give their time and talent in a number of capacities. This includes helping with tours, helping with the preservation of Grand Lodge records, helping with the identification and preservation of the museum collection, research, envelope stuffing and a variety of other tasks. Unfortunately, one of our long time volunteers, Past Grand Tyler Norm Hammond, passed away on January 10, 2012. Norm was always here, rain or shine with a smile on

his face and ready to do anything that the office staff needed him to do. Norm we miss you!

We have treated our volunteers to lunch on several occasions during the past year as a way of saying "thank you" to them. The total number of hours accumulated by volunteers during this past year is in excess of 1,980. If a minimum wage salary were paid, the total amount would be more than \$14,850.

# Repairs and Improvements to the Grand Lodge Library and Administration Building

Improvements and repairs to the Grand Lodge Library and Administration Building, a building that is over 50 years old, continue to be a "work in progress." After several years of major expenditures for roof replacement, exterior brick repair, and installation of a boiler, the year 2012 provided a brief reprieve. However, it is anticipated that a significant tuck-pointing project will need to be undertaken in the near future. In addition, a building of this age will require increased maintenance costs in the future, which is why \$4 of the \$5 dues increase in 2010 was allocated to the Building Trust Fund. It is preferable to have funds on hand to take care of maintenance and repair issues than be forced into special or emergency measures to raise funds after the fact.

### Appreciation Dinner for the Staff of the Grand Lodge Library and Administration Building

A dedicated, loyal and hard-working staff is truly an asset to the Grand Master, to the Trustees of the Grand Lodge, and to the Craft. In recognition of this dedication, members of the staff were guests of the Trustees at a luncheon held on July 11, 2012.

#### Compensation for Key Employees of the Grand Lodge

Under Section 3e, Chapter 5, Laws of the Grand Lodge, the Trustees of the Grand Lodge have been given the responsibility to "approve the hiring, compensation, and other benefits for all key employees of the Grand Lodge as designated by the Trustees of the Grand Lodge." #### **Nomination of Grand Secretary**

Chapter 5, Section 3(e) of the Laws of the Grand Lodge, states, "The Trustees of the Grand Lodge shall have the authority and power:

**e**. To have general supervision over all employment policies and practices of the Grand Lodge and to approve the hiring, compensation, and other benefits for all key employees of the Grand Lodge as designated by the Trustees of the Grand Lodge. Before May 1 of each year, the Trustees of the Grand Lodge shall nominate a brother for election or reelection to the office of Grand Secretary at the next annual communication of the Grand Lodge. (*Amended 2009*)

Pursuant to that portion of the Laws of the Grand Lodge, the Trustees, on April 30, 2012, fulfilled that responsibility by nominating Thomas P. Youngblut, PGT & PDGM, for election to the office of Grand Secretary at the next Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge, in September of 2012. This unanimous nomination followed extensive discussion and deliberation regarding the performance of the Grand Secretary over an extended period of time.

The Grand Lodge Trustees take this opportunity to thank Right Worshipful Brother William R. Crawford for his many years of dedicated service to the Grand Lodge and earnestly recommend he be bestowed the title "Grand Secretary Emeritus" at the earliest possible time. We wish him well in his future endeavors, and look forward to his continued active involvement in Iowa Masonry.

In order to maintain an accurate record of what has actually been expended within each line item of the budget, the Trustees may authorize, for good cause shown, an overrun of certain line items within the approved budget, provided such overruns would not cause the total amount of the approved budget to be exceeded. The Trustees are pleased to report that, to the date of this report, it has not been necessary to approve any overruns in this fiscal year from the budget. We extend our compliments to the Finance Committee for their efforts in budgeting and to the Grand Secretary and his office for their diligence to stay within the established budgets.

#### **Estates**

During the past fiscal year the Grand Secretary's Office received distributions from several estates or trusts in which the Grand Lodge or one of its charitable trust funds was named as beneficiary. The Trustees deeply appreciate the generosity of the various donors. #### Investments

The Trustees, in conjunction with financial advisors from Robert W. Baird and Co., have maintained the existing investment policies and practices as updated in July 2009. In June, the Trustees gave official permission to the Trustees of the Herman Rowley Memorial Trust to adopt these investment policies. Investment objectives, in order of priority, are as follows: to preserve principal, to generate current income, and to achieve growth of principal value. Assets of the Grand Lodge portfolio are divided among cash and cash equivalents, fixed income securities, equities, Strict guidelines have been imposed to satellites, and alternatives. minimize and control risk among these five classes of investments. These guidelines have provided an investment result which has continued to outperform the various markets in which the funds are invested. The Grand Lodge opened an account with Robert W. Baird & Co. on December 31, 1999. Between then and March 31, 2012, the deposits total \$5,178,919.78, the withdrawals total \$4,788,804.00, total gains are \$1,650,626.32, leaving an ending balance of \$2,046,252.37.

Personnel from Baird and Company meet with the Trustees on a regular basis to review account performance, keep the Trustees aware of any changing conditions, and to conduct fiduciary reviews.

Shorter-term investments in Certificates of Deposit continue to be handled by the Grand Secretary.

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

Your committee on Appeals and Grievances reports that it has met to review the actions of Grand Master Jerry L. Levay in expelling S.F.D., F.E.E., T.D.J., D.W.L., & P.W.S. from Masonry.

FURTHER, to review the actions of Grand Master Levay in suspending M.J.C. for a period of not less than one year.

FUTHER, to review the actions of Trial Master Daniel P. Griffin in expelling R. L. J. from Masonry.

FURTHER, to consider the Petitions for Reinstatement filed by J.A.B. and R.P.G.

These matters are submitted to you in five separate divisions.

#### **DIVISION ONE**

- S.F.D. was expelled from Kingston Lodge No. 676 at Cedar Rapids by order of Jerry L. Levay, Grand Master of Masons in Iowa, on August 13, 2012. This expulsion was not appealed.
- F.E.E. was expelled from Excelsior Lodge No. 259 at Council Bluffs by order of Jerry L. Levay, Grand Master of Masons in Iowa, on January 20, 2012. This expulsion was not appealed.
- T.J.D. was expelled from Clermont Lodge No. 160 at Clermont by order of Jerry L. Levay, Grand Master of Masons in Iowa, on June 25, 2012. This expulsion was not appealed.

D.W.L. was expelled from Mecca Lodge No. 255239 at Coggon by order of Jerry L. Levay, Grand Master of Masons in Iowa, on June 25, 2012. This expulsion was not appealed.

P.W.S. was expelled from Mosaic Lodge No. 125 at Dubuque by order of Jerry L. Levay, Grand Master of Masons in Iowa, on December 5, 2011. This expulsion was not appealed.

This Committee, after an examination of the records and supporting evidence, FINDS that Grand Master Levay acted, in all respects; in accord with the Iowa Masonic Code in ordering these expulsions and that the same should be approved and confirmed by the Grand Lodge.

I MOVE that the orders of Grand Master Jerry L. Levay, dated August 13, 2012 expelling S.F.D. from Kingston Lodge No. 676 at Cedar Rapids; January 20, 2012 expelling F.E.E. from Excelsior Lodge No. 259 at Council Bluffs; June 25, 2012 expelling T.J.D. from Clermont Lodge No. 160 at Clermont; June 25, 2012 expelling D.W.L. from Mecca Lodge No. 523 at Coggon; and December 5, 2011 expelling P.W.S. from Mosaic Lodge No. 125 at Dubuque, be approved and confirmed by the Grand Lodge of Iowa.

#### **DIVISION TWO**

M.J.C. was suspended from Hamilton Lodge No. 644 at Bettendorf and Snow Lodge No. 44 at LeClaire for a period of not less than one year by order of Jerry L. Levay, Grand Master of Masons in Iowa, on June 6, 2012. This suspension was not appealed.

This Committee, after examination of the records and supporting evidence FINDS that Grand Master Levay, in view of the specific facts of this case, acted, in all respects, in accord with Chapter 4, Section 2(b) of the Iowa Masonic Code in ordering this suspension.

I MOVE that the order of Grand Master Jerry L. Levay dated June 6, 2012 suspending M.J.C. from Hamilton Lodge No. 664 and Snow Lodge No. 44 at LeClaire for a period of not less than one year be approved and confirmed by the Grand Lodge of Iowa.

#### **DIVISION THREE**

R.L.J. was expelled from Waterloo Lodge No. 105 at Waterloo by order of Trial Master Daniel P. Griffin following a Masonic trial. This expulsion was effective April 14, 2012. This expulsion has been appealed. This Committee met September 20, 2012 and gave F.L.J. the opportunity to be heard. R.L.J. appeared and presented his case, supported by two Brothers who accompanied him.

This Committee spent considerable time reviewing the facts and background of this case. The Committee, after examination of the records and supporting evidence FINDS that Trial Master Griffin acted, in all respects, in accord with the Iowa Masonic Code in ordering this expulsion. Further, the Committee, after review of the evidence and hearing the remarks R.L.J. and his supporters finds that there was no substantial

prejudice to the rights of R.L.J., which is the standard required by the Iowa Masonic Code for the Grand Lodge of Iowa to reverse the order of the Trial Master. R.L.J. has been given complete due process and has been treated justly, equitably and impartially by the Trial Master, Attorneys and Appeals and Grievances Committee. However, this case clearly shows that it is imperative for Symbolic Lodges to perform thorough and complete investigations at the outset when investigative committees are charged with responsibility to examine prospective members.

I MOVE that the order of Trial Master Daniel P. Griffin, effective April 14, 2012 expelling R.L.J. from Waterloo Lodge No. 105 at Waterloo be approved and confirmed by the Grand Lodge of Iowa.

#### **DIVISION FOUR**

J.A.B. was expelled from South Gate Lodge No. 657 at Des Moines by order of Jack L. Butler, Grand Master of Masons in Iowa, on February 6, 2009. J.A.B. petitioned for Reinstatement and on June 7, 2012 the members of South Gate Lodge No. 657 voted by unanimous secret ballot to reinstate J.A.B. to good standing in the Fraternity and to membership in their lodge.

This Committee after examining the records recommends approval of J.A.B. being reinstated in South Gate Lodge No. 657 upon being reobligated in all three Degrees. I MOVE that this recommendation be approved and confirmed by the Grand Lodge of Iowa.

#### **DIVISION FIVE**

R.P.G. was expelled from Newton Lodge No. 59 at Newton by order of Craig C. Hummel, Grand Master of Masons in Iowa, on October 19, 2009. R.P.G. petitioned for Reinstatement and on September 13, 2012 the members of Newton Lodge No. 59 voted by unanimous secret ballot to reinstate R.P.G. to good standing in the Fraternity and to membership in their Lodge.

This Committee after examining the records recommends approval of R.P.G. being reinstated in Newton Lodge No. 59 upon being re-obligated in all three Degrees. I MOVE that this recommendation be approved and confirmed by the Grand Lodge of Iowa.

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON GRAND LODGE RECOGNITION

Jason A. Wolcott gave the Report of the Committee on Grand Lodge Recognition. It was, on his motion –

ADOPTED.

Your Committee on Grand Lodge Recognition submits its report of activities and correspondence for the past Masonic year. Your committee received sixty four items of correspondence and email this year, forty six of which were on the GLNF situation alone.

#### **Grande Loge Nationale Française (GLNF)**

At last year's Annual Communication, the Grand Lodge of Iowa voted to suspend recognition of the Grande Loge Nationale Francaise (GLNF). Since then, eighty plus Grand Lodges have suspended their recognition of the GLNF, and six have withdrawn recognition altogether. On 18 July 2012 the United Grand Lodge of England (UGLE) announced "in the absence of any dramatic change in circumstances, the Board of General Purposes will recommend in its Report to the September Quarterly Communication of the Grand Lodge that it is in the best interest of the United Grand Lodge of England that recognition be withdrawn from the GLNF." This anticipated decision by the UGLE and various other European Grand Lodges to withdraw their recognition from the GLNF allows for the possibility that a new Grand Lodge will be formed and recognized in France. Your committee is following these developments closely but recommends no action at this time.

#### **Grand Loge Reguliere de Tahiti**

We received correspondence dated 31 January 2012 from M.W. Brother Phillippe Gestas, Grand Master of the Grand Loge Reguliere de Tahiti requesting recognition. They were self-constituted by three lodges working under GLNF charters in the Territory of Tahiti. The Grand Lodge of Tahiti was consecrated by the Worshipful Master of its eldest lodge on 21 January 2012. The Commission on Information for Recognition reported on 21 February 2012 that "the Grand Lodge of Tahiti meets the standards for recognition." On 5 March 2012 the GLNF issued a strong protest claiming exclusive jurisdiction, "French Polynesia, to which Tahiti belongs and on which the 'The Regular Grand Lodge of Tahiti' claims to exercise its jurisdiction, is a French Territory . . . The French national territory is one and indivisible." While your committee is sympathetic to the Grand Lodge of Tahiti, it recommends that we lay this over until the situation with the GLNF is resolved.

#### **Grand Lodge of Albania**

We received correspondence dated 27 April 2012 from R.W. Brother Skender Xheko, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Albania. They were consecrated on 14 October 2011 by the Grand Orient of Italy, with the participation of the Regular Grand Lodge of Serbia and the Grand Lodge of Greece. They meet our standards for recognition. Your committee recommends recognition of the Grand Lodge of Albania.

#### Summary

Your adoption of this report shall extend official recognition to the Grand Lodge of Albania; that a decision on the Grand Lodge of Tahiti be held over until next year; and that no action be taken concerning the GLNF at this time.

### REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES IOWA MASONIC SCHOLARSHIP ENDOWMENT FUND

James H. Windsor III, Chairman, gave the report of the Trustees. It was, on his motion –

To The Grand Lodge of Iowa:

The following is the Trustees of the Iowa Masonic Scholarship Endowment Fund report for the fiscal year ending July 31, 2012.

