Most Worshipful Bryce B. Hildreth Grand Master of Masons in Iowa 2012-13

Brother Bryce is a lifelong resident of Ankeny. He was born in Des Moines on December 1, 1971 to Billy Joe and Darlene Hildreth. He graduated from Ankeny High School and attended Iowa State University. Iowa FFA honored Brother Bryce with the Iowa Farmer Degree in 1989. He is retired from farming the family's century farm and was instrumental in its sale and development. Brother Bryce is employed by the United States Postal Service as a Rural Carrier. He also is involved in several venture capital and investment enterprises. He serves as a Trustee of the Hildreth Family Charitable Trust and of the Bryce B. Hildreth Trust. He is a member of the Ankeny Church of the Brethren. His life is made more special by his lady Natalie Mercer. When time permits he plays golf and enjoys travel and fine dining.

Brother Bryce has attended Grand Lodge of Iowa communications since 1976, but only as a Mason since 1990, having been raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason on April 7, 1990 in Logic Lodge No. 636 at Ankeny. He is a dual member with Capital Lodge No. 110 at Des Moines. He served as Worshipful Master of Capital Lodge No. 110 in 1995 and Logic Lodge No. 636 in 1996. He is a past president of the South Central MI and DL Club and is a member of the Polk Jasper Study Club. He served for many years as Chairman of the Central Iowa Masons Jerry Marsengill Christmas Day Dinner.

The purple of the fraternity rested on Brother Hildreth's shoulders first in 1993-94 as Grand Tyler, then in 2000-01 as Deputy Grand Master and in 2003-04 as Junior Grand Warden. He has served the Grand Lodge of lowa on the Lodge Service Committee 1995-2000; as Treasurer of the Masonic Charitable Education Corporation 2007-2011; Chairman of the *ad hoc* Long Range Planning Committee 2011; and on the Division and Reference Committee 2001-02 and as its Chairman 2011-12. He proudly holds District Lecturer Certificate number 3028.

Brother Hildreth is active in many aspects of Masonry. He has served as the leader of all three bodies of the Downtown Des Moines York Rite. He is a dual member with the York Rite Bodies of Ames. He was Grand Chaplain of the Grand Chapter R.A.M. of Iowa 2011-12. He serves as an Inspector and on the Board of Instruction for the Grand Commandery K.T. of Iowa, where he served as Grand Commander in 2009-10. He is the recipient of the Knight Templar Cross of Honor and the Knight Commander of the Temple awards from the Grand Encampment Knights Templar of the U.S.A. where he also serves as Chairman of the Public Relations Committee and a member of the Editorial Review Board of the Knight Templar Magazine. The Supreme Council for the Southern Jurisdiction A.A.S.R. honored Brother Hildreth in 2007 with the 33rd Degree. He is a permanent member of the Scottish Rite Southern Jurisdiction Foundation and is honored in the House of the Temple in Washington D.C. His membership is in the Des Moines Valley where he serves as Commander of the Council of Kadosh. He is a Director of the Iowa Scottish Rite Masonic Foundation and a member of the Heritage Society.

Brother Bryce is a member of Za Ga Zig Shrine A.A.O.N.M.S. in Altoona where he serves on the Ritual Staff and is a past President of the In 2010-11 he served as Sovereign of St. Past Masters Club. Bartholomew Conclave Red Cross of Constantine. In 2001 he served as Prior of Charles Clyde Hunt Priory No. 42 KYCH and serves Convent General KYCH as Personal Representative of the Grand Master General for Region 11. In 2004 he served as Governor of Iowa York Rite College No. 37, receiving the Order of the Purple Cross in 2008. He serves as Registrar of Last Supper Tabernacle No XVIII Holy Royal Arch Knight Templar Priests. He is a member of the High Council of Iowa College SRICF. He is a member of Polaris Council No. 449 AMD; Order of the Scarlet Cord; Order of Corks; Grand College of Rites; Knights Preceptor; Green Degrees Council No. 93, Knight Masons; he served in 2010 as Excellent Chief of Great Chief's Council No. 0 of the World, Knight Masons.

Brother Bryce enjoys traveling around the country and world. He frequently travels to Europe and has been invited into several Masonic and non Masonic orders based in Europe. He is a member of Bryn Athyn Quarry Assemblage of The Operatives, and has received the Great Corner Stone Award from the Grand Assemblage of the Operatives in England. He serves as Provincial Grand Tiler, member of the national degree team, and Screening Committee Chairman for Iowa for The Provincial Grand Lodge of the Royal Order of Scotland of the United States of America. He is the Provincial Senior Grand Warden of the Provincial Grand Court of the United States of America for The Masonic Order of Athelstan in England, Wales and its Provinces Overseas. He is a member of Mayflower Conclave order of Pilgrim Preceptors; The August Order of Light and HOM. He has been invited into the Freedom of the City of London and the Order of St. John.

Brother Bryce is a proud senior DeMolay, past president of Iowa DeMolay Preceptory, and has received the DeMolay Legion of Honor. He is a member of National Sojourners. He is a member of Ankeny New Hope Chapter OES.

Welcome to the 169th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of lowa. Natalie and I extend our warmest personal greeting to each of you. Thank you for sharing the precious commodity of your time with us. We hope your stay in Des Moines is most enjoyable.

To the voting members of the Grand Lodge, Thank You for taking part and participating in your Grand Lodge.

To our Distinguished Guests from outside of Iowa, a most hearty welcome! Please enjoy and partake of our Iowa hospitality.

To the Heads of the Iowa Masonic Organizations, thank you for being with us. It has been a pleasure to meet and work with you this past Grand Lodge year.

STATE OF THE CRAFT

From the time the first Masons came to Iowa and formed lodges and then the Grand Lodge in 1844 there have been ups and downs, good and bad times. As such our fraternity remains today. There are active lodges and those barely surviving. There is no magic word or program to change this. My hope is that quite simply our members live by the lessons shown them in our degrees.

Today we tend to get caught up in the mundane operations of our local lodge. OFFICIAL ACTS

2012

- September 22: Waterloo I called a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Grand Lodge and after discussion I removed Jack L Butler as a Trustee. I appointed Raymond E. Clause to fill the unexpired term.
- November 27: Ankeny I determined after much consideration and discussion that the election of officers for Black Hawk Lodge No. 65 was not conducted according to the Masonic Code of Iowa and ordered a new election of officers to be held at the next stated communication of Black Hawk Lodge No. 65 and that all members be notified of this action. The Grand Secretary sent this notice to all members of the lodge on my directive on December 3.
- **December 4: Ankeny** I directed the Grand Secretary to send a summons to the members of Floyd Lodge No. 537 at Orange City to attend the December 14th stated meeting to discuss the future of their lodge.
- December 10: Cedar Falls I attended the December Stated Communication of Black Hawk Lodge No. 65 and presided for the election of officers. Officers were elected as outlined in the Masonic Code of Iowa. At this meeting I informed the Lodge that their bylaws were in conflict with the Masonic Code of Iowa and directed that they change their bylaws. I am happy to report that Black Hawk Lodge No. 65's bylaws are now in compliance with the Masonic Code of Iowa.
- December 11: Orange City I attended the Stated Communication of Floyd Lodge No. 537. As Grand Master I presided for the business of Floyd Lodge. First item was correcting the minutes and properly accepting the resignation of most of the Lodge Officers and properly granting demits. After a serious discussion with those present I read chapter 45 of the Laws for Subordinate Lodges and informed them that because of the actions of a few of their members, the Charter of Floyd Lodge No. 537 was in jeopardy of being arrested. I asked why I should not arrest the charter. My decision was to not arrest the charter, but I required those remaining members to prepare for me in writing a plan for lodge. This plan has been presented, and while not entirely satisfactory, it is a good start to maintaining a lodge in Orange City.

2013

- January 24: Upon complaint that a petition for the degrees was received and voted on at the same meeting and that meeting not a stated meeting I found the same to be true. I therefore ordered the Master of Gnemeth Lodge No. 577 to declare the election of the petitioner void and have the petition follow the correct course as outlined in the Masonic Code of Iowa.
- June 6: Colo Columbia Lodge No. 292. As Grand Master I presided at the June stated meeting of Columbia Lodge No. 292. Under Chapter 15, Section 5, the question was put to those present to consolidate with Nevada Lodge No. 99. With all voting in favor of the consolidation, I agreed. The last meeting of Columbia Lodge No 292 was then closed by me with the assistance of the Worshipful Master and their dedicated Secretary of more than 50 years.
- June 9: Pleasant Hill The Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee and I called a meeting of the Jurisprudence Committee of the Grand Lodge to review the Masonic Code of Iowa and the powers and prerogatives of the Grand Master.
- July 17: I arrested the jewel of the Worshipful Master of Roosevelt Lodge No. 626. This action was made after great deliberation, fact finding, and by a written request of members and officers of the lodge.