The total gross receipts for the year were \$171,573.86 and were received from the following sources:

Contributions	\$ 13,344.61
Income	 158,229.25
Total Receipts	\$ 171.573.86

Contributions of \$13,344.61 were added to the Fund as required by the Trust Agreement. The income receipts of \$158,229.25 were used to pay the expenses of General Administration (\$4,663.14), Scholarship Selection Committee (\$893.38), the Annual Audit and Tax Service (\$2,830.00), Investment and Custodial Services (\$18,343.82), and Sixty (60) Scholarships of \$2,000 each (\$120,000), for total disbursements of \$146,730.34 leaving an excess of income over disbursements of \$24,843.52. In addition, during the fiscal year the investments in the Endowment Fund increased by \$131,001.76 as a result of realized and unrealized gains and losses in value of the securities.

Based on the 8/1/2011 beginning value, total earnings before distributions and expenses were 8.74%. Net of distributions and expenses and total earnings the account value increased 4.55%.

The Endowment Fund is the remainder beneficiary of a Charitable Remainder Annuity Trust from Brother Roy G. Thompson and his wife, which provides an annual annuity payment to Mrs. Thompson during her lifetime and becomes the property of the Endowment Fund after her death. The market value of this Annuity Trust on July 31, 2012 was \$8,578.76.

Itemized lists of the Assets of the Endowment Fund and a schedule of Receipts and Disbursements for the fiscal year are attached hereto and are made a part of this report.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON JURISPRUDENCE (On Dispensations, Decisions and Opinions, and Official Acts)

Donald E. Mosier, Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee, gave the report for the Committee on Dispensations, Decisions and Opinions, and Official Acts of the Grand Master. This report was, on his motion –

ADOPTED.

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

The Report of the Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence will be given in two parts. The first part will report the findings of the Committee with respect to the Dispensations, Decision and Opinions, and Official Acts of the Grand Master. The second part, to be given this afternoon, will report the determinations and recommendations of the Committee with respect to the proposed legislation.

# Report of the Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence regarding Dispensations, Decisions and Opinions, and Official Acts of the Grand Master

The Committee on Jurisprudence reviewed the Official Acts, Official and Unofficial Opinions, Dispensations, and Waivers of Jurisdictions granted by the Grand Master, as listed in his preliminary report and in a supplementary report including actions after the printing of the preliminary report. All page numbers listed in this report will refer to the Grand Master's report as printed in the Agenda and Preliminary Reports of the 168<sup>th</sup> Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Iowa.

As reported on page 16, the Grand Master performed no Official Acts requiring review.

As reported on pages 16-17, the Grand Master issued on official opinion. This official opinion was in answer to a question posted by the Worshipful Master of Hiram of Tyre Lodge No.118 at Tama, regarding the appropriateness of this resignation due to illness. The Grand Master's response was that if the Worshipful Master resigned, there was no allowance in the Code for his return to office. While the committee questioned whether this answer was complete, they did find it to be in order and APPROVED it.

As reported on page 17, the Grand Master issued no Unofficial Opinions requiring review.

The Grand Master granted 19 Dispensations, 17 of which are printed on pages 18 and 19 of the preliminary report. He also granted two dispensations for the formation of Woodrow Morris Lodge U.D. at North Liberty and Albert Pike Lodge U.D. in Cedar Rapids, which will be included in the final report printed in the proceedings. These dispensations were all found to be in order and APPROVED.

The Grand Master refused one Dispensation, as printed on page 19. This refusal was found to be in order and APPROVED.

The Grand Master granted seven permissions, five of which are listed on page 17 of the preliminary report. The remaining two were printed in the supplementary reports. The permissions were all found to be IN ORDER.

As reported on page 17, there was no permissions denied requiring review.

The Grand Master granted seven Waivers of Jurisdiction, as listed on pages 17 and 18 of the preliminary report. The first waiver was found to be in order. It was determined that the remaining six, all related to courtesy work by a Nebraska Lodge, would have been better handled through the permission process, rather than a waiver process. However, due to a precedent set in 2009, these Waivers of Jurisdiction were also found to be IN ORDER.

There were no reported Waivers of Jurisdiction denied.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that this portion of the report of the Committee on Masonic Jurisdiction, regarding the Dispensations, Decisions and Opinions, Official Acts, and Waiver of Jurisdiction issued by the Grand Master be adopted.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON DIVISION AND REFERENCE (On the Grand Master's Report)

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

The report of the Committee on Division and Reference will be given in three sections. Eric A. Rozeboom will report on the Grand Secretary's Report and Kenneth A. Hurmence will report on the Grand Librarian's Report.

#### **Grand Master's Report**

Grand Master Jerry L. Levay exemplified his devotion and passion to Masonry and the Military this past Grand Lodge Year. The theme "Masonry and the Military – Hand in Hand Since 1776 – Saluting Those Who Serve," was carried across our great state. Wherever our Grand Master visited he was honored to recognize those who are currently and those who have in the past, served in the military. He was sure to shake their hand, thank them for their service and present them a patch for their branch of the military. It was evident in the eyes and faces of our military brethren that they felt privileged to serve and many humbled to be honored.

The Grand Master raised funds to help military families. His Grand Master Pin sales, Mason jars, and the beef sticks sold by the Rainbow and DeMolay all raised funds to help those who have, or are serving. A highlight of the year was meeting Brother Dustin Morrison, who was seriously wounded in Afghanistan. The Grand Master had the opportunity to meet Brother Morrison and present him a donation to help defray some of his family's expenses while he was hospitalized. Efforts to raise funds to help Petty Officer Taylor Morris and his family are the main focus of the fundraising now.

Education and Leadership are important aspects of Masonry. Grand Master Levay continued and expanded the Masonic Symbolism Course, and the Masonic Academy of Knowledge. The second Iowa Conference on Masonic Education was successfully held in February in Cedar Rapids. The Annual Leadership Symposium was held in June in Des Moines. These conferences were supported by the Masonic Charitable Education Corporation, Iowa Masonic Library Association, the Iowa Scottish Rite Masonic Foundation, and the Grand Lodge of Iowa. Iowa has become a destination for excellent Masonic Speakers and Leaders.

Grand Master Levay held Grand Master Area Meetings from border to border of Iowa. The Grand Master shared his program with the local lodges at these twelve meetings. Some of the topics presented were: "Leaving a Legacy" about our lodge heroes and history, the Academy of Knowledge and Masonic Symbolism, and our Masonic Youth, DeMolay. Veterans and current military were recognized by the Grand Master for their served and presented a Masonic patch for their branch of the military.

The Grand Master traveled to other Grand Jurisdictions where he was honored to represent the Masons of Iowa. He attended the Grand Lodges of: Nebraska, Kansas, Minnesota, South Carolina, and Iowa Prince Hall Grand Lodge. When he was unable to attend he sent a representative as listed in his report. He represented Iowa and the Conference of Grand Masters held in Atlanta, GA in February, the Midwest Conference on Masonic Education in Ohio, and the Midwest Conference of Grand Lodges in Michigan.

Every Grand Master has the responsibility of appointing Grand Officers, Committees, and the Chairman of most Grand Lodge Committees. Grand Master Levay in his report lists these appointments. Thank you to those who serve the Grand Lodge of lowa in these capacities.

The Grand Lodge Officers and the Grand Master have travelled across the state conferring degrees, laying cornerstones, doing rededications, attending Grand Officer receptions, and fellowshipping with the Masons of Iowa. They had the honor to Constitute Travelers Lodge No. 679. They instituted two new lodges: Woodrow Morris Lodge (UD) and Albert Pike Lodge (UD) on the same day in Cedar Rapids.

Unfortunately the Grand Master had to expel brothers from the Fraternity. Those expulsions are referred to the Committee on Appeals and Grievances. The Grand Master makes a strong case in his recommendations that the Investigating Committee on a Petition take their responsibility seriously. He recommends a criminal background check be required before voting on the petition.

The Grand Master issued one official opinion and it is referred to the Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence. There were no official acts or unofficial opinions. There were six permissions granted and none denied; they are referred to the Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence. The Grand Master granted five waivers of jurisdiction, he issued 17 dispensations and refused one dispensation, these are referred to the Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence.

In conclusion we give Grand Master Jerry L. Levay a salute for his service to Iowa Masonry. He gave his time, talent, and passion to serving the craft. Brother Jerry, you have honored those who serve and we honor you as our Grand Master who served.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON DIVISION AND REFERENCE (On the Grand Librarian's Report)

The Grand Librarian's Report was prepared by William R. Krueger, Assistant Librarian, at the request of Grand Librarian William R. Crawford. The committee received and reviewed this report. The Iowa Masonic Library and Museums staff has been very busy again this year assisting patrons and visitors, both Masonic and non-Masonic, in providing books and reading materials to patrons, guiding patrons through the library stacks, providing research materials, assisting in locating those materials, helping patrons with lodge histories or those of relatives or ancestors, and providing tours of the museums. Over 650 people have toured and visited the library and museums during the past year.

The library is continuing to increase the number of titles within its collection. Two major additions this year have been made to the Harvey Collection of Landscape Architecture and to the Walkes Collection of Prince Hall Masonry where 318 and 353 titles were added respectively. These were part of 818 new titles added during the year. The Walkes Collection has resulted in significant increased usage of the library by Prince Hall Masons as they research minutes from various Prince Hall proceedings, including visits by Alton Roundtree who is researching Prince Hall Grand Lodges and the National Compact. These patrons were assisted by using the electronic card catalog and the scanning of appropriate passages into PDF files.

The museum received fourteen different collections during 2011 and six collections in the first half of 2012. These included such items as a Gothic style Master's chair from Trinity Lodge, an In-laid wooden tray with a picture of the front of the Iowa Masonic Library, the Scottish Rite watch fob of T. S. Parvin, a scrapbook of Masonic cards, and a German girl's ID card from World War II Germany.

Thanks to a grant from the Iowa Masonic Charitable Educational Corporation, work has continued on conversion of the Index Rerum from a handwritten to digital format, which will assist researchers in finding articles from Masonic periodicals. The Iowa Masonic Library Association has also provided assistance by underwriting a project to bind Masonic periodicals. Over 100 titles have been bound thus far.

The library also continues to benefit from the contributions of volunteers whose efforts allow many tasks to be completed that would not be possible without their assistance. Almost two thousand hours were donated by volunteers this past year. If the Grand Lodge had to pay even minimum wages for the contributions it would have added almost \$15,000.00 to the budget so their contributions are definitely appreciated. One of those dependable volunteers Brother Norman Hammond passed away and his presence and efforts will be missed. Special assistance was provided by two students from the University of Northern Iowa's Public

History program. Andrew Romitti cataloged a portion of the World War I collection and research on James Norman Hall of Colfax, Iowa. Alaina Schneider helped encapsulate and catalog a portion of the World War I poster collection.

Assistant Librarian William Krueger continues to be active in Library Association and Library Conservation programs and has served in leadership programs in both. In September of 2011, Krueger finished his second year as president of the Masonic Library and Museum Association by creating the agenda and chairing the annual meeting. He is also president of the lowa Conservation and Preservation Consortium and helped plan a conference entitled "Disasters Happen" in Cedar Rapids on April 19-20. Krueger has also served as a judge at both the local and state levels for History Day competitions.

The library continues to be represented in the Masonic Library and Museum Association, Iowa Library Association, Iowa Conservation and Preservation Consortium, Iowa Museum Association, Iowa Cultural Corridor Alliance, Cedar Rapids Area Convention and Visitors Bureau, and the Silos and Smokestacks National Heritage Area. All of these associations help promote the Iowa Masonic Library and Museum's visibility at different levels.

The Iowa Masonic Library and Museums continues to be one of the premier Masonic research facilities in the world and houses a fascinating and varied collection of items in their museum. It provides a face of Iowa Masonry for those who are not Masons. The efforts of the all of the members of the Iowa Masonic Library and Museums staff to promote and maintain the integrity of this irreplaceable facility and presenting a helpful, friendly, and hospitable welcome to its visitors and patrons are deeply appreciated.

#### Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

#### Note 1. Nature of Activities and Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of business: The Grand Lodge of Iowa of Ancient, Free, and Accepted Masons (Grand Lodge) purpose and activities are fraternal and charitable in nature. Subordinate lodges participate in a variety of charitable and civic activities such as student scholarships and helping needy families and individuals. The Grand Lodge supports these activities as well as scholarship programs, a student loan program, two nursing homes, Field Financial Aid, and participates with the Masonic Service Association of the United States and other Grand Lodges in financial relief for natural disasters.

The lowa Masonic Scholarship Endowment Fund (Scholarship Fund) was officially established by the Board of Trustees of the Grand Lodge on September 18, 1974, under an irrevocable trust instrument for the purpose of providing college scholarships to deserving lowa public high school seniors. The trustees of the Scholarship Fund are appointed by the Grand Master of the Grand Lodge.

Basis of presentation: Commencing with the year ended July 31, 2010, the Grand Lodge adopted the policy of preparing its financial statements on the accounting basis used for federal income tax purposes. For income tax purposes, the Grand Lodge has consolidated the Scholarship Fund. The federal income tax return is reported on the cash basis method with modifications for charity obligations. The income tax basis of accounting may differ from generally accepted accounting practices in the following significant respects. Certain revenues are recognized when received rather than when earned and certain expenses and purchases of assets are recognized when cash is disbursed rather than when the obligation is incurred. That basis differs from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America primarily because the Grand Lodge and the Scholarship Fund have not recognized any receivables, accrued investment income, capitalized purchases of property and equipment, accrued expenses, amount due vendors, or recorded the related effects on earnings.

<u>Consolidation</u>: The consolidated financial statements include the Grand Lodge and the Scholarship Fund. All material intercompany accounts and transactions are eliminated in consolidation.

Accounting estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the income tax basis of accounting requires management to have a reasonable basis for the estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of support, revenues, expenses, gains, losses, and other changes in net assets during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Because many types of transactions are susceptible to varying interpretations under federal (and state) income tax laws and regulations, the amounts reported in the accompanying financial statements may be subject to change at a later date upon final determination by the taxing authorities.

A summary of the Grand Lodge's significant accounting policies follows:

<u>Net assets</u>: Net assets and support and revenue, expenses, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets of the Grand Lodge and Scholarship Fund and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

<u>Unrestricted</u>: This category of net assets includes unrestricted contributions and expenses associated with the principal activity of the Grand Lodge and Scholarship Fund. Unrestricted net assets are presently available for use by the Grand Lodge and Scholarship Fund at the discretion of the Board of Trustees.

<u>Temporarily restricted</u>: This category of net assets includes gifts and income for which donor-imposed restrictions have not been met or a donor-imposed time restriction has been incurred and the net appreciation or depreciation in permanently restricted endowments that has not been appropriated for expenditure. The Grand Lodge and Scholarship Fund had temporarily restricted net assets of \$288,198 as of July 31, 2012 and 2011. See Note 3 for discussion regarding the nature restrictions

<u>Permanently restricted</u>: This category of net assets includes gifts, trusts, and pledges that require, by donor restriction, that the corpus of the gift be invested in perpetuity and only the income be made available for program operations in accordance with donor restrictions. The Grand Lodge and Scholarship Fund had no permanently restricted net assets as of July 31, 2012 and 2011.

<u>Support and revenue</u>: All contributions are considered to be available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor or by law. Amounts received which are designated for future periods or restricted by the donor for specific purposes are reported as temporarily restricted or permanently restricted support. However, if a restriction is fulfilled in the same time period in which the contribution is received, the Grand Lodge reports the support as unrestricted. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of support, revenue, expenses, and changes in net assets – income tax basis as net assets released from restrictions.

The Grand Lodge is reliant primarily upon dues from its members, most of whom are lowa residents.

Contributions received by the Scholarship Fund under irrevocable split-interest agreements are recorded at their fair value when received. The date when the Scholarship Fund is considered to receive an irrevocable split-interest agreement depends on whether the Scholarship Fund or a third party is trustee for the agreement. If the Scholarship Fund is the trustee or fiscal agent of the assets, the gift is considered received (and the split-interest agreement is recorded) when the donor executes the agreement. If an unrelated third party (such as bank, trust company, or private individual) is the trustee or fiscal agent of the assets, the Scholarship Fund records the split-interest agreement when it is notified of the gift's existence.

If the Scholarship Fund holds or controls the assets contributed under an irrevocable split-interest agreement, it (1) records the assets received at their fair value, (2) records a liability for any portion of the assets that are held for the donor or other beneficiary equal to the present value of the unexpected future payments to be made to the donor or other beneficiary, and (3) records contribution revenue for the difference between the fair value of the assets received and the liability incurred.

<u>Cash and cash equivalents</u>: Includes all cash accounts, which are not subject to withdrawal restrictions or penalties, and all liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less when purchased as cash and cash equivalents.

<u>Concentrations of credit risk</u>: Financial instruments which subject to concentrations of credit risk consist primarily of investments in long-term corporate and government fixed income instruments, equity holdings of domestic corporations, money market accounts, certificates of deposit, and mutual funds. The Grand Lodge or Scholarship Fund maintains cash in banks which may, at times, exceed the Federal Deposit Insurance Company limits.

<u>Investments</u>: Investments are carried at cost. Investment income is reported in the statement of support, revenue, expense, and changes in net assets – income tax basis as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted revenue based upon donor–imposed restrictions. Gains and investment income that are limited to specific uses by donor–imposed restrictions are reported in temporarily restricted net assets when the restrictions are met in the same period as the gains and income are recognized. The Scholarship Fund board has elected to return ten (10) percent of all investment income to the investment principal. Appreciation and depreciation of investments are recorded when realized.

<u>Functional expenses</u>: The costs of providing various program and supporting services have been summarized on a functional basis in the consolidated statement of support, revenue, expenses, and changes in net assets – income tax basis. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the program and supporting services benefited.

<u>Income taxes</u>: The Internal Revenue Service has recognized the Grand Lodge as exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(10). However, it may be subject to tax on unrelated business income.

<u>Subsequent events</u>: The Grand Lodge has evaluated subsequent events through December 20, 2012, the date on which the financial statements were available for issuance. Management has determined that no other events or transactions have occurred through this date that would require recognition or disclosure within the consolidated financial statements.

#### Note 4. Employee Benefit Plans

The Grand Lodge participates in the Grand Lodge of Iowa, A. F. & A. M. Retirement Plan. The retirement plan is a multi-employer defined contribution pension plan covering substantially all of its employees and the employees of the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities and the Herman L. Rowley Masonic Home. The various entities included in the pension plan fund their proportionate shares of the pension cost. The pension disbursement for the Grand Lodge's employees for the years ended July 31, 2012 and 2011 totaled \$14,886 and \$14,418, respectively.

#### Note 5. Rental Income

The Grand Lodge leases a portion of the building to two unrelated entities. The lease terms expire in April 2014 and November 2013. Monthly rental payments due the Grand Lodge for these leases are \$700 and \$580 per month.

#### Note 6. Beneficial Interest in Split-Interest Agreements

The Scholarship Fund has been designated as a beneficiary of the Brown Family Masonic Scholarship Trust (the "Trust"). The Trust's assets are being held by the Masonic Charitable Educational Corporation (MCEC), a related party, until July 2026, at which time the assets will be transferred to the Scholarship Fund. Earnings of the Trust are to be allocated as follows: 10% to be retained to maintain the value of the original principal and the remainder to be disbursed as scholarships to deserving students by MCEC. Since the financial statements are under the tax basis method of accounting, these assets are not included in the financial statements.

## Independent Auditors' Report on the Supplement Information

#### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE GRAND CHARITY BOARD

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

The Board of Trustees of the Grand Charity Funds of the Grand Lodge of Iowa, A.F. & A.M. presents its annual report for the 2011-2012 fiscal and Grand Lodge Year relating to its statutory role to carry out the charitable purposes of the Grand Lodge of Iowa. (Chap.6(2)(a) of the Iowa Masonic Code Laws of the Grand Lodge.)

#### MISSION STATEMENT:

Our Mission is two-fold and is guided by the requirements of the Masonic Code of Iowa and by the principles of Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth, which govern all Masons in this Grand Lodge.

- We review and respond to each application for relief which is presented to us by a subordinate lodge, investigate the circumstances thereof, and grant such relief as is both needed and reasonable, and within the funds available to the Field Financial Aid Fund.
- 2. We oversee the operations of the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities (IMHF) and the Masonic Village, Inc. Independent Living Facility, as non-profit facilities. Both

the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities and the Masonic Village serve Iowa Masons, their dependents or anyone who qualifies for residency and the services of those facilities, providing the highest quality of service and care possible to the resident in order to assure a desirable quality of life in their senior years.

#### **GOVERNING:**

The Field Financial Aid Fund, Iowa Masonic Health Facilities, and Masonic Village are governed by a Board of Trustees composed of members of the Iowa Masonic Family:

- Terry E. Osborne, P.J.G.W., Chairman, Poweshiek Lodge No. 174, Malcom

- Realff H. Ottesen, Junior Grand Warden, Chaplain, Early Morning Lodge No. 672 and Hamilton Lodge No. 664, Bettendorf; and Snow Lodge No. 44, Le Claire
- Damian N. Hurmence, Treasurer, Mount Vernon Lodge No. 112, Mount Vernon
- Eldon F. Walton, Secretary, Crest City Lodge No. 522, Creston and Daylight Lodge No. 660, Des Moines

The Administrator of the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities and Masonic Village is Marsha J. Miller, who serves the Trustees as Executive Director and Recording Secretary.

The Trustees of the Grand Charity Funds meet monthly, usually on the fourth Friday of the month at the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities in Bettendorf, IA. Any Iowa Mason is invited to attend one of our meetings and to learn how the work of the Trustees is done. Each of the Trustees serves as a volunteer to oversee the Field Financial Aid Fund, the operations of Iowa Masonic Health Facilities and Masonic Village, and to supervise the work of the Executive Director.

### THE PERMANENT GRAND CHARITY FUND AND FIELD FINANCIAL AID FUND

The Trustees of the Grand Charity Fund oversee the Permanent Grand Charity Fund and its investments; and distribute 90% of its annual income as the Field Financial Aid Program. By Masonic Code, 90% of the income of the Permanent Grand Charity Fund is transferred to the Field Financial Aid Fund each year. The Trustees distribute these funds at the request of the subordinate lodges to appropriate causes and persons, returning unused funds to the principal of the Permanent Fund at the end of each fiscal year.

The purpose of the Field Financial Aid Fund, one of the oldest Grand Lodge Charity Programs, is to assist subordinate lodges to meet charity

requests, which they are unable to fully fund themselves. The Field Financial Aid is not meant to replace the responsibility of the local lodges to do charitable work, but to supplement, thus providing more assistance than would be possible by the local lodge alone.

At the beginning of the fiscal year the Permanent Grand Charity Fund was fully invested in the amount of \$1,550,465, and on May 31, 2012 was fully invested in the amount of \$1,505,908 (including unrealized gains and losses).

Each year we inform every subordinate lodge in the Grand Lodge of lowa of the existence of the Field Financial Aid Fund and encourage their applications to that fund.

From August 1, 2011 through May 31, 2012 we responded to seventeen applications making awards of \$22,796 from the Field Financial Aid Fund to supplement \$27,075 from local lodges who made application, for a grand total of \$49,871. The details of the individual request for aid and the amounts thereof are available with the consent of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees.

It is the goal of the Trustees of the Grand Charity funds to be able to distribute the entire 90% allotment of income during fiscal year 2012–2013 for the charitable purposes for which the fund was created.

## IOWA MASONIC HEALTH FACILITIES AND MASONIC VILLAGE MAJOR GOALS:

The major goal of Iowa Masonic Health Facilities is to provide a safe and caring environment that promotes the well being of its residents and protects the rights and dignity of each individual while providing quality care. The facility is inspected annually by the Iowa Department of Inspections and Appeals and when last inspected received an excellent survey review.

The major goal of the Masonic Village is to provide an independent living community for persons sixty years of age and older. With renewable annual leases now available, Masonic Village now has very few unoccupied villas.

#### SERVICES PROVIDED:

**Iowa Masonic Health Facilities** is a seventy-nine (79) bed dually certified skilled and intermediate nursing care facility. Seventy-seven of the rooms are private, one room is semi-private, and one room is reserved as a respite room to serve Masonic Village residents should the need arise. Eighteen of the seventy-nine licensed beds are designated to the Ann Ruge Special Care Unit for Alzheimer's Disease and related disorders as approved by the Iowa Department of Inspections and Appeals. Services available to each resident of the facility include all aspects of healthcare for the elderly. There are approximately 106 persons on staff

at the facility providing professional services to each resident. Departments include nursing, activities, social services and counseling, housekeeping, dietary services, maintenance, and administration.

**Masonic Village** provides forty (40) independent living apartments under the Continuing Care Retirement Community Act of Iowa. The Village offers freedom from unwanted responsibility for its residents. Additional services include social and recreational activities, light housecleaning, transportation, and counseling. The fees and rents received also provide for total maintenance, twenty-four (24) hour security, and emergency medical services on a twenty – four (24) hour basis, trash collection, and all utilities. We now offer limited home health services as well. If a resident finds it necessary to receive nursing home care, Masonic Village residents have priority admission to Iowa Masonic Health Facilities.

At the present time Masons and families of Masons who become resident of Masonic Village receive a discount for the fees. For further details please call (563) 359-9171.

<u>FINANCIAL SUPPORT:</u> Iowa Masonic Health Facilities is supported by the fees received from private pay residents, Medicare, Medicaid, private insurance and the income from the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities Endowment Fund, and the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities Fund, along with the amount which is designated as part of Grand Lodge Dues.

Each year we receive income from trusts and bequest of Masons and their families, which supplement the funds available to the Endowment Fund and Facilities Fund. On July 31, 2012 the Endowment was fully invested at \$1,040,375 and the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities Fund was fully invested at \$2,852,710. In addition there is a designated fund for a chapel at Iowa Masonic Health Facilities in the amount of \$144,729.

The income from the Endowment and the Facility funds, together with gifts from Masons and lodges, are another act of Masonic Charity to compensate for the shortage of reimbursements received from Medicaid. (Due to low reimbursement rates.) Approximately 40.6% of the operating income of lowa Masonic Health Facilities comes from Medicaid. These funds, however, do not pay the total cost of care of these residents, as the reimbursement is only 90% of the per diem cost of care. The charity of lowa Masons has made it possible to make up this difference without invading the principal of any invested fund.

In addition, 195 lowa subordinate lodges have contributed a total of \$13,092 to the Sunshine Fund of lowa Masonic Health Facilities. This fund purchases many amenities for the residents of lowa Masonic Health Facilities, such as Christmas gifts for all residents, birthday gifts and spending money for resident who have no other source of funds, clothing, shoes, and personal items. Group amenities such as the aviaries, newspaper and magazine subscriptions, books on tape, large screen

television for lounges, furniture, and other decorative items are also purchased from these generous contributions by lowa Masons.

In compliance with Chapter 6 Sec. 7 (e) of the Iowa Masonic Code, we have approved a budget of fiscal year 2012-2013 of \$5,242,909 for Iowa Masonic Health Facilities, with capital expenditures limited to emergencies only. The budget for Masonic Village for the same period has been approved in the amount of \$456,399, with capital expenditures for emergencies only.

**INSURANCE AND APPRAISALS:** All insurance policies and appraisals of the properties of the Trustees of the Grand Charity Funds are available for inspections at the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities Executive Offices in Bettendorf.

#### **VOLUNTEERS AND SPECIAL THANKS**

Many individuals and groups have contributed their time, energy, and often their funds to Iowa Masonic Health Facilities and Masonic Village. The Trustees of the Grand Charity Funds would like to extend our thanks for these groups.

The Care Review Committee members are Mr. John Ortega, and Mr. Bob Holiday. The Care Review Committee is an official body recommended by the Iowa State Department of Inspections and Appeals as one of the standards for maintaining quality in a long-term care facility. These caring volunteers act as advocates for the residents and assist in protecting their rights.

The Local Masonic Community: The grateful thanks of the Trustees go out to the brothers of the local Masonic lodges who do so much to make the life of those at Iowa Masonic Health Facilities better. Special thanks go to Hamilton Lodge No. 664 and Early Morning Lodge No. 672 for their time and assistance with numerous events and programs at Iowa Masonic Health Facilities, as well as their monetary contributions. Thanks also to Davenport Lodge No. 37 and Brubaker Lodge No. 675 for their interest and support of the facility.