THE GRAND LODGE OF ARKANSAS

In December I received a letter from the Grand Lodge of Arkansas informing the Grand Lodge of Iowa that an Iowa Mason was expelled from his Arkansas Lodge. His Iowa Lodge made no action to expel or conduct a Masonic Trial. I reviewed the actions of the Grand Lodge of Arkansas and found that they followed their laws. The Masonic Code of Iowa is very limited in the powers of the Grand Master to expel an Iowa Mason from an Iowa Lodge. There is no reciprocity between the Grand Lodge of Iowa and the Grand Lodge of Arkansas to honor an expulsion in the other Grand Jurisdiction of one of its members.

In February at the Conference of Grand Masters of North America I had meetings with both the immediate past and current Grand Master of Arkansas. I also met with the Imperial Potentate of the Shrine at this conference. After these meetings, consultation with members of the jurisprudence committee, and review of the Masonic Code of Iowa, I made the following response:

The Grand Lodge of Iowa is a Sovereign Grand Lodge within its own jurisdiction and is subject only to its enacted laws, edicts, decisions, customs, and traditions. The Grand Lodge of Iowa respects each Grand Lodge, which it recognizes, to adopt and enforce their own laws, edicts, decisions, customs, and traditions. I acknowledge that the Grand Lodge of Arkansas expelled an Arkansas Masons who is also a member in an Iowa Lodge. I find that the grounds for the expulsion did not meet the requirements of the Iowa Masonic Code for expulsion and recognize that his Iowa Lodge chose not to invoke its ability to have a trail to make any determination. Therefore the Brother is an Iowa Mason in good standing.

The Grand Lodge of Iowa and the Grand Lodge of Arkansas remain in amity and mutual recognition.

SHRINERS INTERNATIONAL

I have made reference to my review and decision of the standing of an Iowa Mason who was expelled from Masonry in another Grand Jurisdiction. This expulsion set into motion a disagreement between the Grand Lodge of Arkansas and Shriners International. Without going into every detail the bulk of the argument is that when the Grand Lodge of Arkansas expelled a Mason from his Arkansas Lodge, they requested Shriners International to remove the Brother as Potentate of an Arkansas Shrine Temple. Because the Brother was also a member in another Grand Jurisdiction (Iowa) Shriners International determined the Brother meet their requirement of Masonic membership and that he could remain Potentate. The Grand Master of Arkansas issued an edict that no Arkansas Mason could be a Shriner and that any Arkansas Shriner must self-expel from Masonry. This has resulted in many expulsions from Arkansas Masonic Lodges and many Masons dropping their Shrine membership. After many attempts to reconcile the issues no agreement was made. At the Imperial Session of Shriners International a change to Shrine Law was approved allowing non-Masons to join the Shrine in Arkansas. This law applies only to Arkansas. There is a residency requirement of 6 months to petition for membership in the Shrine and each Shrine Temple has a specific jurisdiction attached to it. Because of these limiting conditions non-Masons from outside Arkansas will not be able to petition the Shrine. A non-Mason Shriner cannot affiliate or attend a tiled meeting of any Shrine Temple outside of Arkansas. I wish both the Grand Lodge of Arkansas and Shriners International only the best that harmony and brotherly love may exist again between them.

I am happy to report that these issues have little effect in our jurisdiction and that the Shrine Temples in Iowa and the Grand Lodge of Iowa have excellent fraternal relations. I am proud to say that we are all Brothers.

GRAND MASTER'S ENGLAND TRIP

From May 11-20, 2013, a group of Iowa Masons and their ladies along with some Masons from other states toured London and surrounding area. This is the fifth trip to England since Harry Muellich was Grand Master in 1977-78. Upon arrival the group checked into the Grosvenor Victoria Hotel then had a get acquainted party at the Saddle Club. We

had a week filled with sightseeing, fine English dinning, theatre, and Masonic meetings. The culmination of the trip was participation in the centenary of The Operatives, with the portrayal of the ancient drama for Masons and their ladies in the main hall of Freemasons Hall in London, home of the United Grand Lodge of England. The day concluded with an outstanding banquet. Natalie and I had so much fun sharing this wonderful trip with those that accompanied us. Special thanks are due to my good friend Matthew Dupee, of Pennsylvania. Brother Matt coordinated nearly every aspect of the trip and made most of the arrangements. He was so kind to share is contacts and resources to make this trip beyond special as we were able to attend events and go places few tourists can ever do. Thank you Brother Matt.

OFFICIAL OPINIONS

2013

July 16: I received the following two part question from Worshipful Brother Mike Mudrey, Worshipful Master of Tri-State Morning Lodge No. 673 at Dubuque. First, can I as Worshipful Master summons the Brother the Lodge elected as Director of the Dubuque Masonic Temple Association to appear in Lodge to answer questions about the Temple Association and the building? Second, if he fails to appear to the summons can he be removed from his position?

As this question was presented by a current Worshipful Master, this is an official opinion

- I reviewing the Iowa Masonic Code I found no reference to a Worshipful Master summonsing any Brother to appear before him or the lodge. In Chapter 3, Section 1, subsection c, number 2, the Grand Master is given the authority "to require information from the Master of any subordinate lodge or from any officer, board, or committee of the Grand Lodge, respecting their offices or duties."
- The Iowa Masonic Code of Iowa being silent on the question I reviewed the "unwritten law", customs, rituals, and traditions of Masonry in Iowa. Within our obligations there is specific reference to answering all due signs and summonses. Finding the answer in the Master Mason obligation and using the same premises of the Masonic Code for the Grand Master, I issued the following opinion:
- Official Opinion: Yes, you as Worshipful Master may require information from a member of the lodge respecting their office or duties. To accomplish this, you as Worshipful Master may issue a summons to the member to attend a specific meeting to answer questions regarding his office or duties.

With reference to the second question, I refer to Chapter 11, Section 1 and Section 2 of the Laws for Subordinate Lodge in the Iowa Masonic Code.

Chapter 11, Section 1. General

- "To each officer of the lodge shall be held personally responsible to the Master, and through him to the lodge and Grand Lodge, that his office be filled with dignity, honor, and correctness, and that its various duties be performed without haughtiness or tyranny, but according to love and a diligent desire to exemplify before the world the virtues and sublime morality of Freemasonry.
- In addition to those duties which appertain to every individual Mason and those which are purely traditional and unwritten, the duties of the officers of the lodge are as set out in the following sections."
- "If, in the judgment of the Grand Master, any officer of the Grand Lodge or the Master of any subordinate lodge is guilty of such misconduct as may bring reproach upon the office or the craft, the Grand Master may arrest his jewel."

Chapter 12, Section 2. By Master

- "The Master of a subordinate lodge for like reason may arrest the jewel of any officer of his lodge; he must make such arrest at any time by the order of the Grand Lodge or the Grand Master and shall forthwith report such action to the Grand Master."
- Because the Code is silent on the removal or arrest of jewel of a non-officer, I will refer also to the unwritten law. By applying the above sections of the Iowa Masonic Code and the established custom of powers and prerogatives of the Master of a Lodge, I therefore issue the following official opinion:
- Official Opinion: Yes, you as Worshipful Master may remove the Director selected to serve on the Masonic Temple Association if, in your judgment, he has not performed his responsibilities. As your Director is not an officer of the lodge, and the Masonic Code of Iowa is not specific in this case, it is well within your authority as Worshipful Master to remove the Director. Section of a new director will be as specified in the Lodge's bylaws or by past practice.
- September 17: After careful review, consideration, many discussions with the interested parties, and legal counsel, I declared the Petition for the Mysteries of Masonry for Mr. T. B. was not proper and the action of South Gate Lodge No. 657 in receiving and balloting on the petition was irregular. Mr. T. B. therefore is not a Mason and may petition a lodge as a profane.

REPORT OF THE GRAND SECRETARY AND GRAND LIBRARIAN

William R. Crawford presented his report as Grand Secretary and Grand Librarian.

Some of the highlights include: Signing the Resolution of Recognition between the Grand Lodge of Iowa, A.F. & A.M., and the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Iowa, F. & A.M.; traveling across the State and being able to enjoy the many different types of beauty that Iowa has to offer as the seasons change; having the opportunity to meet so many fine members of the Iowa Masonic Family; improving the cooperation between the Grand Lodge and Masonic bodies; visiting many of the lodges; attending conferences both in and out of state; having a wonderful, hard-working staff who gives their best each day for Iowa Masonry; and getting many collections, artifacts, and books catalogued that were previously just sitting there. The report of the Grand Librarian covers some of the work that is taking place in the Library and Museums. There are many, many more highlights which will be treasured in my breast.