Thanks also go to the Davenport Eastern Star Chapters for their faithful participation in the facility picnic and special projects each year and to the Mohassan Grotto and Scottish Rite for their generosity and continued support.

Residents: We also appreciate the several Masonic Village residents who contribute their time and talents to the facilities in so many ways and areas. Our special thanks to Marjorie and Ken Harden, Maxine and Ken Duhm, Elaine and Wendell Hughes, Howard Massengarb, Ralph Schluckwerder, Edna Cannon, Lolly Kile, Kay Cone, Carm Randolph, Muriel Acker, and Paul and Joan Jones.

### REPORT OF THE CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANTS (GRAND CHARITY FUNDS)

To the Grand Lodge:

We have audited the accompanying consolidated statements of financial position of the Trustees of the Grand Charity Funds of the Grand Lodge of Iowa A.F. & A.M. (Iowa Masonic Health Facilities) (a non-profit organization) and affiliate as of July 31, 2012 and 2011, and the related consolidated statements of activities and cash flows for the years then ended. Notes to Financial Statements July 31, 2012 and 2011

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

**Consolidated Statement** 

The accompanying consolidated financial statements included the accounts of the Trustees of the Grand Charity Funds of the Grand Lodge of Iowa A.F. and A.M. and the Masonic Village, Inc. (collectively known as the Organization). Inter-entity transactions and balances have been eliminated in the consolidation.

The companies are consolidated since the Board of Trustees of the Grand Charity Funds of the Grand Lodge of Iowa A.F. & A.M. and the Board of Directors of Masonic Village, Inc. consist of the same individuals.

#### **Nature of Business**

Trustees of the Grand Charity Funds of the Lodge of Iowa A.F. and A.M. (Iowa Masonic Health Facilities) is an Iowa non-profit corporation that was established for the purpose of providing housing and health care nursing services to residents through operation of a 79 bed nursing facility. The nursing facility beds are dually certified for Medicare and Medicaid participation and include 18 beds that are licensed for residents with chronically confused and dementing illnesses (CCDI).

The Masonic Village, Inc. is an Iowa non-profit corporation that provides housing for senior citizens through the operation of a retirement facility containing 40 independent living apartments.

#### **Use of Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses, including functional allocations, during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### **Cash and Cash Equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents include certain investments in highly liquid debt instruments with original maturities of three months of less, excluding amounts whose use is limited by board designation.

#### **Resident Receivables**

Resident receivables are stated at the amount management expects to collect from outstanding balances. Management provides for probable uncollectible amounts through a provision for bad debt expenses and an adjustment to the valuation allowance based on its assessment of the current status of individual accounts. Balances that are still outstanding after management has used reasonable collection efforts are written off through a charge to the valuation allowance and a credit to the accounts receivable. Changes in the valuation allowance have not been material to the financial statements.

#### Assets Limited as to Use

Capital Improvements - Funds designated for capital improvements.

Field Financial Aid – Funds designated for funding Field Financial Aid distributions.

<u>Board Designated Funds</u> – Funds designated to be used at the discretion of the Board for specific purposes at Masonic Village, Inc.

<u>Charitable Assistance</u> – Funds designated to provide charitable assistance to residents of Masonic Village, Inc.

#### **Property and Equipment**

Property and equipment is stated at cost and is being depreciated by the straight-line method over the following estimated useful lives:

Buildings	5-40 Years
Land Improvements	5-40 Years
Equipment	3-20 Years

Depreciation expense for the years ended July 31, 2012 and 2011 was \$490,449 and \$476,683, respectively.

Additions and betterments of \$5,000 or more are capitalized, while maintenance and repairs that do not improve or extend useful lives of the respective assets are charged to operations when incurred. When property, plant, and equipment are sold or otherwise disposed of, the asset account and related accumulated depreciation account are relieved, and any gain or loss is included in operations.

#### Investments

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the consolidated statements of financial position. Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is included in operating income (loss) unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from operating income (loss) unless the investments are trading securities.

#### Refundable Advance Fees

For residents occupying independent living apartments under advance fee contracts, the Organization provides for a declining refundable advance fee amount based upon the length of the residency for residents occupying the apartments. The refundable amount will not decline to less than 50% of the deposit.

#### **Deferred Revenue from Advance Fees**

Fees paid by a resident upon entering into an advance fee contract, net of the portion thereof that is refundable to the resident, are recorded as deferred revenue and are amortized to income using the straight-line method over the contract term. Residents are also charged monthly apartment service fees for utilities, maintenance, and other services, which are recognized as revenue when the service is provided.

#### Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Organization has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Organization in perpetuity.

#### Operating Income (Loss)

The consolidated statements of activities include operating income (loss). Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from operating income (loss), consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets.)

#### Net Resident Service Revenue

Net resident service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amount from residents, third-party pavers, and others for services rendered.

Revenue from certain third-party payor agreements is subject to audit and retroactive adjustment. Provisions for estimated third-party payor settlements are provided in the period the related services rendered. Differences between the estimated amounts accrued and interim and final settlements are reported in operations in the year of settlement.

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretations. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term.

The Organization recognizes on the date services is rendered. The related expenses are estimated and accrued accordingly.

#### Contributions and Donor - Restricted Funds

The Organization reports gifts of cash and other assets at fair value as restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reflected as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying financial statements.

The Organization reports gifts of land, buildings, and equipment at fair value as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gift of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, the Organization reports expiration of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are place in service.

Contributions not restricted by donors are recorded as revenue in unrestricted net assets.

#### Contributed Services

Volunteers provide assistance to the Organization for its programs and other activities. No value has been assigned to these services and, as such, the value of these services is not reflected in the financial statements as revenue and expense.

#### Advertising

Advertising costs are expenses as incurred. Advertising expense totaled \$14,083 and \$11,278 for the years ended July 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively.

#### Income Taxes and Accounting for Uncertain Tax Positions

Trustees of the Grand Charity Funds of the Grand Lodge of Iowa A.F. & A.M. and Masonic Village, Inc. are non-profit organizations are exempt under Code Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Therefore, no provision for income taxes is presented in these consolidated financial statements.

The Organization has adopted the accounting standard regarding "Accounting for Uncertain Tax Positions." This standard provides detailed tax guidance for financial statement recognition measurement, and disclosure of uncertain tax positions recognized in the entity's financial statements. It requires an entity to recognize the financial statement benefit of a tax position when it is more likely than not that the position will be sustained upon examination. The adoption of this standard had no material effect on the Organization's financial position, results of operation, or cash flow. The Organization's Forms 990 for 2008, 2009, and 2010 are subject to examination by the IRS, generally for three years after they were filed.

#### Reclassifications

Certain items in the prior year's financial statement have been reclassified to conform with current year presentation. Such reclassifications have no effect on net income as previously stated.

#### NOTE 6 - PERMANENTLY RESTRICTED NET ASSETS

Permanently restricted net assets are assets that are endowed by the donor. The interest and dividend income from the Permanent Grand Charity Fund is required to be released annually to fund Field Financial Aid and the remaining interest and dividend income is restricted to the permanent fund. The interest income from the lowa Masonic Health Facilities Endowment is available for use in the operations of the Organization. #### NOTE 7 - ENDOWMENT

The Organization's Permanent Grand Charity Fund was established to provide Field Financial Aid to Masons in the State of lowa. The endowment consists of restricted endowment funds and the cumulative investment return on the funds after distribution of Field Financial Aid. The Organization's lowa Masonic Health Facilities Endowment was established to provide income to be used to support the operations of the Organization. The endowment consists of donor-restricted endowment funds. As required by generally accepted accounting principles, net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

#### Interpretation of Relevant Law

The Board of Directors and Trustees of the Organization has interpreted the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Organization classifies as permanently restricted net assets the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment. In accordance with the Masonic Code of Iowa, the undistributed income from the Permanent Grand Charity Funds is permanently restricted and the income from the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities Fund is unrestricted for operations.

#### Return Objectives and Risk Parameters

The Organization has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide grow a stream of funding for programs supported by its endowments.

#### Strategies Employed for Achieving Objectives

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, the Organization relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both unrealized gains and interest and dividends.

#### Spending Policy

Ninety percent of the earnings from the Permanent Grand Charity Fund are to be used for Field Financial Aid which is distributed through the approval of applications by the Board of Directors. These funds are to be used to support the cause of all Grand Lodge charity other than the operation and maintenance of the nursing facility, as approved by the Board of Directors. The remaining 10% of earnings is to be retained in the fund. All earnings from the lowa Masonic Health Facilities Endowment are available for the operations of the Organization.

#### NOTE 8 - REFUNDABLE ADVANCE FEES AND DEFERRED REVENUE FROM ADVANCE FEES

Residents of Masonic Village, Inc. may either lease apartment units or pay an advance fee, which allows the resident lifetime residency rights to a specific apartment unit.

A portion of the advance refundable deposit is refundable to the resident. The refundable fee becomes non-refundable at a rate of 20% the first year and 5% each following year of the base amount not to decrease below 50% of the base refundable amount. Refunds are made subject to the residency requirement.

#### **NOTE 9 - RETIREMENT PLAN**

The Organization provides a 401(k) plan for its employees. The Plan covers all employees age 21 and older and worked at least 1,000 hours during the year. The Organization contributes 5% of gross compensation for all eligible employees and matches 50% of the first 2% of employee contributions. Vesting of employer contributions is based on years of service. During the years ended July 31, 2012 and 2011 employer contributions totaled \$157,315 and \$154,850, respectively and have been charged to salaries and benefits on the consolidated statements of activities.

#### NOTE 11 - CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

Most of the Organization's business activity is with residents of the facility. Trustees of the Grand Charity Funds of the Grand Lodge of Iowa A.F. and A.M. (Iowa Masonic Health Facilities) are under a contractual agreement with the Iowa Department of Human Services as a licensed provider of Title XIX care (Medicaid). Revenue received from this source approximated \$2,114,000 and \$2,149,000 for the years ended July 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively. Receivables from the Iowa Department of Human Services on behalf of residents at July 31, 2012 and 2011 were \$154,004 and \$128,915, respectively.

The Organization is also under a contractual agreement with the Department of Health and Human Services – Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services as a licensed provider of Title XVIII (Medicare). Revenue received from this source approximated \$738,000 and \$575,000 for the years ended July 31, 2012 and 2011 respectively. Receivables from Medicare on behalf of residents at July 31, 2012 and 2011 were \$155,309 and \$167,092, respectively.

The Organization has funds deposited in certain banks, which at times exceed the FDIC Insurance provided in these banks of \$250,000 at July 31, 2012 and 2011. The increase of the FDIC insurance of up to \$250,000 is in effect through December 31, 2013 and is subject to change. At July 31, 2012 and 2011, the amount in excess of the FDIC Insurance totaled \$156,134 and \$1.299.188, respectively.

At July 31, 2012 and 2011, the Organization had assets limited as to use and investments with a fair value approximate fair value of \$6,693,897 and \$5,546,924, respectively, which are subject to the market risks inherent in the individual investments.

#### NOTE 12 - CONCENTRATION IN STATE MEDICAID PROGRAM

The Organization has all of its nursing beds designated for care of patients under the state's Medicaid program. The current funding of that program is 30 days behind filed claims. The current state budget has no provision for reducing the lag, and the proposed budget for next year includes no assurance of increased funding.

#### NOTE 13 - THIRD PARTY RATE ADJUSTMENTS AND REVENUE

Revenue from the Medicaid program accounted for approximately 38% and 41% of total net resident service revenue for the years ended July 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively. Revenue from the Medicare program accounted for approximately 13% and 11% of total net resident service revenue for the years ended July 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively. Laws and regulations governing the Medicaid and Medicare programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term.

#### NOTE 14 - SUBSEQUENT EVENT

The date to which events occurring after July 31, 2012, the date of the most recent statement of financial position, have been evaluated for possible adjustment to the financial statements or disclosure is November 21, 2011, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Our audits were conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the consolidated financial statements as a whole. The consolidating information in Schedules I and II is presented for the purpose of additional analysis of the consolidated financial statements rather than to present the financial position, results of operations, and cash flows of the individual organizations, and it is not a required part of the consolidated financial statements. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the financial position, results of operations, and cash flows of the individual organizations.

Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the consolidated financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the consolidated financial statements or to the consolidated financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures inn accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the consolidating information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the consolidated financial statements as a whole.

#### HERMAN L. ROWLEY MEMORIAL TRUST (Rowley Masonic Community) Notes to Financial Statements July 31, 2012 and 2011

#### NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Organization

Herman L. Rowley Memorial Trust (the Organization) is an lowa nonprofit corporation and was established by the Estate of Herman L. Rowley for the purpose of operating a Masonic Home for worthy and needy Masons in good standing. The Organization operates Rowley Memorial Masonic Home which consists of a 12 unit independent senior living apartment complex, 9 other independent living units and 60-bed nursing unit\. The nursing beds are dually certified for Medicare and Medicaid participation.

Rowley Masonic Home Health Care, LLC, a wholly owned subsidiary of Herman L. Rowley Memorial Trust, is a limited liability company established for the purpose of providing home health services to the residents of the community. The financial activity related to Rowley Masonic Home Health, LLC is included with the financial activity of Herman L. Rowley Memorial Trust.

#### **Use of Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses, including functional allocations, during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include certain investments in highly liquid debt instruments with original maturities of three months or less, excluding amounts whose use is limited by bond indentures or trust agreements.

#### Resident Receivables

Resident receivables are stated at the amount management expects to collect from outstanding balances. Management provides for probable uncollectible amounts through a provision for bad debt expenses and an adjustment to a valuation allowance based on its assessment of the current status of individual accounts. Balances that are still outstanding after management has used reasonable collection efforts are written off through a charge to the valuation allowance and a credit to accounts receivable. Changes in the valuation allowance have not been material to the financial statements.

#### Investments

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the statements of financial position. Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest and dividends) is included in the operating income (loss) unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from operating income (loss) unless the investments are trading securities.

#### Assets Limited as to Use

Bond Fund – This fund consists of funds set aside for the payment of principal and interest on the Organization's bond issuance.

Reserve Fund – This fund consists of funds set aside in accordance with the bond document.

#### **Property and Equipment**

Property and equipment is stated at cost and is being depreciated by the straight-line method over the following estimated useful lives:

Buildings	5-40 Years
Equipment	3-20 Years

Depreciation expense for the years ended July 31, 2011 and 2010 was \$261,167 and \$252,730, respectively.

Additions and betterments of \$5,000 or more are capitalized, while maintenance and repairs that do not improve or extend the useful lives of the respective assets are charged to operations when incurred. When property, plant and equipment are sold or otherwise disposed of, the asset account and related accumulated depreciation account are relieved, and any gain or loss is included in operations.

#### **Bond Issuance Costs**

The costs associated with the issuance of debt are amortized using the straight-line method, which approximates the effective interest method, over the term of the related financing agreement. Amortization expense associated with deferred financing costs was \$2,027 for both years ended July 31, 2012 and 2011.

#### Refundable Advance Fees

The Organization provides for a declining refundable amount based upon the length of the residency. The amount will not decline to less than 50% of the deposit.

#### Deferred Revenue from Advance Fees

Fees paid by a resident upon entering an apartment contract, net of the portion thereof that is refundable to the resident, are recorded as deferred revenue and are amortized to income using the straight-line method over the estimated remaining life expectancy of the resident.

#### Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Organization has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Organization in perpetuity.

#### Operating Income (Loss)

The statements of activities include operating income (loss). Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from operating income (loss), consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets.)

#### Net Resident Service Revenue

Net resident service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from residents, third-party payors, and others for services rendered.

Revenue from certain third-party payor agreements is subject to audit and retroactive adjustment. Provisions for estimated third-party payor settlements are provided in the period the related services are rendered. Differences between the estimated amounts accrued and interim and final settlements are reported in operations in the year of settlement.

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term.

The Organization recognizes revenue on the date service is rendered. The related expenses are estimated and accrued accordingly.

#### Contributions and Donor-Restricted Funds

The Organization reports gifts of cash and other assets at fair value as restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reflected as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying financial statements.

The Organization reports gifts of land, buildings, and equipment at fair value as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used, and gifts of cash or other assets that much be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, the Organization reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Contributions not restricted by donors are recorded as revenue in unrestricted assets.

#### **Contributed Services**

Volunteers provide assistance to the Organization for its programs and other activities. No value has been assigned to these services and, as such, the value of these services is not reflected in the financial statements as revenue and expense.

#### Advertising

Advertising costs are expensed as incurred. Advertising expense totaled \$18,403 and \$16,134 for the years ended July 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively.

#### Income Taxes

The Herman L. Rowley Memorial Trust is exempt under Code Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Rowley Masonic Home Health Care, LLC has been organized as a limited liability company and is exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Therefore, no provision for income taxes is presented in these financial statements.

The Organization has adopted the accounting standard regarding "Accounting for Uncertain Tax Positions". This standard provides detailed guidance for financial statement recognition measurements, and disclosure of uncertain tax positions recognized in the entity's financial statements. It requires an entity to recognize the financial statement benefit of a tax position when it is more likely than not that the position will be sustained upon examination. The adoption of this standard had no material effect on the Organization's financial position, results of operations, or cash flow. The Organization's Forms 990 for 2008, 2008, and 2010 are subject to examination by the IRS, generally for three years after they were filed.

#### Reclassifications

Certain items in the prior year's financial statements have been reclassified to conform with current year presentation. Such reclassifications have no effect on net income as previously stated.

Financial Accounting Standards Board for Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures, established a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. This hierarchy consists of three broad levels: Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority, and Level 3 inputs have the lowest priority. The Organization uses appropriate valuation techniques based on the available inputs to measure the fair value of its investments. When available, the Organization measures fair value using Level 1 inputs because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value.

#### Level 1 Fair Value Measurements

Fair values for assets limited as to use and investments are determined by reference to quoted market prices and other relevant information generated by market transactions.

#### Level 2 Fair Value Measurements

Valuation is based upon quoted prices for similar instruments in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar instruments in markets that are not active, and model-based valuation techniques for which all significant assumptions are observable in the market.

#### NOTE 4 - TEMPORARILY RESTRICTED NET ASSETS

Total interest expense incurred for the years ended July 31, 2012 and 2011 were \$177,467 and \$180,150, all of which was charge to operations.

#### NOTE 6 - CHARITABLE REMAINDER ANNUITY TRUST

Total Long-Term Debt

The Organization is the beneficiary and trustee of the Lankenau Charitable Remainder Annuity Trust. A charitable remainder trust provides the payment of the distributions to the grantor or other designated beneficiaries over the Trust's term (usually the designated beneficiary's lifetime). At the end of the Trust's term, the remaining assets are available for the Organization's use. The portion of the Trust attributable to the present value of the future benefits to be received by the Organization was recorded in the Statements of Activities as a temporarily restricted contribution in the period the Trust was established. Assets held in the charitable remainder annuity trust totaled \$191,238 and \$214,601 at July 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively, and are reported as fair market value in the Organization's Statement of Financial Position. On an annual basis, the Organization revalues the liability to make distributions to the designated beneficiaries on actuarial assumptions. The present value of the estimated future payments (\$156,860 and \$173,800 at July 31, 2012 and July 31, 2011, respectively) is calculated using a discount rate of 7%.

#### NOTE 7 - REFUNDABLE FEES AND DEFERRED REVENUE FROM ADVANCE FEES

Residents of the apartments sign various agreements. In some of the agreements the resident is required to make an advance fee prior to occupying quarters. The unit agreement provides for a refund of the resident's advance fee as follows:

#### Contracts After March 28, 1997

The Organization has units that are provided to individuals or couples through contractual agreements. The contract provides for the use of a unit until the person dies or moves to the nursing facility. The agreement requires a one time non-refundable fee, a refundable payment (base amount) which become non-refundable, and a monthly service charge and property tax payment. The refundable fee becomes non-refundable at 7% a year of the base amount not to decrease below 50% of the base refundable amount.

#### Contracts Before March 28, 1997

Contracts written before March 28, 1997 provides for the use of a unit until the person dies or moves to the nursing facility. The agreement requires a one time non-refundable fee, a refundable payment (base amount) which becomes non-refundable, a monthly service charge, and property tax payment. The refundable fee becomes non-refundable at an amount agreed to by the parties.

#### **NOTE 8 - MINERAL RIGHTS**

The Organization owns mineral rights to property located in Oklahoma. The property has not been explored; therefore no value has been recorded in the financial statements. During the year ended July 31, 2010, the Organization entered into an oil and gas agreement and received \$500 per mineral acre for 160 mineral acres for a total of \$80,000 that is included in other income on the statement of activities. The amount received grants the exploration company the sole and exclusive right to explore by geophysical and other methods, mining and operating for oil and gas, and for laying pipe lines. The agreement shall remain in force for through November 25, 2012 and as long thereafter as oil or gas is produced from the property. The agreement provides that the Organization will receive 18.75% of gross proceeds from any production of oil and gas from the property. There was no production during the years ended July 31, 2012 or 2011.

#### **NOTE 10 - RETIREMENT PLAN**

The Organization sponsors a 401(k) plan that covers all employees who have attained the age of 21 and have earned one year of service as defined by the Plan. Employees may elect to defer up to 19% of their compensation, subject to statutory limits. For all eligible employees, the Organization will contribute 5% of gross compensation and provide a matching contribution of up to 50% of the first 2% of employee contributions. Vesting of employer contributions is based on years of service. During the years ended July 31, 2012 and 2011, employer contributions totaled \$109,179 and \$103,452, respectively.

#### NOTE 11 - CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

Most of the Organization's business activity is with residents of the facility. Herman L. Rowley Memorial Trust is under a contractual agreement with the lowa Department of Human Services as a licensed provider of Title XIX care (Medicaid). Revenue received from this source approximated \$1,234,000 and \$1,314,000 for the years ended July 31, 2012 and 2011. Receivables from the lowa Department of Human Services on behalf of residents at July 31, 2012 and 2011 were \$81,140 and \$79,648, respectively.

Herman L. Rowley Memorial Trust is also under a contractual agreement with the Department of Health and Human Services – Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services as a licensed provider of Title XVIII care (Medicare). Revenue received from this source approximated \$34,000 and \$78,000 for the years ended July 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively. Receivables from Medicare on behalf of residents at July 31, 2012 and 2011 were \$14,096 and \$20.757, respectively.

At July 31, 2012 and 2011, the Organization had investments and assets limited as to use and a charitable remainder trust with a fair value of \$4,480,548 and \$4,322,933, respectively, which are not federally insured and are subject to the market risks inherent in the individual investments.

#### NOTE 12 - CONCENTRATION IN STATE MEDICAID PROGRAM

The Organization has all of its nursing beds designated for care of patients under the state's Medicaid program. The current funding of that program is 30 days behind filed claims. The current state budget has no provision for reducing that lag, and the proposed budget for next year includes no assurance of increased funding.

#### NOTE 13 - THIRD PARTY RATE ADJUSTMENTS AND REVENUE

Revenue from the Medicaid program accounted for approximately 33% and 37% of total net resident service revenue for the years ended July 31, 2012 and 2011. Revenue from the Medicare program accounted for approximately 1% and 3% of total net resident service revenue for the years ended July 31, 2012 and 2011, respectively. Laws and regulations governing the Medicaid and Medicare programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that the recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term.

#### NOTE 14 - SUBSEQUENT EVENT

The date to which events occurring after July 31, 2012, the date of the most recent statement of financial position, have been evaluated for possible adjustment to the financial statements or disclosure is October 9, 2012, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

#### REPORT OF THE LODGE SERVICE COMMITTEE

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

The Lodge Service Committee has been very pleased to support Grand Master Jerry L. Levay in promoting his motto throughout the year "Masonry and the Military – Hand in Hand Since 1776 – Saluting Those Who Serve." The Committee has actively assisted lodges by providing educational materials using a wide variety of methods. These include but are not limited to assisting with the Grand Master Area Meetings, Ashlar and Master Builder Award Programs, Golden Trowel Award, Lodge of the Year Award, Neighborhood Area Meetings, speakers on a variety of topics, web presence, printed material and personal visits to lodges. Meeting the needs of lodges and helping them engage their members is our primary concern.

We are experiencing very good participation and great results from the following programs:

Ashlar Award/New Mason of the Year Award-helps to enroll a new Brother into his lodge by setting criteria and expectations for the new Mason. It teaches the benefits of becoming an involved active member of a lodge. It also assists the lodge by requiring them to be responsible to their new members.

Master Builder Award-helps to enroll brothers into their lodge by setting criteria which includes lodge, family and community involvement.

Golden Trowel Award – is laden with service opportunities to the lodge, community and Fraternity as a whole. It is difficult to achieve by design, but the satisfaction obtained by the journey to achieve it will repay the effort.

As of the writing of this report we have received 19 applications for the Ashlar Award and 11 for the Master Builder Award.

We continue to increase our web presence by working with the Technology Committee to update and increase the materials available online including a catalog of educational program materials, Masonic music, PowerPoint presentations, the catalog of Masonic Books in the Iowa Masonic Library, and links to many other available Masonic resources. The digitization of the article level index for the collection of Masonic periodicals is progressing and it is hoped to be available online by 2013.

The Committee assisted Grand Master Levay in facilitating, coordinating and presenting 12 Area Meetings across the jurisdiction in October and November. The main theme of the meetings was, "Saluting Those Who Serve." The meetings began by showing a video "Red Skelton's Pledge of Allegiance" followed by a video of the combined choirs of the Armed Services Academies and U.S. Army Herald Trumpets performing the Star Spangled Banner. Presentations were given on

Honoring Our Masonic Widows; DeMolay; Leaving a Legacy (recording the history of your lodge); and Masonic Symbolism. The Grand Master then wrapped-up the meetings talking about his military experiences, personally presenting patches to those who served in the military and giving them each his heartfelt thank you for their service. The meetings concluded with a short video by "Ben Franklin." There were 128 lodges represented with a total attendance of 360 or an average of 30 per meeting. The materials were well presented and enthusiastically received.

On February 10 and 11 the "lowa Conference on Masonic Education" was held in Cedar Rapids. On Friday afternoon tours were provided at the lowa Masonic Library and Museums. The Brothers then gathered at the Scottish Rite Center for a steak dinner and a talk by Brother Cliff Porter on "The Form of a Lodge: Creating a Fulfilling Lodge Experience." Saturday registration opened at 7:30 a.m. and the meetings concluded at 4:00 p.m. Presentations were given by Chad Simpson – "Symbolism of the Third Degree"; Jons Olsson – "Square and Compass Beats Rifles and Cannon"; George Harrison – "Masonic Symbolism Course"; Ryan Broderson – "The Temple of Solomon" and Cliff Porter – "The Secret Psychology of Freemasonry." Grand Master Levay finished up by talking about his theme, "Masonry and the Military – Hand in Hand Since 1776". There were approximately 150 attendees and all agreed that it was a wonderful day filled with Masonic education, enlightenment, great food, and fellowship.

The committee conducted a series of 17 Neighborhood Area Meetings in April. The topics were:

"How do the members of your lodge put their Masonry into practice?"

"Does fellowship impact the mentoring of a new Brother?" "Lodge finances and financial planning."

The meetings were conducted as a facilitated round table discussion group. The discussions were lively and informative. There were many examples given of how brothers practice Masonry, the large impact fellowship has in the mentoring process, the importance of having a lodge budget and finding outside sources for funding.

A mailing of educational material was sent to the lodges on April containing 9 articles suitable for presentation at lodge meetings. The titles were "An Empty Life", "Analysis of the Number Symbolism in the Middle Chamber Lecture of the Fellow Craft Degree of Freemasonry", "Five Points Of Fellowship", "Masonry in Ancient China", "On Presenting the Lambskin Apron", "Some Notes on the Iowa Masonic Library's Sibelius Manuscript", "STS Johns Days In Masonry", "Understanding", and "Who Was Hiram King Of Tyre." These materials were also posted on the Grand Lodge website as downloadable PDF files.