I won't dwell on the frustrations other than the Flood of 2008 that caused great damage and destruction in Cedar Rapids. The City is recovering, but taking time and money. Also, there are disappointments which including having many more lodges closed than have been formed and having the number of net suspensions for non-payment of dues way too high.

This year, two new lodges have received their charters, while a new lodge has received its dispensation to operate. Another probable new lodge is close to requesting a dispensation.

There is good news and bad news about the lodges. Many are having degree work, yet there is a shortage of brothers either willing or able to assist in those conferrals. There continues to be a need for brothers to learn parts in the ritual, and a need for brothers to be willing to help teach those who want to learn parts. And there is a need for brothers to become Masonic Instructors to replace those brothers who have passed away.

The Grand Secretary's Office continues to receive e-mails and contacts from men who are interested in seeking Masonic Light. Thanks to the local brothers that follow up with these leads.

lowa Masonry is a bottom up organization with the Craft having the chance to lead into the future. Lodges have a variety of personalities, which leads to strength from sharing ideas and programs. It is a true strength that brothers are willing to bring forth and share ideas.

I attended the North American Conference of Grand Secretaries at Kansas City, Missouri in February, and served as Chaplain. I was then honored by being again elected as the Chaplain for the 2014 Conference at Baltimore. The Conference is an educational conference for the Grand Secretaries and again the most valuable program this year was information on the I.R.S. and its reporting requirements. The Library and Museums and Administrative Office are very fortunate to have volunteers who assist with a variety of projects. Florence Jacobs continues to help with a variety of projects. Janet Zahrt helps in the Library organizing collections. Thanks to Paul Nielsen, Steve Nielsen, and Dennis Zahrt, P.G.M., for their woodworking skills in restoring items. The work of these and the other volunteers is very much appreciated.

Grand Master Bryce B. Hildreth has worked tirelessly in promoting his theme of "Freemasonry – Ties that Bind" and reminding the Craft that our ritual is the most important part of our ties.

lowa Masonry is most fortunate to have such a dedicated and hardworking staff. No other Grand Lodge has a better staff!

Karen Davies is the bookkeeper, administrative assistant, scholarship program coordinator, and "other duties as assigned" as well as the friendly voice that you usually hear when calling the office. She loves assisting lodges in promoting their events.

Ivette Radziunas handles membership records and related information. She has become well-known to the lodge secretaries as she works with them and answers their questions. Also, she has developed a network of her counterparts in many of the Grand Jurisdictions which is expediting membership related requests.

Tim Hoppes is the Custodian/Maintenance person, and continues to keep the building and grounds looking great! The rose garden continues to be an example of his green thumb. Tim is active in the Salvation Army, and its charitable work in the community.

Assistant Librarian Bill Kreuger is recognized as an authority on many library topics including disaster preparedness and often is contacted for advice. He represents the Iowa Masonic Library and Museums in various capacities across the state and even the region. You are encouraged to read the Grand Librarian's report that he prepared at my request.

A very special thank you goes to my wife Elaine for her love, support, and assistance throughout the year.

DEGREE STATISTICS/MEMBERSHIP

Gains for 2012 included 516 Raisings, Affiliations of 360, and Restorations of 177; or total increases of 1,053. Losses included 774 deaths, 345 Demissions and Plural Terminations, 620 Suspensions for Non-Payment of Dues, and 9 Withdrawals and Expulsions; or total decreases of 1,748. This activity resulted in a net loss of 695 members leaving a membership of 20,204.

PETITIONS FOR THE DEGREES

Reported were 560 petitions in 2012, with 14 rejections.

Report of the Iowa Masonic Library and Museums (Prepared by William R. Kreuger, Assistant Librarian, at the request of William R. Crawford, Grand Secretary/Librarian)

The year 2012-13 has been a busy one for the Iowa Masonic Library and Museums. We continue to serve both Masons and non-Masons by providing information and materials as requested. In most cases we are able to fill requests in a very timely manner and we are often complimented on the speed in which we are able to get requests filled. Typical examples of requests include:

- Helping patrons with Masonic research.
- Providing book and reading materials to patrons
- Helping patrons find materials in the stacks
- Helping patron with Masonic history.

We continue to receive many requests from Prince Hall Masons. Most are interested in receiving copies of their Grand Lodge proceedings, if they are available, from our collection. We have been able to scan those requests and then make them available as a PDF. We have continued, then, to link the PDF files with the Library's electronic card catalog.

The Library has continued an active collecting program. During the past year, from June 2012 to June 2013, we added 719 titles to the book collection. Some of these are duplicates but most are new titles. The majority of the books added are part of the Harvey Collection of

Landscape Architecture. This collection, located on the third floor of the stacks, is a donation of Robert R. Harvey of Ames, Iowa. Dr. Harvey taught Landscape Architecture at Iowa State University and carries the title of Professor Emeritus in that Department.

In the museum collection, we added 16 different collections during 2012 and 4 different collections so far this year. Among the items collected last year are:

- Scottish Rite watch fob of T.S. Parvin Consistory in Sioux City, c. 1910.

- ID card of Erika Koberl dated April 1943, from Germany.

- 23 piece children's tea set, c. 1935

Among the items collected this year include:

- MOVPER scimitar (Mystic Order of Veiled Prophets of the Enchanted Realm)

Noritake Nippon porcelain sugar bowl and cream pitcher set

- A set of glass negatives showing the interior of Grant Wood's art studio, c. 1935. (The carriage house building located behind the Grand Lodge building)

We are continuing work on the conversion of the Index Rerum periodical citations from hand-written index cards to a digital format that is compatible with our Library card catalog. The project again received funding from the MCEC and we have converted more than 250,000 records into a digital format and have added them to the card catalog. These records are now available as a part of the card catalog and searchable by title, author and subject. Martin Cherry, the Librarian of the Grand Lodge of England, has used this catalog to send several requests for periodical citations.

Since January 2011, we have been working on a project to bind many of our Masonic and non-Masonic periodicals that have been neglected. So far, more than 150 periodical titles have been bound.

During the past year we have had more than 600 visitors tour the library and museums. Included were family groups, group tours from the local area, various clubs, school groups, as well as Masonic lodges from various parts of lowa.

In the fall of 2012 and the spring of 2013, we had two students from the Public History program of the University of Northern Iowa working as volunteers, learning about both museum practices and research. During the fall, Troy Trafton worked with the World War I poster collection, a donation made in the 1920s by William Crofts-Bullen. In the spring of 2013, John Szymanek continued working on the collection. Several posters have been encapsulated and cataloged into the museum collection.

In May, at the request of Grand Master Hildreth, we donated several duplicate Prince Hall Grand Lodge proceedings to the United Grand Lodge of England's Library collection. In return, the United Grand Lodge of England donated several copies of the *Freemasons' calendar*, for the years 1781 to 1808. The exchange was made during the time that the Grand Master's group visited London.

The Iowa Masonic Library and Museums continues good relations with other libraries, museums and Masonic libraries. The Assistant Librarian attended the annual meeting of the Masonic Library and Museum Association, held in Stillwater, Minnesota in October 2012. He will be attending the MLMA meeting in September 2013 in Alexandria, VA. This meeting is part of another meeting, entitled "The Quarry Project," which is a Masonic research and preservation conference that is being held at the George Washington Masonic National Memorial. The Assistant Librarian will be making two presentations at this meeting as a part of two panels – one on libraries and the other focused on museum work.

The Assistant Librarian is on the board of Directors of the Iowa Conservation and Preservation Consortium and serving as Treasurer of that organization. He had previously served two years as president of the Board of the ICPC.

In November 2012, the Assistant Librarian gave a presentation entitled "Fraternalism in the 19th and early 20th Century" at the annual meeting of the Midwest Open-Air Museums Coordinating Council that was held in Cedar Rapids. The presentation included a Power-Point program of various fraternal regalia from the Museum's collection.

In March and May, the Assistant Librarian served as a judge for the local and State History Day competitions. The local History Day event was held in mid-March at the Old State Capitol in Iowa City. The state event was held in early May at the State Historical Building in Des Moines.

In late July 2012, the Iowa Masonic Library and Museums Ioaned several of its Civil War related artifacts to the University of Iowa Old Capitol Museum for an exhibit entitles "Gone to See the Elephant." The exhibit completed its run in late May 2013 and all borrowed materials were returned to the Iowa Masonic Library's collection safe and sound. During it run from late August 2012 to May 2013, the exhibit had more than 11,000 visitors.