A Leadership Symposium was held on June 30, 2012 at the Des Moines Scottish Rite Center. There were outstanding Masonic speakers throughout the day, Bob Davis, Brent Morris, Chris Hodapp and Thomas Wilkerson. The Lodge Service Committee gave presentations on preplanning to become Worshipful Master, duties of lodge officers, lodge activities, how to conduct a meeting, the importance of a knowledge of the Masonic Code of Iowa, and proper investigation of a candidate for the Degrees. There were nearly 150 Masons in attendance and all agreed it was a very rewarding experience filled with good information.

To the members of the Lodge Service Committee; your commitment, resourcefulness, giving, caring, selflessness and love for our Craft which inspires you to go beyond what is expected and do the many things that help our great Fraternity to prosper, for assisting lodges to grow and prosper and for traveling the many miles it takes to make these things possible, Thank You. You are an inspiration!

In conclusion, Masonic Education is an integral part of the tradition of our great Fraternity. The members of the Lodge Service Committee are committed to the success of the Masonic Fraternity in Iowa and we will continue to go the "extra mile" to help fulfill the needs of Iowa Lodges and their members.

The Grand Lodge of Iowa 401(k) Retirement Plan is audited by Honkamp, Krueger & Co. P.C., CPA firm. The Plan operates on a fiscal year basis with fiscal year ending August 31. The current audit and all previous audits are on file with the Grand Secretary's office in Cedar Rapids.

#### REPORT OF SCHOLARSHIP SELECTION COMMITTEE

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

The Grand Lodge Scholarship Program was established in 1970 to promote the continued education of deserving graduates from lowa's public high schools and since that time has awarded 1865 scholarships with a total value of \$2,710,900.

Each year, the trustees of the Iowa Masonic Scholarship Endowment Fund determine not only the number of scholarships to be awarded under this program, but also the dollar amount of these scholarships. It is then the responsibility of the Scholarship Selection Committee to initiate those procedures that result in the selection of scholarship recipients. The committee was informed that the Grand Lodge of Iowa could award sixty (60) - \$2000 scholarships in the year 2012.

In September, informational brochures and applications were sent to the guidance department of each public high school within the state. The counselors were asked to inform eligible students about the Grand Lodge Scholarship Program. Also in September, copies of these same materials were sent to the Worshipful Master of each subordinate lodge asking his lodge's help in promoting the scholarship program within the community. Additionally the applications and informational brochures available on the Grand Lodge web site. Due to lowa Masonic Scholarship Endowment Fund Trust and IRS rules, no advantage can be given for applicants with a Masonic affiliation nor are they restricted to race, creed, color, sex, or national origin.

By the time of the February 10 closing date, the committee had received 831 applications. Each application was carefully read and evaluated. Broad-based criteria are used in the selection process. An applicant's academic record, communication skills, and financial need are carefully considered. Service to school and community with special emphasis upon leadership roles in these areas also has considerable weight. This is because the Grand Lodge of lowa is particularly looking for those students who have exhibited the greatest potential to be not only of

service to their communities in the future, but also, to be leaders in these communities. Early in March the committee selected 72 finalists to be interviewed at four locations across the State. These interviews were conducted in Cedar Rapids at the Iowa Masonic Library on April 11, in Exira at Exodus Lodge No. 342 on April 12, in Des Moines at South Gate Lodge No. 657 on April 13, and in Reinbeck at Coin Lodge No. 394 on April 14. Special thanks to the host organizations for their support during the interviews. At the conclusion of the interviews, the following students were selected to receive \$2000 scholarships:

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

The Masonic Charitable Educational Corporation Scholarship Selection Committee, with assistance from Karen Davies at the Grand Secretary's office, has completed its work for this year.

As in past years eligibility is open only to students planning to attend one of the fifteen lowa Community Colleges, and then only if they were enrolling in a two year course and not planning to use the community college for the first two years of a four year degree.

# IOWA MASONIC LIBRARY AND MUSEUMS BUILDING ENDOWMENT FUND NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### NOTE 1. Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies

lowa Masonic Library and Museums Building Endowment Fund (the "Fund") is a non-profit corporation organized under the laws of lowa and Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Fund's operations consist of activities intended to further the educational, literary and charitable purposes of the lowa Masonic Library and Museum by providing funds from the Endowment to maintain and improve the facilities of the Library and Museum. Support is obtained through contributions.

The significant accounting policies of the Organization are as follows:

#### **Basis of Accounting**

The Fund operates on a fiscal year beginning July 1 and ending June 30. The financial records and reports of the Fund are maintained on the accrual basis of accounting. Under the accrual method of accounting, revenue is recognized as earned, and expenses are

recorded as incurred. The accounting policies relative to the carrying value of assets are disclosed in the footnotes to the financial statements.

#### **Basis of Presentation**

A trust fund was established by the Grand Lodge of Iowa of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons in September 1994. A successor entity was incorporated in the State of Iowa on November 23, 1998 and the assets of the trust fund were transferred to the new corporation effective September 1, 1999. The Fund's assets and operations were previously included in the financial statements of the Grand Lodge of Iowa Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons. The Grand Lodge members approved the termination of the original Trust Agreement which eliminated the economic interest between the two organizations.

The Fund reports under the provisions of Statement of Financial Accounting Standards ASC Topic 958, "Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations".

Under these provisions, net assets and revenues, expenses, gains, and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets of the Organization and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Unrestricted Net Assets: Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations.

**Temporarily Restricted Net Assets:** Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that may or will be met either by actions of the Fund and/or the passage of time. The Organization has no temporarily restricted net assets for the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011.

**Permanently Restricted Net Assets:** Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that neither expire by passage of time, nor can be met by actions of the Organization. The Organization has no permanently restricted net assets for the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011.

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Fund considers cash, other demand deposits, and money market accounts as cash and cash equivalents.

#### Support and Revenue

Contributions are generally available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor. Unconditional promises to give are recorded as received. Unconditional promises to give due in the next year are reflected as current promises to give and are recorded at their net realizable value. The majority of the promises to give are received from a broad base of contributors.

Contributions received by the Fund under irrevocable split-interest agreements are recorded at their fair value when received. The date when the Fund is considered to receive an irrevocable split-interest agreement depends on whether the Fund or a third party is the trustee for the agreement. If the Fund is the trustee or fiscal agent of the assets, the gift is considered received (and the split-interest agreement is recorded) when the donor executes the agreement. If an unrelated third party (such as a bank, trust company or private individual) is the trustee or fiscal agent of the assets, the Fund records the split-interest agreement when it is notified of the gift's existence.

If the Fund holds or controls the assets contributed under an irrevocable split-interest agreement, it (1) records the assets received at their fair value, (2) records a liability for any portion of the assets that are held for the donor or other beneficiary equal to the present value of the expected future payments to be made to the donor or other beneficiary, and (3) records contribution revenue for the difference between the fair value of the assets received and the liability incurred.

The Fund is reliant primarily upon contributions from members of Masonic Lodges chartered by the Grand Lodge of Iowa, A.F. & A.M., most of whom are Iowa residents.

#### Investments

Investments are carried at fair value, determined by quoted market prices, with unrealized and realized gains and losses on investments reported as increases or decreases in unrestricted or temporarily restricted net assets based upon donor-imposed restrictions.

Investment income is also reported in the statement of activities as increases in unrestricted or temporarily restricted net assets. See Note 6 for discussion on fair value measurements.

#### **Income Taxes**

The Fund is exempt from federal income tax as an organization described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC) and has also been determined not to be a private foundation under Section 509(a)(2) of the IRC. The Fund is also exempt from state income tax

Management has determined that the Fund does not have any uncertain tax positions and associated unrecognized benefits that materially impact the financial statements or related disclosures. Since tax matters are subject to some degree of uncertainty, there can be no assurance that the Fund's tax returns will not be challenged by the taxing authorities and that the Fund will not be subject to additional tax, penalties, and interest as a result of such challenge. Generally, the Fund is no long subject to income tax examinations by the U.S. federal, state, or local tax authorities for years before 2007.

#### **Use of Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities arid disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements. Estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenue and expense during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### NOTE 3. Annuities Payable under Split-Interest Agreements

The Fund is required, under split-interest agreements to make annual payments to the donors over the donors' lives. The liability for the amount payable to the donors is calculated based upon acceptable life expectancy tables and an interest rate agreed to by the parties.

The liability is adjusted periodically to reflect changes in the life expectancy of the annuitant. Assets recognized under split-interest agreements are included in investments and totaled \$8,865 for the years ended June 30, 2012 and 2011, respectively.

#### NOTE 4. Concentration of Credit Risk

Financial instruments which subject the Fund to concentrations of credit risk consist primarily of investments in long-term corporate and governmental fixed income instruments, equity holdings of domestic corporations, money market accounts, and mutual funds. The Fund maintains cash in banks, which may, at times, exceed the \$250,000 federally insured limit. Management believes the credit risk related to the uninsured balance is minimal.

#### NOTE 5. Contributions Receivable from Charitable Remainder Unitrust

The Fund is named as a remainder beneficiary in a Charitable Remainder Unitrust which was established in May 2005. The Organization will receive \$250,000 upon the death of the donor and the donor's son. The discounted present value of the unconditional promise to give is included in contributions receivable.

#### NOTE 6. Fair Value Measurements

FASB Codification Topic 820 establishes a framework for measuring fair value which provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. ## IOWA MASONIC LIBRARY AND MUSEUMS BUILDING ENDOWMENT FUND NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### NOTE 1. Nature of Business and Significant Accounting Policies

lowa Masonic Library and Museums Building Endowment Fund (the "Fund") is a non-profit corporation organized under the laws of lowa and Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Fund's operations consist of activities intended to further the educational, literary and charitable purposes of the lowa Masonic Library and Museum by providing funds from the Endowment to maintain and improve the facilities of the Library and Museum. Support is obtained through contributions.

The significant accounting policies of the Organization are as follows:

#### **Basis of Accounting**

The Fund operates on a fiscal year beginning July 1 and ending June 30. The financial records and reports of the Fund are maintained on the accrual basis of accounting. Under the accrual method of accounting, revenue is recognized as earned, and expenses are recorded as incurred. The accounting policies relative to the carrying value of assets are disclosed in the footnotes to the financial statements.

#### **Basis of Presentation**

A trust fund was established by the Grand Lodge of Iowa of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons in September 1994. A successor entity was incorporated in the State of Iowa on November 23, 1998 and the assets of the trust fund were transferred to the new corporation effective September 1, 1999. The Fund's assets and operations were previously included in the financial statements of the Grand Lodge of Iowa Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons. The Grand Lodge members approved the termination of the original Trust Agreement which eliminated the economic interest between the two organizations.

The Fund reports under the provisions of Statement of Financial Accounting Standards ASC Topic 958, "Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations".

Under these provisions, net assets and revenues, expenses, gains, and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets of the Organization and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Unrestricted Net Assets: Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations.

**Temporarily Restricted Net Assets:** Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that may or will be met either by actions of the Fund and/or the passage of time. The Organization has no temporarily restricted net assets for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010.

**Permanently Restricted Net Assets:** Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that neither expire by passage of time, nor can be met by actions of the Organization. The Organization has no permanently restricted net assets for the years ended June 30, 2011 and 2010.

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Fund considers cash, other demand deposits, and money market accounts as cash and cash equivalents.

#### Support and Revenue

Contributions are generally available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor. Unconditional promises to give are recorded as received. Unconditional promises to give due in the next year are reflected as current promises to give and are recorded at their net realizable value. The majority of the promises to give are received from a broad base of contributors.

Contributions received by the Fund under irrevocable split-interest agreements are recorded at their fair value when received. The date when the Fund is considered to receive an irrevocable split-interest agreement depends on whether the Fund or a third party is the trustee for the agreement. If the Fund is the trustee or fiscal agent of the assets, the gift is

considered received (and the split-interest agreement is recorded) when the donor executes the agreement. If an unrelated third party (such as a bank, trust company or private individual) is the trustee or fiscal agent of the assets, the Fund records the split-interest agreement when it is notified of the gift's existence.

If the Fund holds or controls the assets contributed under an irrevocable split-interest agreement, it (1) records the assets received at their fair value, (2) records a liability for any portion of the assets that are held for the donor or other beneficiary equal to the present value of the expected future payments to be made to the donor or other beneficiary, and (3) records contribution revenue for the difference between the fair value of the assets received and the liability incurred.

The Fund is reliant primarily upon contributions from members of Masonic Lodges chartered by the Grand Lodge of Iowa, A.F. & A.M., most of whom are Iowa residents.

#### Investments

#### REPORT OF THE AD HOC MASONIC ACADEMY COMMITTEE

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

Report of the Iowa Academy of Knowledge spent the past year promoting the Course on Symbolism commissioned by Grand Master Jerry L. Levay. In the process of the promotion some 300 booklets containing all necessary materials to those brethren who took the time to attend one of the Grand Master's Area Meetings and the Grand Lodge Education session conducted at the Grand Lodge Library in February 2012. A

number of study clubs were formed around the state and continue to use the materials to bring further light in Masonry to the participants.

The Academy has several brethren pursuing the Masonic Scholar Level. There is much more work to be done. The registration problems have not been corrected and the requirements remain unclear. These should be among the primary goals for the committee in the next Grand Lodge year.

Committee recommendations for 2012-13 include merging the Technology Committee and Academy more closely, with the Tech providing the platform and the Academy the content. Iowa Research Lodge No. 2 could work to help develop more interesting courses and to provide mentors to participants. The IRL #2 could also provide a platform for presenting papers and selecting an Academy Mason of the Year program. The Academy should strive to present educational format at Grand Lodge, possibly a volunteer Dutch treat education breakfast.

Legislation should be introduced to make the Academy a permanent Grand Lodge committee. Our forefathers voted \$5 for books at our first Grand Session. That \$5 turned into our current Grand Lodge Library. It was here in Iowa where the National Masonic Research Society and the Masonic Service Association had their birth. Its use by us will give Iowa the opportunity to become the Mecca of Masonic Education in the 21st century as it was in the beginning of the 20th century.