The Iowa Masonic Library and Museums continues membership in several national, state and local organizations. These include the Masonic Library and Museum Association, the Iowa Library Association, the Iowa Museum Association, the Iowa Conservation and Preservation Consortium, the Iowa Cultural Corridor Alliance, the Cedar Rapids Area Convention and Visitors Bureau, and Silos and Smokestacks National Heritage Area. Volunteers for the Iowa Masonic Library and Museums and the Grand Lodge of Iowa have continued to provide help and support. Several individuals give their time and talent in many ways. This includes helping with tours, helping with preservation of Grand Lodge records, helping with preservation and identification of items in the museum collection, research, envelope stuffing and getting mailings ready and a variety of other tasks. Total accumulated hours of volunteers have exceeded 1,980. We have treated our volunteers to lunch on several occasions as a way of saying "thank you" to them.

Investments

The Trustees had a long business relationship with financial advisors Russell Nieland and Charlie Weber of Robert W. Baird and Company. However, on March 1, 2013, they along with Kandi Gordy moved to TrueNorth Wealth Management. The Trustees, at their March 26, 2013, meeting approved to transfer accounts from Robert W. Baird & Co. to LPL Financial/True North Wealth Management.

The Trustees, in conjunction with the financial advisors, have maintained the existing investment policies and practices. The long-term objective of this portfolio is growth with income. Consideration must be given to annual income needs from the portfolio and maintaining purchasing power. Assets of the Grand Lodge portfolio are divided among cash and cash equivalents, bonds or other fixed income securities, and equities. Strict guidelines have been imposed to minimize and control risk among these three classes of investments. These guidelines have provided an investment result that has continued to outperform the various markets in which the funds are invested. The Grand Lodge opened an account with Robert W. Baird & Co. on December 31, 1999. The balance at LPL Financial on July 31, 2013 was \$1,966,628.49.

During the year, the SWAB Account was moved into first Robert W. Baird and Company and then to LPL Financial/True North Wealth

Management for a better diversification of assets. As of July 31, the account balance was \$651,672.

The financial advisors meet with the Trustees on a regular basis to review account performance, keep the Trustees aware of any changing conditions, and to conduct fiduciary reviews.

Shorter-term investments in Certificates of Deposit continue to be handled by the Grand Secretary.

There has been much progress in the GLNF situation this past year. Civil authorities have returned financial control to the GLNF. New elections were held resulting in the installation of Jean-Pierre Serval as Grand Master. On 24 April 2013, Grand Master Serval expelled the previous Grand Master, Francois Stifani. Plans are underway to celebrate their Centennial in December.

Meanwhile, five European Grand Lodges (Austria, Belgium, Germany, Luxembourg, and Switzerland) had called, through their Basel Declaration, a more comprehensive solution to French jurisdictional issues. In response to this declaration, four French obediences have formed the Confederation Maconnique de France on 15 June 2013 consisting of:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON JURISPRUDENCE (On Dispensations, Decisions and Opinions, and Official Acts)

Donald E. Mosier, Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee, gave the report for the Committee on Dispensations, Decisions and Opinions, and Official Acts of the Grand Master. This report was, on his motion –

ADOPTED.

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

The Report of the Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence is given in three parts. The first two parts report the findings of the committee with respect to the Dispensations, Decisions and Opinions, and Official Acts of the Grand Master. The third part reports the determinations and recommendations of the committee with respect to proposed legislation.

Report of the Committee on Jurisprudence regarding the Dispensations, Decisions and Opinions, and Official Acts of the Grand Master—Part 1

The Committee on Jurisprudence reviewed the Official Acts, Official and Unofficial Opinions, Dispensations, and Waivers of Jurisdiction granted by the Grand Master, as listed in both his preliminary report (printed in the Agenda and Book of Preliminary Reports for the 169th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Iowa) and a supplementary report including actions taken after the printing of the preliminary report. All items in both reports will be included in the final report printed in the proceedings of this annual communication.

The Grand Master issued one official opinion. This official opinion was in answer to a question posed by the Worshipful Master of Tri-State Morning Lodge No. 673. The question was whether the Master had the authority to summon a brother elected by the Lodge to represent them as a Director of the Masonic Temple Association, to attend a Lodge meeting, to question him regarding the activities of that Association, and to remove him from office if he fails to answer the summons. The Grand Master's Official Opinion was that the Worshipful Master may require information from a member of the lodge respecting their office or duties, and that he may issue a summons to the member to attend a specific meeting to answer questions regarding his office or duties. The Grand Master's Official Opinion also was that the Worshipful Master may remove the brother from his position as Director if the Worshipful Master found that the brother had not performed his responsibilities. The committee found this Official Opinion to be in order and approved it.

The Grand Master issued no Unofficial Opinions requiring review.

The Grand Master granted 23 Dispensations. These dispensations were all found to be in order and approved.

The Grand Master refused no Dispensations requiring review.

The Grand Master granted nine permissions. The permissions were all found to be in order.

There were no permissions denied requiring review.

The Grand Master granted five Waivers of Jurisdiction. These waivers were all found to be in order.

There were no reported Waivers of Jurisdiction denied.

The Grand Master performed 11 Official Acts requiring review. This includes the **response** listed in italics under the heading "The Grand Lodge of Arkansas", which the committee and the Grand Master agreed constituted an official act. The first listed Official Act, identified by the heading "September 22: Waterloo", was considered separately and is discussed in the next portion of this report. The other Official Acts were all reviewed and approved.

Report of the Committee on Jurisprudence regarding the Dispensations, Decisions and Opinions, and Official Acts of the Grand Master—Part 2

The Committee's reviewed the action of the Grand Master in removing Most Worshipful Brother Jack L. Butler from his position as a member of the board of Grand Lodge Trustees and Brother Butler's appeal of that action.

On September 22, 2012, the Grand Master called a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Grand Lodge. Following a series of discussions, he removed Jack L. Butler as a Trustee and appointed Raymond E. Clause to fill the unexpired term. On September 18, 2013, Jack L. Butler filed an appeal of his removal from the Board of Trustees. Since the Committee on Appeals and Grievances has the duty to "review" all appeals, the appeal had to first pass through that committee for review. However, since the Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence has the duty to review and approve the actions of the Grand Master, it was necessary that, following a review by Appeals and Grievances, the appeal be referred to the Jurisprudence Committee for final disposition as part of its review of the Grand Master's action.

The committee reviewed and discussed the stated actions of the Grand Master. They then reviewed and discussed the written appeal document.

A legal appeal has some very special restrictions. It cannot be a review strictly of a decision or a verdict. It must be based on some legal consideration such as a procedural mistake or a lack of proper authority. So the question to be answered by the committee was NOT "Did the Grand Master make the right decision?" A decision is a decision, whether by the Grand Master or by any other determining body, based on personal evaluation of evidence. The two questions the committee did have to answer were: (1) Did the Grand Master have the AUTHORITY to remove a member of a Grand Lodge Board? And (2) If the Grand Master had that

authority, did he follow proper procedures in arriving at his decision to do so.

Two points were considered in reviewing the first question, code provisions and precedents. The code does not deny the Grand Master the authority to make such a removal. In the absence of restrictive code provisions, the Grand Master's authority regarding Masonic matters within his Jurisdiction is practically absolute. Additionally, there is precedent in that Most Worshipful Brother Craig Davis removed a member of a different Grand Lodge board during his term of office. That action was approved by both the Jurisprudence Committee and the Grand Lodge. From the lack of restrictive code provisions and the recent precedent of an approved board member removal, the Jurisprudence Committee determined that the Grand Master does in fact have the authority to remove a member of a Grand Lodge board.

To determine a minimum level of procedural compliance, the Committee reviewed the procedure followed for the other, most recent and approved, removal of a board member. The sequence of that action was: (1) receipt of complaints regarding the performance of a brother on the board, (2) an investigation into the performance of that brother with respect to his duties on that board, (3) the decision that he should be removed, and (4) his removal. The committee then guestioned the Grand Master regarding the procedure followed for the removal of Brother Butler. The Grand Master indicated that he had received complaints and comments regarding Brother Butler's performance on the board, that he had reviewed reports and other documents from the board, that he had discussed the situation with other knowledgeable brothers and with legal counsel. He then called a meeting of the board to discuss the items he had uncovered with the board, to verify conclusions he had reached from his earlier research, and finally determined that the removal was warranted.

Since these steps included all the steps performed in the previous case of a Grand Lodge Board member removal, the Jurisprudence Committee determined that the Grand Master had followed appropriate steps in arriving at a decision to order the removal.

With the Jurisprudence Committee finding that the Grand Master had the authority to remove Most Worshipful Brother Jack Butler from the Board of Trustees, and with the finding that the Grand Master had followed appropriate and proper procedures in arriving at his decision to remove Brother Butler from the Board, the committee determined that the action of the Grand Master was in order and approved that action. This approval effectively denied the appeal filed by Brother Butler.

Report of the Committee on Jurisprudence Regarding Proposed Legislation

The committee reviewed each piece of proposed legislation regarding

revision to the Constitution and Laws using two separate criteria—asking two separate questions:

- 1. Is the legislation in proper form for adoption?
- 2. Does the committee recommend the adoption of the legislation?

For a piece of legislation to be found in proper form, it must be clear, it must be complete, and it must not conflict with other portions of the code. For the committee to recommend adoption, the legislation must be determined, in the opinion of the majority of the committee, to be good for the Grand Lodge, its subordinate Lodges, and their members.

Remember, regardless of the finding of the committee, either pro or con, this report is ONLY A RECOMMENDATION. The delegates are encouraged, in fact it is their duty, to consider each piece of legislation on its merits, and to vote for or against that legislation as they feel appropriate.

A. The first item of legislation is a proposal to cancel Article V, Section 1 of the Constitution and replace that section with substitute language. This piece of legislation would change the starting time for the Friday session of Grand Lodge to be no earlier than 1:00 PM. Please note a typographical error in point 1 of the explanation, which says "no later than 1:00 PM." That explanation should also say, "Not prior to." If this legislation is adopted, there would be no Friday morning session. If additional time is required to complete the work of Grand Lodge, it would mean an extension into later afternoon or evening on Friday and/or into the afternoon of Saturday.

Adoption of this proposal requires a two-thirds majority vote at two consecutive Annual Communications. If approved this year, it will then lay over and be voted on again next year. Only if approved both years, will it be adopted.

The committee believed that this change was totally unnecessary. In fact, the Grand Master has the option today of starting the session in the afternoon, if he determines that to be beneficial. Therefore, the effect of this proposal could be gained without legislation at the Grand Master's discretion, determined by the amount of work required during the session. Additionally, the committee thought that the current option of an earlier starting time could prevent some late hours under many possible circumstances.

The committee found this proposal to be in order for adoption but strongly recommends that it be rejected.

The next five groups of legislation are for revision of the Laws of the Grand Lodge and/or the Laws for Subordinate Lodges. They require only a simple majority during this session for adoption.

B. The second item of legislation is a proposal to cancel Chapter 3, Section 5, Subsection a (16) of the Laws of the Grand Lodge and replace that section with alternate text. This proposal would add the requirement that a PDF format copy of the proceedings be made available on the official Grand Lodge website.

The committee believed that while additional distribution of the proceedings via an electronic copy placed on the website was a good idea, they saw no reason to require it by code. The authority to distribute copies in this way already exists. Therefore this was viewed as micro-management, via code, of the Grand Secretary's office. Additionally, it was pointed out that there is a risk in specifying a specific electronic format, since those are subject to change over time. For example, many of us recall a time when Betamax tapes, or VHS tapes, or floppy diskettes were the preferred method of exchanging electronic information.

The committee found this proposal to be in order for adoption, but strongly recommends that it be rejected.

C. The third item of legislation proposes that Chapter 3, Section 5, subsection c of the Laws of the Grand Lodge be cancelled and replaced with alternate text. This change effectively adds four words to that referenced subsection, allowing the Grand Secretary's office to be located in the Grand Lodge Administration Building and Library in Cedar Rapids, "or its successor site."

The committee believed that this change was totally unnecessary, and that it addressed a nonexistent problem. They recognized that a natural disaster could make the current building unusable, but that the Grand Master, Grand Secretary, and Board of Trustees could readily adopt alternate locations in the event of a natural disaster, without a code change. It was also pointed out that the use of a similar phrase in an alternate section of the code was for a very different reason, namely to ensure compliance with Federal requirements regarding the beneficiary of a 501(c)3 charitable organization.

The committee found that the proposal was in order for adoption, but strongly recommends that it be rejected.

D. The fourth item of legislation proposes the addition of a new Chapter 10A to the Laws of the Grand lodge. This new chapter creates a new Board of Directors to administer a new Grand Lodge Iowa Masonic Child Identification Program.

The committee recognized that other Grand Lodges administer and support a state-wide Child ID program. They also acknowledged that programs such as CHIPS can be very beneficial. However, they believed that we should not create another new state-wide Grand Lodge Charitable program. They believed that programs such as this should be handled locally. There was significant concern about providing an improper focus for the fraternity. In other states, the CHIPS program has become the "reason to become a Mason" rather than a "Good thing that the Masons do". In fact, it seems to be the major focus for many surrounding states that provide this program. The question was also raised, "Who pays the bills?" The committee found the proposal to be in order for adoption, but strongly recommends that it be rejected.

E. The fifth item of legislation includes two resolutions which must be voted on together. The first resolution proposes the addition of the Iowa Academy of Masonic Knowledge Committee to the list of committees included in Chapter 11, Section 1 subsection a of the Laws of the Grand Lodge. Please note that the words "subsection a" were not printed due to a typographical error in the booklet. The second resolution proposes the addition of a new Chapter 11, Section 24 to the Laws of the Grand Lodge. This new section defines the committee, details how its members are appointed, and describes their duties.

The committee recognized that there is a need for Masonic Knowledge, but believed that the programs of the current ad hoc committee are very lightly utilized, and do not warrant the creation of a standing committee.

The committee found that this proposal was in order for adoption, but strongly recommends that it be rejected.

F. The sixth item of legislation proposes the cancellation of Chapter 40, Section 4, Subsection D of the Laws for Subordinate Lodges and its replacement with alternate text. The change would eliminate the dues exemption for 50-year members who were raised after January 1, 1964.

The committee recognizes that this, or similar, legislation has been brought before the Grand Lodge many times in the past. They all have personal emotional concerns with the proposal, but recognize the need for this change. They recognize that the benefits would accrue to not only the Grand Lodge, but also individual Lodges.

The committee found that this proposal was in order for adoption, and strongly recommends that it be adopted.

G. The final resolution, a proposal to adopt the recommendations of the Long Range Planning Committee, has been withdrawn by its sponsor and will not be considered.

The report of the Committee on Division and Reference will be given in three sections. Wade E. Sheeler will report on the Grand Secretary's Report and Terry E. Osborne will report on the Grand Librarian's Report.

Grand Master's Report

Grand Master Bryce B. Hildreth has worked hard in the quarries of Masonry this year. His motto this year has been "FREEMASONRY TIES THAT BIND" which has been well received and a huge success. Our ritual, the thing that set us apart from other service organization, has been

brought to the forefront by Grand Master Hildreth. He explained to us that ritual is one of the most important aspects of Freemasonry.

Grand Master Hildreth started his year running with many degrees, rededication and cornerstone ceremonies. He held eleven Grand Master Area Meetings across the state, which were well attended by the craft. His program for the evening started with an introduction of the Lodge Service Committee members who helped put on the program. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON DIVISION AND REFERENCE (On the Grand Secretary's Report)

The Committee on Division and Reference has received and reviewed the Grand Secretary's report. Bro. Crawford is to be commended for his continued enthusiasm and dedication to Iowa Masonry.

We congratulate Bro. Crawford on the two milestones that he mentioned in his report. He has faithfully served our Gentle Craft for over fourteen years in the office of Grand Secretary. We wish him continued health and happiness in his service to the Grand Lodge of Iowa. We also congratulate Bro. Bill on the delivery of his 500th sermon in June of this year. Bro. Bill faithfully and with a great deal of devotion serves not only the Masons of Iowa, but also his many parishioners.

The Grand Secretary fondly mentions the signing of the Resolution of Recognition between the Grand Lodge of Iowa A.F. & A.M. and the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Iowa F. & A.M. Inc. as being one of the proudest moments that he has had the privilege of participating in as Grand Secretary. This is a moment in time that all Iowa Masons should be justly proud of.

Bro. Bill mentions with fondness his many travels throughout our great state. He is indeed correct that Iowa has indeed been blessed by beautiful scenery, but even more importantly we have been blessed with a great and caring people. Bro. Crawford has represented the Grand Lodge of Iowa with dignity at the many conferences he has attended over the years both in Iowa and beyond. We thank him for the great work that he and his staff have done over the years in continuing to make the Grand Lodge of Iowa Museums and Library one of the premier Masonic research libraries in the world. Every Iowa Mason should be proud of this great treasure.

It is with pleasure that his report notes that two new lowa lodges have received their charters this past year, while another has received a dispensation to commence work, and another lodge will probably soon be requesting a dispensation. This is great news for lowa Masonry and indicates renewed interest in our fraternity.