### REPORT OF THE AD HOC IOWA MASONIC MODEL STUDENT ASSISTANCE COMMITTEE

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

The National Masonic Foundation for Children was established in 1986 to promote student assistance programs in schools, particularly the Masonic Model Student Assistance Program, in an effort to prevent addiction and destructive behaviors.

The mission of the National Masonic Foundation for Children is to offer the Masonic Model Student Assistance Program (MMSAP) to schools in our communities to help the youth of this country towards productive, successful and healthy lives.

Freemasonry has a centuries-old tradition of helping the most vulnerable in our society, including the very young, and NMFC builds on that tradition. There is a greater need today than ever before for assistance to children in helping them become responsible adults. These children face numerous challenges, such as: broken homes, patterns of substance abuse in families, and a complex world with many traditional nurturing customs either missing or broken.

As Masons, we hold fast to the belief that our children are our future and must do what we can if we are to expect them to grow up to be happy, healthy, productive stewards of our future.

The Masonic Model Student Assistance Program (MMSAP) is the flagship program of the National Masonic Foundation for Children. Through MMSAP, intensive workshops are offered to schools, usually at

no cost to them. These workshops train teachers how to identify, intervene with and create appropriate referrals for students who may be at risk for substance abuse, depression, suicide, violence, or bullying.

Behavior patterns of students can often provide a window into the potential for the aforementioned risks. MMSAP training helps teachers identify subtle patterns, or shifts in behavior patterns, which may indicate looming problems. The best way to treat these problems is through prevention.

Within the last year, MMSAP has incorporated a one-day bullying program into their curriculum. Bullying has emerged as a national priority, affecting kids from every corner of our country. Far too many incidents of teen suicide have occurred everywhere, many having been caused directly by bullying. Unfortunately, for many kids, the only relief from bullying that they can think of is suicide. Every day in America, five children take their own lives. No area is immune, as we unfortunately witnessed in lowa on more than one occasion this past year.

MMSAP training is designed to teach concrete, immediate and experimental prevention and intervention skills that deal with the issues of conflict, anger, and bullying. Educators learn the triggers of conflict and anger; they examine various conflict styles and explore possible root causes. The participants in MMSAP training learn concrete steps to problem solving and conflict mediation and leave their training with individual student interventions and a plan of action to take back to their school districts. MMSAP is a time-tested, proven approach, taught to educators by educators, to overcome many of the problems faced by our youth.

In lowa, we have approached several school districts of varying population in an attempt to host our first MMSAP Training. While all of the districts see value in the program, the main obstacle continues to be finding acceptable scheduling. If the session is held during the school year, many districts have a difficult time finding enough substitute teachers to fill in for those participating in the training. If held during vacation, there seems to be a belief among the administrators we talked to about getting teachers to attend.

The Iowa Masonic Model Student Assistance Program Committee will continue our attempts to find a suitable location for the inaugural event and proceed from that point forward. The stakes are simply too great and this program too successful elsewhere to delay its inception in Iowa any longer.

#### REPORT OF THE IOWA MASONIC LIBRARY ASSOCIATION

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

The Directors of the Iowa Masonic Library Association met at the Iowa Masonic Library on November 14, 2011. Those in attendance were: President John M. Klaus, P.G.T.; Jack L. Butler, P.G.M.; Duane S. Munson, P.G.T.; Dennis M. Zahrt, P.G.M.; Craig L. Davis, P.G.M.; Bryce B. Hildreth, P.J.G.W.; Bill V. Northup; Assistant Librarian William R. Kreuger; Deputy Grand Secretary Tim S. Anderson; and Grand Secretary William R. Crawford. Grand Treasurer Shane A. Harshbarger was also present.

Russell Nieland of Robert W. Baird & Co. met with the Directors, performed a fiduciary review, and discussed the investments and cash flow needs of the Association.

Treasurer Duane S. Munson presented his report for the fiscal year ending August 31, 2011. The report showed investments valued at \$653,187, plus cash of \$22,885.65, for the Association's total asset value of \$676,072.65 as of that date.

Assistant Librarian William R. Krueger gave the annual report on the Library and its usage. All Masons are encouraged to read the Grand Librarian's Report to learn of the remarkable work accomplished at the Library and Museums.

The Iowa Masonic Library Association assists the Iowa Masonic Library in its operations by providing funds equal to approximately one-half of the salary of the Assistant Librarian, and supports the Library in paying for one-time needs.

On February 12, the Iowa Masonic Library Association sponsored the Iowa Conference for Masonic Education at the Library and Museums. We also thank the Scottish Rite Valley of Cedar Rapids for providing a welcoming venue for the opening banquet for the Conference.

The well-attended Conference featured a group of outstanding speakers, some of national repute, bringing further light to the attendees. Not the least of the accomplishments of this Conference was that it brought many Brothers to the Library and Museums for the first time in their lives. We have no doubt they will return! Another felicitous

occurrence at the Conference was the presence of many of our Prince Hall Brethren. Nearly 200 Masons were present. The list of speakers and their topics included Grand Master Thomas K. Sturgeon of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania on "21<sup>st</sup> Century Masonic Renaissance"; Deputy Grand Master Eddie Sauls of the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Iowa on "Prince Hall"; Brother Chad Simpson from Ohio on "Making Super Secret (Tyled) Meetings Worthwhile"; Brother Ted Wiley on "The Mentor's Assistant"; Brother Timothy Whipple on "Abraham Lincoln"; Brother Jay Cole Simser on the "Iowa Academy of Masonic Knowledge"; and Senior Grand Steward Darrell G. Fremont on the "Grand Lodge Website."

The Education Conference was made possible through a generous grant from the Masonic Charitable Educational Corporation.

The Library staff report continuing use of the book digitizing equipment purchased by the Association; this professional-quality equipment allows your Library to supply digital versions of rare books, insofar as staff time allows.

The Association continued this year a project of almost inestimable value, made possible by a generous grant from the Masonic Charitable Educational Corporation. Your Library is unique in the world in having a catalogue of all articles in all Masonic periodicals in its collection. This may seem trivial, until one considers that these periodicals are *not* indexed in any of the usual periodical indices, and that the Iowa Masonic Library holds one of the most nearly complete collections of such periodicals.

Work on the digitizing of the catalogue of these articles—called the *Index Rerum*, literally the "Index of Things"—has proceeded ahead of schedule, and the process of double-checking the entries will begin soon, if it has not already begun when you receive this report.

Our goal is to have the entire project finished by the calendar year 2015, and earlier if possible. When the project is completed, its results will appear on-line, and provide the catalogue to any researcher on Masonic topics anywhere in the world. Not only will this be a unique and uniquely-valuable resource, but it will also facilitate important research that hitherto often required a trip to Cedar Rapids for a researcher, and at his or her own expense.

We are only beginning to realize the importance of this project, but there can be no question that it will place your library even more prominently among the most important sources in the world for Masonic research. It will add yet another dimension to the library's access to scholars and put the library on the leading edge of using modern technology for Masonic purposes. It is a project that should make every lowa Freemason very, very proud.

Initiatives of your Library Association over the past several years have begun the process of making the collection even more available to Masons and Masonic scholars who live at a distance from Cedar Rapids. This process will likely extend over decades, but it will also make our collection even more useful world-wide than it is today.

Our sincere thanks and appreciation go to all who supported the lowa Masonic Library so generously during this Masonic year, for those who used the Library, and for those who visited the Museums. We particularly recognize that the staff of our Library and Museums, while small in number, are, in their own right, heroes of lowa Masonry who seek to preserve our history and extend our knowledge. They deserve praise and recognition from all lowa Masons.

If our goal is to bring Masonic light to the world, then we are well on the way to doing our part in that grand and glorious work.

The lowa Masonic Library and Museums continue to be among the most valuable, if least well-known, intellectual resources in lowa, and are among the very finest Masonic resources in the world. Every lowa Mason can take justifiable pride in the Library and Museum—and should promote their use. Iowa Masons unfamiliar with the collections of the Library and Museum are urged to become familiar with them, because they represent collectively one of the greatest treasures, and a priceless one, of Iowa Freemasonry.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Distinguished Guests, My Brethren All, Most Worshipful Sir, thank you for allowing me to give this Memorial Tribute for my good friend and Brother, Keith Muntz.

Keith was a very community minded person. True to his family, his church, his Lodge, and always doing what was best for everyone. He served the Grand Lodge as Junior Grand Deacon 1966-67, as Junior Grand Warden 1973-74, and as Grand Master 1981-82. His talents benefited many Grand Lodge Committees over the years.

Brethren, that tune you have just heard is entitled in the Methodist Hymnal "Eternal Father, Strong to Save," but is probably more commonly known as the Navy Hymn. Because of Grand Master Jerry Levay's strong ties to the Navy, and because two of my half-brothers were also Navy veterans, this hymn is especially dear to me. Please contemplate these words of the fourth verse: "O Trinity of love and power, all travelers guard in danger's hour; from rock and tempest, fire and foe, protect them wheresoe'er they go. Thus evermore shall rise to thee glad praise from air and land and sea."

A famous, but very modest, American died recently. His name was Neil Armstrong. I doubt that anyone in this room can say, "Who was he? What did he do?" But for the rest of us, when we are laid to rest, we become one of the dead, anonymous except for the headstones that mark our graves. Neil Armstrong requested that his body be buried at sea. He trusted the promise that, on the last day, the sea shall give up its dead. To me, Armstrong's request is a strong testimony in his belief in God. To me, his request means that he was so sure of his relationship to God, that he had no need of a headstone in a cemetery. To me, his request was based upon the assurance that God indeed knew his name.

As Masons, may we all enjoy that same blessed assurance. Upon our entry into the lodge for the very first time, in answer to the very first question we were asked, there, each of us attested that we put our trust in the Supreme Being we call God. If we meant what we said, then we must have the assurance that our spirits, given us by God, will never, never die. "Then shall the dust return to the earth as it was, and the spirit shall return unto God who gave it." Asserting the assurance that God knows the name of every single one of His servants, we have recited with confidence the names of our departed Brothers, knowing that we shall see them again, someday. And when we do, we will then joint our voices with theirs, sending forth "glad praise from air and land and sea."

Let us pray: "Eternal Father, because You promised to inscribe our names on the palm of Your hand, we know that You will always remember and never forget us. Help us likewise honor the ten worthy men whose names were read, as well as all other Brother Masons who died during this Grand Lodge year. Allow us to depart in peace, knowing the comfort of Your presence, forever. Amen."

#### REPORT ON MASONIC JURISPRUDENCE

Donald E. Mosier, P.G.M. and Chairman of the Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence, presented the proposed Amendments to the Code for action.

#### PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

(Amendments to the Constitution require a two-thirds majority vote at two consecutive Annual Communications for adoption –
Article IX Constitution of the Grand Lodge)

(ADOPTED)

**BE IT RESOLVED:** That Article VIII, Section 4 of the Constitution be cancelled and the following enacted in lieu thereof:

#### Section 4. CONFERRING OF DEGREES.

With the exception of Grand Master's One-Day Classes, the First Section of the First and Second Degrees and the First and Second Sections of the Third Degree shall be conferred upon but one person at a time. The Second Section of the First and Second Degrees, the Monitorial Lectures of the First and Third Degrees and all the Charges may, at the option of the Master, be given to more than one candidate at the same time. In no instance is any abbreviation of the work allowable, each candidate being entitled to the degrees in full.

**BE IT RESOLVED:** That Chapter 3, Section 5a(20) of the Laws of the Grand Lodge be added to the Iowa Masonic Code:

#### Chapter 3, Section 5. Grand Secretary

a. It is the duty of the Grand Secretary

(20) To conduct an annual performance assessment and review for each member of the Grand Lodge office staff, documenting in writing the specific performance expectations, the performance of the employee against those expectations, any required corrective action or performance improvement by the employee, and the required time-frame for such action or improvement.

#### Section 23. Long Range Strategic Planning Committee

a. Creation and Term. There shall be a Long Range Strategic Planning Committee consisting of five members. The term of the five members shall be for five years. The Grand Master elected in 2012 shall appoint one member for a term of one year, one member for a term of two years, one member for a term of three years, one member for a term of five

years. Successors shall be appointed for a term of five years, provided, that when a vacancy occurs the appointment shall be for the unexpired term. No member shall serve more than two consecutive terms. The Grand Secretary and Executive Director of the Lodge Service Committee shall serve as ex-officio members of this committee.

#### b. Duties.

- To monitor and research societal, economic, and demographic trends which will affect lowa Freemasonry in the future.
- To develop and propose for implementation a five, ten, and twenty year strategic plan for the Grand Lodge. The plan would be subject to approval of the membership of the Grand Lodge.
- To monitor the progress of attaining the goals and objectives as outlined in the adopted strategic plan and provide a yearly report thereon.
- 4. To make periodic reviews of the strategic plan and recommendations on revisions as are necessary.
- To provide assistance to the leadership of the Grand Lodge, Committees of the Grand Lodge, and current and future leaders of the constituent lodges in developing programs to meet future needs.
- To provide assistance as requested to the local lodges in long-range planning efforts.

**BE IT RESOLVED**: That Chapter 11, Section 1a of the Laws of the Grand Lodge be cancelled and the following be enacted in lieu thereof:

#### Section 1. CLASSIFICATION

Committees of the Grand Lodge shall be standing or special committees.

**a.** Standing Committees are as provided by the Iowa Masonic Code. They are Appeals and Grievances Committee, Credentials Committee, Division and Reference Committee, Finance Committee, Fraternal Review Committee, Lodge Service Committee, Masonic Charitable Educational Corporation Scholarship Selection Committee, Masonic Jurisprudence Committee, Masonic Youth Committee, Public Relations Committee, Public School Support Committee, Recognition of Grand Bodies Committee, Scholarship Selection Committee, Technology Committee, Visitors Committee, and Long Range Strategic Planning Committee.

# PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION (REJECTED)

(First reading)

**BE IT RESOLVED:** That Article V, Section 1 of the Constitution of the Grand Lodge be cancelled and the following enacted in lieu thereof:

#### Section 1. REGULAR.

The Grand Lodge shall hold one regular communication each year commencing on the third Saturday of September at a time designated by the Grand Master. On Friday preceding the regular Grand Lodge Communication, the Custodians shall hold a School of Instruction in the Ritual to be known as the Grand Lodge School.

(First reading)

**BE IT RESOLVED:** That Article IX of the Constitution of the Grand Lodge be cancelled and the following enacted in lieu thereof:

This Constitution may be revised, amended, or altered in the following manner:

- **a. Submitting in Writing.** Every resolution for amendment to the Constitution shall be filed in the office of the Grand Secretary not later than July 15 prior to the convening of the regular Communication of the Grand Lodge at which time it is proposed that the resolution will be acted upon. When July 15 falls on a Saturday or Sunday, the allowable filing date shall be extended to include the first Monday following July 15.
- **b.** Referred to the Committee. The proposal shall then be referred to the Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence, which shall report its findings and recommendations during the morning session of the communication.
- **c. Considered by Grand Lodge.** The proposal and report shall be submitted to the Grand Lodge for its consideration as the first order of business in the afternoon session of the day of the communication.
- **d. Vote and Action Required.** A vote shall then be taken and, if the proposal be approved by a two-thirds majority, it shall lie over to the next regular communication and, if again approved by a two-thirds majority, the Constitution shall be so revised, amended, or altered.

# PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CODE (REJECTED)

**BE IT RESOLVED:** That Chapter 5, Section 3e and Chapter 11, Section 13b of the Laws of the Grand Lodge be canceled and the following be enacted in lieu thereof:

#### Chapter 5, Section 3. AUTHORITY AND POWERS.

**e**. To have general supervision over all employment policies and practices of the Grand Lodge and to approve the hiring, compensation, and other benefits for all key employees of the Grand Lodge as designated by the Trustees of the Grand Lodge. This shall include conducting annual performance assessments and reviews for the Grand Secretary and Deputy Grand Secretary, which shall document in writing the specific performance expectations the Trustees have for each employee, the performance of the employee against those expectations, any required corrective action or performance improvement by the employee, and the required time-frame for such action or improvement.

Before May 16 of each year, the Trustees of the Grand Lodge shall nominate a brother for election or reelection to the office of Grand Secretary at the next annual communication of the Grand Lodge. The nominee for Grand Secretary shall be the brother currently serving in that office unless one or more of the following apply:

- **1.** The Grand Secretary has announced that he does not wish to serve another year in the office.
  - 2. The jewel of the Grand Secretary is under arrest by the Grand Master.
- **3.** The Grand Secretary has been charged with a felony by federal, state, or local authorities.
  - **4.** The Grand Secretary is under charges of un-Masonic conduct.
- **5.** The Grand Secretary has been grossly negligent or delinquent in the discharge of his duties, with lack of improvement or adoption of corrective action, as documented in his annual performance assessment.

The nomination of any brother other than the currently serving Grand Secretary shall require the approval of the Masonic Jurisprudence Committee as described in Chapter 11, Section 13 b(2) of the Laws of the Grand Lodge.

#### Chapter 11, Section 13b. MASONIC JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE.

- **b. Duties of Chairman.** To call a meeting of the Committee on the same date as that called by the Grand Master in Chapter 3, Section 1b(10) of the Laws of the Grand Lodge for the purpose of:
- 1. Consulting with the present Chairman of the Division and Reference Committee, as provided in Section 8c of this Chapter, approving the selection of the Chairman of the Division and Reference Committee for the coming year.
- **2**. Reviewing and approving the proposed nomination by the Trustees of the Grand Lodge for the office of Grand Secretary when the proposed nomination is of a brother who is not currently installed and serving as Grand Secretary.

**BE IT RESOLVED:** That Chapter 40, Section 4d of the Laws for Subordinate Lodges be cancelled and the following enacted in lieu thereof:

d. Fifty-Year Members. No annual dues shall be assessed against any member who had, prior to January one of that year, completed an aggregate of at least fifty (50) years as a member in one or more lodges of this Grand Jurisdiction or one recognized by the Grand Lodge of lowa and provided he was raised prior to January 1, 1963. However, in determining the aggregate years of membership in any lodge or lodges, no lapse shall have been deemed to occur for time between demission from a lodge and the following election into a lodge if both the demission and election are within a period of one year and for which dues have been fully paid or remitted. This method of computation shall be retroactive for past years for determination of eligibility for brethren reaching Fifty-Year status after January 1, 1973.

Rowley Memorial Trust Fund, sixty-five cents (\$0.65) to the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities Fund, and fifteen cents (\$0.15) to the Field Financial Aid Fund.

## **GRAND LODGE OF IOWA, A.F. & A.M.**

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

The doings of our brothers around the country and the world run the gamut from the important to the mundane, but they are diverse and they are uniformly illuminating. To study the proceedings of other jurisdictions is to learn from their experiences. To learn from those experiences is to have the chance to apply those lessons to the practice of Masonry here in lowa, and for that reason I would like to thank Most Worshipful Grand Master Jerry Levay for giving me the opportunity serve as the Chair of the Committee on Fraternal Review this year and to share some of these lessons.

Thus, it is with great pleasure that I present the 2012 Report on Fraternal Review. This report is presented in the hope that we may all gain a better understanding of what it means for brethren to dwell together in unity.

#### ^^^^^

This year, the Committee reviewed approximately 30 different sets of proceedings from jurisdictions all over the world. One way to present this report would be to simply list every jurisdiction and discuss one or two of the most notable issues or events from each. But that would be to miss the forest for the trees.

Another way to present the report is to focus on a few of the issues that are common to many jurisdictions and then discuss what lessons can be learned from their experiences. This report follows the latter approach and has focused on the following issues.

#### Issue #1: Stewardship

One issue that many jurisdictions are confronting is financial health and the management of resources. Each set of proceedings typically includes budgets and detailed financial reports which reveal that, as a fraternity, Freemasonry is both wealthy and poor.

On the one hand, generations of generous and hard working brothers have left the fraternity with millions upon millions in assets. This includes endowments, charities, trusts, educational foundations, building and library funds, retirement homes, and scores of nonprofit corporations.

But those to whom much is given, much is required. All of these assets must be managed competently, and just judging by the proportion of the proceedings devoted to financial matters, it is clear that good stewardship presents a real challenge for every jurisdiction.

On the other hand, declining membership rolls and decreasing dues revenue have left many jurisdictions with tight budgets and operating shortfalls that must be made up from endless budget cuts, tapping into investment principal, or raising dues.

The financial situation of each jurisdiction is highly variable. Washington appears to be one that has been well endowed in the past but is also planning for the future. For example:

In 2010, the Grand Lodge of Washington had an operational budget of \$783,597 of which just \$180,950 was attributable to its total per capita assessment on enrolled members. The bulk of the remainder of the operating budget comes from a 1% "per capita net worth" fee charged to each of the Grand Lodge's various endowment funds. The fee is not allowed to invade the principal of the investments. Despite the operating revenue from the fee, the Grand Master recommended and the Grand Lodge adopted, a \$2 per capita assessment increase each year for five years, eventually raising Washington's total per capita assessment from \$15 to \$25. This dues increase seems to have been adopted in order to meet the challenges of the future and not to balance the budget in a pinch. According to the Grand Master, "If we do not allow for our Grand Lodge operations to be up to date in all its processes, we hold back our progress and become stagnant."

Other jurisdictions are still living with the consequences of financial decisions made during times of peak membership and peak operational revenues. The Grand Lodge of Tennessee, despite being a large Masonic jurisdiction, has had its share of financial challenges. For example:

The Grand Lodge of Tennessee is struggling to fund a retirement plan for retired employees that make up 15% of the Grand Lodge budget, despite ceasing to add new retirees back in the 1990s. It's also looking for ways to fund a building endowment in order to take maintenance out of the operational budget.<sup>5</sup>

One reason for the current state of affairs, according to the Grand Master, was poor planning during the boom years. According to the Grand Master, the Grand Lodge per capita assessment was set at \$2 during the 1930s and remained at that level through the 1980s. Despite per capita dues not keeping pace with inflation, the Grand Lodge was able to accumulate more than \$750,000 in cash reserves by the 1970s. Nearly all of this was due to a threefold increase in membership during the peak years. <sup>6</sup>

By 2002, however, all of the cash reserves had been spent and the Grand Lodge was operating year to year. In 2011, the Grand Lodge's ways and means committee was asking for an increase to the per capita assessment from \$15.50 to \$20 in order to be able to present a balanced 2012 budget.<sup>7</sup>

#### Issue #2: Membership

The second issue many jurisdictions are confronting is membership. At times, it seems as though the entire Masonic world is talking about it. From New Brunswick to New Zealand, Grand Lodges are addressing this. In the United States, most jurisdictions have been experiencing regular declines for many years. Yet I am happy to report that, as a fraternity, we may be at or near the end of this trend. At least, the number of raisings is beginning to approach the number of deaths in many jurisdictions.

Of the jurisdictions reviewed, Illinois represents a somewhat typical example. As of 2009, Illinois had 68,558 members. As of 2010, Illinois had 68,308 members, a relatively small decrease from the prior year, especially given that Illinois is a relatively large Masonic jurisdiction<sup>8</sup>. That year, Illinois experienced a total increase of 3532 against a total decrease of 3782, including 1800 raised against 2412 deaths.<sup>9</sup>

While not typical, some jurisdictions are doing better even than Illinois. Pennsylvania actually saw a net increase of 441 in 2010. The District of Columbia had a net gain of 29 in 2010, the first time it has seen an increase since 1953. In looking more closing at the District, however, it's clear that the net increase was due not to an increase in raisings but rather a decrease in deaths. For example, raisings in the District were steady for the three years reported: 100 in 2008, 122 in 2009, and 119 in 2010. Deaths during that same period were 164, 172, and 131 respectively. In the property of the three years reported: 100 in 2008, 122 in 2009, and 119 in 2010.

Finally, as jurisdictions learn to cope with interest from prospective members in the 21<sup>st</sup> century, many are discussing the implementation of rigorous background checks. The District of Columbia studied it in 2010 and produced a thorough report on the idea, including a helpful discussion of Florida's experience. Ultimately, it was recommended that a mandatory background check program be implemented in the District.<sup>12</sup>

Similarly, in 2010 the Grand Master of Louisiana issued an edict making background checks of candidates mandatory. <sup>13</sup>

#### Issue #3: Recognition

The third and final issue confronting many jurisdictions is the issue of recognition of other jurisdictions. Each year, all around the world, new grand lodges are formed and existing grand lodges within the same jurisdiction split from or reunite with each other. In recent years, the grand lodges of Albania, Moldova, Cyprus, and other nations have made recognition requests of other jurisdictions. Each jurisdiction has the right to consider these requests and make their own decision on whether to recognize any other jurisdiction.

In other cases, controversies have erupted in the Masonic world that causes some jurisdictions to unrecognize others because of certain issues. Most recently, this includes the Rectified Rite controversy and the controversy over the Grand Loge Nationale Francaise

(GLNF). The Conference of Grand Masters of North America has established a commission on information for recognition that publishes annual reports on the latest international recognition issues, and Masons interested in these issues are encouraged to consult that body's website. <sup>14</sup>

However, not all recognition issues are of recent origins. Here in the United States there is also a 200 year old recognition issue. Despite an unimpeachable charter from the United Grand Lodge of England for African Lodge #459, the Prince Hall Grand Lodges of this country that trace their formation back to that lodge are still not recognized by all of the "mainstream" Grand Lodges in the United States. <sup>15</sup>

Over the years, attempts by some "mainstream" Grand Lodges to extend recognition to Prince Hall Grand Lodges met with harsh reprisals by the other "mainstream" lodges. For example, in 1947 the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts investigated the origins of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Massachusetts and reported that its origins were legitimate. The report stopped short of recommending full recognition or intervisitation, but other jurisdictions in the United States quickly withdrew recognition from Massachusetts and in 1949, Massachusetts "unadopted" its findings on legitimacy of origins. <sup>16</sup>

As of the date of this report, the Grand Lodges of Arkansas, Louisiana, Tennessee, Alabama, Mississippi, Georgia, Florida, South Carolina, and West Virginia still refuse to recognize Prince Hall Masonry.<sup>17</sup>

In fact, the recognition of Prince Hall is still an open issue in some of these jurisdictions. For example, in 2011 the Grand Lodge of Louisiana took up the matter when it considered Resolution No. 2011-5 which would have established communications with, and ultimately recognition of, the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Louisiana. <sup>18</sup>

Despite the fact that the United Grand Lodge of England has issued a full-throated approval of the regularity of Prince Hall Grand Lodges, and addressed the scope of the original charter and the ability of African Lodge to charter other lodges and form a Grand Lodge<sup>19</sup>. This resolution failed.

The Grand Lodge of Louisiana also considered a resolution that would have made it a Masonic offense to do any act or take any action supporting or recommending for recognition any lodge not chartered by the Grand Lodge of Louisiana. Presumably, this resolution would have applied to attempts to recognize Prince Hall Lodges. This resolution also failed<sup>20</sup>, but demonstrates the lack of consensus that still exists on this issue.

#### Applying the Lessons: Committee Recommendations

After reviewing the proceedings of our sister jurisdictions, and in particular after analyzing the issues described above, the Committee on Fraternal Review makes the following recommendations:

- That the Grand Lodge of lowa set per capita assessments and operating budgets based on low membership levels and not high ones.
- That the Grand Lodge of Iowa give further study to the 1% "net worth" fee adopted by the Grand Lodge of Washington as a way to supplement per capita assessment revenues.
- That the Grand Lodge of lowa redouble efforts to (a) recruit new members, including advertising programs that capitalize on the popular fascination with our fraternity; (b) retain existing members in order to decrease the number of members dropped from the rolls for nonpayment of dues.
- That the Grand Lodge of Iowa give further study to a mandatory background check program.
- That the Grand Lodge of Iowa's Fraternal Recognition committee considers the issue of recommending withdrawal of recognition from those jurisdictions that refuses to recognize our Prince Hall brethren.