Bro. Crawford notes that many lowa lodges are experiencing an increased level of degree work, but unfortunately there continues to be an increased need for brothers who are willing to learn various parts of the ritual to be of assistance to their local lodges.

It is with disappointment that Bro. Crawford's report shows a net loss in membership of 695 members. Although the rate of membership decline appears to be slowing, it still is a disappointment that we continue to lose brothers. Suspensions for nonpayment of dues continue to exceed the number of raisings.

The report notes that in 2012, 123 lodges showed no raisings (an increase of 17 over the prior year). The report further shows that 116 lodges showed no initiations in 2012 (an increase of eight over the prior

year). These are sad statistics in light of the increased interest in Freemasonry throughout society.

We congratulate those lodges which are noted in the report which raised more than 10 new brothers during the calendar year of 2012.

The Grand Secretary's report shows that the average initiation fee for lowa lodges in 2012 was \$72.73, an increase of \$2.70 over the prior year. The average annual dues were \$64.79, an increase of \$1.57 over the prior year.

One part of the Grand Secretary's Report that is always interesting to read is the section pertaining to the "10 Masons With Earliest 50 Year Recognition". This year Bro. Lewis J. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON DIVISION AND REFERENCE (On the Grand Librarian's Report)

The Committee on Division and Reference has received and reviewed the Report of the Iowa Masonic Library and Museums submitted by Bill Kreuger, Assistant Librarian.

This year has been a busy one as the Iowa Masonic Library and Museums continues to serve both masons and non-masons by providing requested information and materials. Typical requests include helping patrons with Masonic research, Masonic history, finding materials in the library, and providing books and reading materials. The Grand librarian and Assistant librarian are to be commended on the timely manner that requests are filled.

Many requests received from Prince Hall Masons are for copies of their Grand Lodge proceedings. When available, these are provided from our collection. These requests have been scanned and then made available in PDF format. These PDF files are then linked with the Library's electronic card catalog.

The Library continues an active collection program. Seven hundred nineteen titles have been added to the collection during the past year. This includes some duplicate titles but most are new titles. The majority of the books added are part of the Harvey collection of Landscape Architecture donated by Robert R. Harvey of Ames, Iowa.

The museum continues to add to its collections. Sixteen different collections were added in 2012 and four different collections in 2013. Items collected last year include a Scottish Rite watch fob of T. S. Parvin Consistory in Sioux City, c. 1910, an ID card of Erika Koberl dated April 1943, from Germany, and a 23 piece children's tea set, c. 1935. Items included in this year collections are a MOVPER scimitar, a Noritake Nippon porcelain sugar bowl and cream pitcher set, and a set of glass negatives showing the interior of Grant Wood's art studio, c. 1935.

The library continues to work converting the index Rerum periodical citations from hand-written index cards to a digital format that is compatible with our Library card catalog. More than 250,000 records have been converted into a digital format and have been added to the card catalog. These records are now available and searchable by title, author, and subject. It is noted that Martin Cherry, the Librarian of the Grand Lodge of England, has used this catalog to send several requests for periodical citations. A special thank you goes to the Masonic Charitable Education Corporation for funding this project.

Since January 2011, an ongoing project has been to bind many of the Masonic and non-Masonic periodicals that have been neglected. Since the beginning, more than 150 periodical titles have been bound.

More than 600 visitors have toured the library and museums during the past year. Visitors were made up of family groups, group tours from the local area, various clubs, school groups, as well as Masonic lodges from various parts of lowa.

Two students from the Public History program of the University of Northern Iowa worked as volunteers in the fall of 2012 and the spring of 2013. During their work they learned about both museum practices and research. During the fall, Troy Trafton worked with the World War I poster collection, a donation made in the 1920s by William Crofts-Bullen. In the spring of 2013, John Szymanek continued working on the collection. Several posters have been encapsulated and cataloged into the museum collection.

At the request of Grand Master Hildreth, duplicate Prince Hall Grand Lodge proceedings were donated to the United Grand Lodge of England's Library collection. In return, the United Grand Lodge of England donated several copies of the *Freemasons' calendar*, for the years 1781 to 1808. The exchange was made in May, during the time that the Grand Master's group visited London.

The Iowa Masonic Library and Museums continues good relations with other libraries, museums and Masonic libraries. The Assistant Librarian attended the annual meeting of the Masonic Library and Museum Association held in Stillwater, MN, in October 2012. He will be attending the MLMA meeting in September, 2013 in Alexandria, VA. This is part of a meeting entitled "The Quarry Project," which is a Masonic research and preservation conference that is being held at the George Washington Masonic National Memorial. During this meeting, the Assistant Librarian will be making two presentations as a part of two panels – one on libraries and the other focused on museum work.

The Assistant Librarian currently serves as treasurer on the board of Directors of the Iowa Conservation and Preservation Consortium. Previously he had served as president of the Board of the ICPC during the last two years.

During the November 2012 annual meeting of the Midwest Open-Air Museums Coordinating Council that was held in Cedar Rapids, the Assistant Librarian gave a presentation entitled "Fraternalism in the 19th and early 20th Century". The presentation included a Power-Point program of various fraternal regalia from the Museum's collection

The Assistant Librarian served as a judge for the local and state History Day competitions. The local History Day event was held in mid-March at the Old State Capitol in Iowa City. The state event was held in early May at the State Historical Building in Des Moines.

The Iowa Masonic Library and Museums Ioaned several of its Civil War related artifacts to the University of Iowa Old Capitol Museum for an exhibit entitles "Gone to See the Elephant." All borrowed materials were returned to the Iowa Masonic Library's collection safe and sound. During its run from late August, 2012, to May, 2013, the exhibit had more than 11,000 visitors.

The Iowa Masonic Library and Museums continues to be a member in several national, state and local organizations. These include the Masonic Library and Museum Association, the Iowa Library Association, the Iowa Museum Association, the Iowa Conservation and Preservation Consortium, the Iowa Cultural Corridor Alliance, the Cedar Rapids Area Convention and Visitors Bureau, and Silos and Smokestacks National Heritage Area.

Once again, the Iowa Masonic Library and Museums and the Grand Lodge of Iowa wish to thank the many volunteers that have given of their time and talents during the past year. They have helped with tours, preservation of Grand Lodge records, preservation and identification of items in the museum collection, research, envelope stuffing and getting mailings ready, and a variety of other tasks. Volunteers have donated over 1,980 hours of service. As a "thank you" volunteers have been treated to lunch on several occasions.

REPORT OF THE CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANTS

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

We have audited the accompanying consolidated financial statements of Grand Lodge of Iowa of Ancient, Free, and Accepted Masons (a nonprofit organization) and the Iowa Masonic Scholarship Endowment Fund (collectively referred to as the Organization), which comprise the consolidated statement of assets, liabilities and net assets – income tax basis as of July 31, 2013, and the related consolidated statement of support, revenue, expenses and other changes in net assets – income tax basis for the fiscal year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statement

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the basis of accounting the Organization uses for income tax purposes; this includes determining that the income tax basis of accounting is an acceptable basis for the preparation of the financial statements in the circumstances. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the assets, liabilities and net assets of the Organization, as of July 31, 2013, and its support, revenue, expenses and other changes in net assets for the fiscal year then ended in accordance with the basis of accounting the Organization uses for income tax purposes as described in Note 1.

Basis of Accounting

We draw attention to Note 1 of the financial statements, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial statements are prepared on the basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinion is not modified with respect to that matter.

Other Matter

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements taken as a whole. The consolidating statements of assets, liabilities and net assets - income tax basis, the consolidating statements of support, revenue, expenses and other changes in net assets - income tax basis, the schedule of cash receipts - Grand Lodge and schedule of cash disbursements -Grand Lodge on pages 11-17 are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and related directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements July 31, 2013

Note 1. Nature of Activities and Significant Accounting Policies

<u>Nature of Activities</u>: The Grand Lodge of Iowa of Ancient, Free, and Accepted Masons (Grand Lodge) purpose and activities are fraternal and charitable in nature. Subordinate lodges participate in a variety of charitable and civic activities such as student scholarships and helping needy families and individuals. The Grand Lodge supports these activities as well as scholarship programs, a student loan program, two nursing homes, Field Financial Aid, and participates with the Masonic Service Association of the United States and other Grand Lodges in financial relief for natural disasters.

The Iowa Masonic Scholarship Endowment Fund (Scholarship Fund) was officially established by the Board of Trustees of the Grand Lodge on September 18, 1974, under an irrevocable trust instrument for the purpose of providing college scholarships to deserving Iowa public high school seniors. The trustees of the Scholarship Fund are appointed by the Grand Master of the Grand Lodge.

Accounting Estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the income tax basis of accounting requires management to have a reasonable basis for the estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of support, revenues, expenses, gains, losses and other changes in net assets during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Because many types of transactions are susceptible to varying interpretations under federal income tax laws and regulations, the amounts reported in the accompanying financial statements may be subject to change at a later date upon final determination by the taxing authorities.

<u>Consolidation</u>: The consolidated financial statements include the Grand Lodge and the Scholarship Fund. All material intercompany accounts and transactions are eliminated in consolidation.

<u>Basis of Presentation</u>: Commencing with the year ended July 31, 2010, the Grand Lodge adopted the policy of preparing its financial statements on the accounting basis used for federal income tax purposes. For income tax purposes, the Grand Lodge has consolidated the Scholarship Fund. The federal income tax return is reported on the cash basis method with modifications for charity obligations. The income tax basis of accounting may differ from generally accepted accounting principles in the following significant respects. Certain revenues are recognized when received rather than when earned and certain expenses and purchases of assets are recognized when cash is disbursed rather than when earned and certain expenses incurred.

That basic differs from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America primarily because the Grand Lodge and the Scholarship Fund have not recognized any receivables, accrued investment income, capitalized purchases of property and equipment, accrued expenses, amounts due to vendors, or recorded the related effects on earnings.

Net assets and support, revenue, expenses, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets of the Grand Lodge and the Scholarship Fund and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Unrestricted: Unrestricted net assets include all net assets which are neither temporarily or permanently restricted.

Temporarily Restricted: Temporarily restricted net assets include contributed net assets for which donor-imposed time and purpose restrictions have not been met and the ultimate purpose of the contribution is not permanently restricted.

Permanently Restricted: Permanently restricted net assets include net assets subject to donorimposed stipulations that neither expire by passage of time, nor can be met by actions of the Organization. The Organization had no permanently restricted net assets at July 31, 2013.

<u>Support and Revenue</u>: All contributions are considered to be available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor or by law. Amounts received which are designated for future periods or restricted by the donor for specific purposes are reported as temporarily restricted or permanently restricted support. However, if a restriction is fulfilled in the same time period in which the contribution is received, the Grand Lodge reports the support as unrestricted. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reduced through expenses in the statement of support, revenue, expenses, and changes in net assets – income tax basis as net assets released from restrictions. The Grand Lodge is reliant primarily upon dues from its members, most of whom are lowa residents.

Contributions received by the Scholarship Fund under irrevocable split-interest agreements are recorded at their fair value when received. The date when the Scholarship Fund is considered to receive an irrevocable split-interest agreement depends on whether the Scholarship Fund or a third party is trustee for the agreement. If the Scholarship Fund is the trustee or fiscal agent of the assets, the gift is considered to received (and the split-interest agreement is recorded) when the donor executes the agreement. If an unrelated third party (such as bank, trust organization, or private individual) is the trustee or fiscal agent of the assets, the Scholarship Fund records the split-interest agreement when it is notified of the gift's existence.

If the Scholarship Fund holds or controls the assets contributed under an irrevocable split-interest agreement, it (1) records the assets received at their fair value, (2) records a liability for any portion of the assets that are held for the donor or other beneficiary equal to the present value of the unexpected future payments to be made to the donor or other beneficiary, and (3) records contribution revenue for the difference between the fair value of the assets received and the liability incurred.

Revenues are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets unless use of the related assets is limited by donor-imposed restrictions. Expenses are reported as decreases in unrestricted net assets.

<u>Cash and Cash Equivalents</u>: Cash and cash equivalents include all cash accounts which are not subject to withdrawal restrictions or penalties, and all liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less when purchased are considered to be cash equivalents.

<u>Concentrations of Credit Risk</u>: Financial instruments which subject to concentrations of credit risk consist primarily of investments in long-term corporate and government fixed income instruments, equity holdings of domestic corporations, money market accounts, certificates of deposit, and mutual funds. The Grand Lodge or Scholarship Fund maintains cash in banks which may, at times, exceed the Federal Deposit Insurance Company limits.

<u>Investments</u>: Investments are carried at cost. Investment income is reported in the statement of support, revenue, expense, and other changes in net assets – income tax basis as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted revenue based upon donor-imposed restrictions. Gains and investment income that are limited to specific uses by donor-imposed restrictions are reported in temporarily restricted net assets when the restrictions are met in the same period as the gains and income are recognized. The Scholarship Fund board has elected to return ten (10) percent of all investment income to the investment principal. Appreciation and depreciation of investments are recorded when realized. Investment fees for the fiscal year ended July 31, 2013 were \$25,554.

Income Taxes: The Grand Lodge is a non-profit organization that is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(10) of the Internal Revenue Code and applicable state law. The Grand Lodge's Form 990, Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax, for the fiscal years ended July 31, 2010, 2011, 2012, and 2013 are subject to examination by the IRS, generally for 3 years after they were due.

<u>Functional Expenses</u>: The costs of providing various program and supporting services have been summarized on a functional basis in the consolidated statement of support, revenue, expenses and other changes in net assets – income tax basis. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the program and supporting services benefited.

<u>Subsequent events</u>: The Grand Lodge has evaluated subsequent events through November 18, 2013, the date on which the financial statements were available for issuance. Management has determined that no other events or transactions have occurred through this date that would require recognition or disclosure within the consolidated financial statements.

Note 3. Employee Benefit Plans

The Grand Lodge participates in the Grand Lodge of Iowa, A. F. & A. M. Retirement Plan. The retirement plan is a multi-employer defined contribution pension plan covering substantially all of its employees and

the employees of the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities and the Herman L. Rowley Masonic Home. The various entities included in the pension plan fund their proportionate shares of the pension cost. The pension disbursement for the Grand Lodge's employees for the year fiscal ended July 31, 2013 totaled \$14,314.

Note 4. Line of Credit

The Organization has a line of credit providing for a maximum borrowing of \$100,000. Interest on the note is payable monthly at the prime rate (3.25% at July 31, 2013). The line of credit is secured by a certificate at Farmers & Merchants Savings Bank. The agreement expires in October 2014. There was no balance on the line of credit at July 31, 2013.

Note 5. Temporarily Restricted Net Assets

Note 6. Rental Income

The Grand Lodge leases a portion of the building to two unrelated entities. The lease terms expire in November 2013 and April 2014. Monthly rental payments due the Grand Lodge for these leases are \$580 and \$700 per month, respectively.

Note 7. Beneficial Interest in Split-Interest Agreements

The Scholarship Fund has been designated as a beneficiary of the Brown Family Masonic Scholarship Trust (the "Trust"). The Trust's assets are being held by the Masonic Charitable Educational Corporation (MCEC), a related party, until July 2026, at which time the assets will be transferred to the Scholarship Fund. Earnings of the Trust are to be allocated as follows: ten percent to be retained to maintain the value of the original principal and the remainder to be disbursed as scholarships to deserving students by MCEC. Since the financial statements are prepared under the tax basis method of accounting, these assets are not included in the financial statements.

Note 8. Split-Interest Agreement

The Organization administers a charitable remainder trust. A charitable remainder trust provides for the payment of distributions to the grantor or other designated beneficiaries over the trust's term (usually the designated beneficiary's lifetime). At the end of the trust's term, the remaining assets are available for the Organization's use. The portion of the trust attributable to the present value of the future benefits to be received by the Organization is recorded in the Consolidated statement of support, revenue, expenses and other changes in net assets – income tax basis as a temporarily restricted contribution in the period the trust is established. Assets held in the charitable remainder trusts totaled \$11,400 at July 31, 2013 and are reported at fair value in the Organization revalues the liability to make distributions to the designated beneficiaries based on actuarial assumptions. The present value of the estimated future

payments (\$6,913 at July 31, 2013) is calculated using a discount rate of 2% and applicable mortality tables.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE GRAND CHARITY BOARD

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

The Board of Trustees of the Grand Charity Funds of the Grand Lodge of Iowa, A.F. & A.M. presents its annual report for the 2012 - 2013 fiscal and Grand Lodge Year relating to its statutory role to carry out the charitable purposes of the Grand Lodge of Iowa. (Chap.6 (2) (a) of the Iowa Masonic code Laws of the Grand Lodge.)

MISSION STATEMENT:

Our Mission is two-fold and is guided by the requirements of the Masonic Code of Iowa and by the principles of Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth, which govern all Masons in this Grand Lodge.

- 1. We review and respond to each application for relief which is presented to us by a subordinate lodge, investigate the circumstances thereof, and grant such relief as is both needed and reasonable, and within the funds available to the Field Financial Aid Fund.
- 2. We oversee the operations of the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities (IMHF) and the Masonic Village, Inc. Independent Living Facility, as non-profit facilities. Both the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities and the Masonic Village serve Iowa Masons, their dependents or anyone who qualifies for residency and the services of those facilities, providing the highest quality of service and care possible to the resident in order to assure a desirable quality of life in their senior years.

GOVERNING:

The Field Financial Aid Fund, Iowa Masonic Health Facilities, and Masonic Village are governed by a Board of Trustees composed of members of the Iowa Masonic Family:

- Damian N. Hurmence, Treasurer, Mount Vernon Lodge No. 112, Mount Vernon
- Eldon F. Walton, Secretary, Crest City Lodge No. 522, Creston and Daylight Lodge No. 660, Des Moines

The Administrator of the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities and Masonic Village is Marsha J. Miller, who serves the Trustees as Executive Director and Recording Secretary.

The Trustees of the Grand Charity Funds meet monthly, usually on the fourth Friday of the month at the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities in Bettendorf, IA. Any Iowa Mason is invited to attend one of our meetings and to learn how the work of the Trustees is done. Each of the Trustees serves as a volunteer to oversee the Field Financial Aid Fund, the operations of Iowa Masonic Health Facilities and Masonic Village, and to supervise the work of the Executive Director.

THE PERMANENT GRAND CHARITY FUND AND FIELD FINANCIAL AID FUND

The Trustees of the Grand Charity Fund oversee the Permanent Grand Charity Fund and its investments; and distribute 90% of its annual income as the Field Financial Aid Program. By Masonic Code, 90% of the income of the Permanent Grand Charity Fund is transferred to the Field Financial Aid Fund each year. The Trustees distribute these funds at the request of the subordinate lodges to appropriate causes and persons, returning unused funds to the principal of the Permanent Fund at the end of each fiscal year.

The purpose of the Field Financial Aid Fund, one of the oldest Grand Lodge Charity Programs, is to assist subordinate lodges to meet charity requests, which they are unable to fully fund themselves. The Field Financial Aid is not meant to replace the responsibility of the local lodges to do charitable work, but to supplement, thus providing more assistance than would be possible by the local lodge alone.

At the beginning of the fiscal year the Permanent Grand Charity Fund was fully invested in the amount of \$1,542,824 and on July 31, 2013 was fully invested in the amount of \$1,704,203 (including unrealized gains and losses).

Each year we inform every subordinate lodge in the Grand Lodge of lowa of the existence of the Field Financial Aid Fund and encourage their applications to that fund.

From August 1, 2012 through July 31, 2013 we responded to eighteen applications making awards of \$24,670 from the Field Financial Aid Fund to supplement \$8,230 from local lodges who made application, for a grand total of \$32,900. The details of the individual request for aid and the amounts thereof are available with the consent of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees.

It is the goal of the Trustees of the Grand Charity funds to be able to distribute the entire 90% allotment of income during fiscal year 2013 – 2014 for the charitable purposes for which the fund was created.

IOWA MASONIC HEALTH FACILITIES AND MASONIC VILLAGE

MAJOR GOALS:

The major goal of Iowa Masonic Health Facilities is to provide a safe and caring environment that promotes the well being of its residents and protects the rights and dignity of each individual while providing quality care. The facility is inspected annually by the Iowa Department of Inspections and Appeals and when last inspected received an excellent survey review.

The major goal of the Masonic Village is to provide an independent living community for persons sixty years of age and older. With renewable annual leases now available, Masonic Village now has very few unoccupied villas.

SERVICES PROVIDED:

Iowa Masonic Health Facilities is a seventy-nine (79) dually certified skilled and intermediate nursing care facility. Seventy-seven of the rooms are private, one room is semi-private, and one room is reserved as a respite room to serve Masonic Village residents should the need arise. Eighteen of the seventy-nine licensed beds are designated to the Ann Ruge Special Care Unit for Alzheimer's Disease and related disorders as approved by the Iowa Department of Inspections and Appeals. Services available to each resident of the facility include all aspects of healthcare for the elderly. There are approximately 108 persons on staff at the facility providing professional services to each resident. Departments include nursing, activities, social services and counseling, housekeeping, dietary services, maintenance, and administration.

This year has seen the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities receive an extensive renovation throughout the facility that is scheduled for completion in August of 2013. The renovation includes new lighting, flooring, wall finishes, personalized recessed shelves, and hardwood handrails in all corridors. A new chapel is being built, the reception area is being converted to cozy visiting areas with a library, the community center is being renovated, and a new, enlarged deck is being built. We have started the next phase of the renovation which will modernize the nurses' stations and allow us to deliver our services to clients more efficiently. We encourage all Masons and their ladies to visit.

The facility was also awarded a five-star ranking by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, based on surveys conducted by the Iowa Department of Inspections and Appeals and on clinical information submitted to the federal government by all nursing homes for all residents being served. This award is the highest rating possible and is a real tribute to the dedication, skill, and personality of the staff which serves the facility.

In addition to long-term care, the facility offers skilled nursing and extensive therapy services. Many residents come to the facility for

rehabilitation following surgery or other hospitalizations, receive therapies, and return to their homes. Priority admission continues to be given to Masons and their families.

Masonic Village provides forty (40) independent living apartments under the Continuing Care Retirement Community Act of Iowa. The Village offers freedom from unwanted responsibility for its residents. Additional services include social and recreational activities, light housecleaning, transportation, and counseling. The fees and rents received also provide for total maintenance, twenty-four (24) hour security, and emergency medical services on a twenty – four (24) hour basis, trash collection, and all utilities. We now offer limited home health services as well. If a resident finds it necessary to receive nursing home care, Masonic Village residents have priority admission to Iowa Masonic Health Facilities.

At the present time Masons and families of Masons who become resident of Masonic Village receive a discount for the fees. For further details please call (563) 359-9171.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT: Iowa Masonic Health Facilities is supported by the fees received from private pay residents, Medicare, Medicaid, private insurance and the income from the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities Endowment Fund, and the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities Fund, along with the amount which is designated as part of Grand Lodge Dues.

Each year we receive income from trusts and bequest of Masons and their families, which supplement the funds available to the Endowment Fund and Facilities Fund. On July 31, 2013 the Endowment was fully invested at \$1,172,143 and the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities Fund was fully invested at \$2,849,139. In addition there is a designated fund for a chapel at Iowa Masonic Health Facilities in the amount of \$146,025

The income from the Endowment and the Facility funds, together with gifts from Masons and lodges, are another act of Masonic Charity to compensate for the shortage of reimbursements received from Medicaid (Due to low reimbursement rates.). Approximately 40.8% of the operating income of Iowa Masonic Health Facilities comes from Medicaid. These funds, however, do not pay the total cost of care of these residents, as the reimbursement is only 84% of the per diem cost of care. The charity of Iowa Masons has made it possible to make up this difference without invading the principal of any invested fund.

In addition, 149 Iowa subordinate lodges have contributed a total of \$10,861 to the Sunshine Fund of Iowa Masonic Health Facilities. This fund purchases many amenities for the residents of Iowa Masonic Health Facilities, such as Christmas gifts for all residents, birthday gifts and spending money for resident who have no other source of funds, clothing, shoes, and personal items. Group amenities such as the aviaries, newspaper and magazine subscriptions, books on tape, large screen

television for lounges, furniture, and other decorative items are also purchased from these generous contributions by Iowa Masons.

In compliance with Chapter 6 Sec. 7 (e) of the Iowa Masonic Code, we have approved a budget of fiscal year 2013 -2014 of \$5,210,459 for Iowa Masonic Health Facilities, with capital expenditures limited to emergencies only. The budget for Masonic Village for the same period has been approved in the amount of \$423,137, with capital expenditures for emergencies only.

INSURANCE AND APPRAISALS: All insurance policies and appraisals of the properties of the Trustees of the Grand Charity Funds are available for inspections at the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities Executive Offices in Bettendorf.

VOLUNTEERS AND SPECIAL THANKS

Many individuals and groups have contributed their time, energy, and often their funds to Iowa Masonic Health Facilities and Masonic Village. The Trustees of the Grand Charity Funds would like to extend our thanks for these groups.

The Care Review Committee members are Mr. John Ortega and Mr. Bob Holiday.

The Care Review Committee is an official body recommended by the lowa State Department of Inspections and Appeals as one of the standards for maintaining quality in a long-term care facility. These caring volunteers act as advocates for the residents and assist in protecting their rights.

The Local Masonic Community: The grateful thanks of the Trustees go out to the brothers of the local Masonic lodges who do so much to make the life of those at Iowa Masonic Health Facilities better. Special thanks go to Hamilton Lodge No. 664 and Early Morning Lodge No. 672 for their time and assistance with numerous events and programs at Iowa Masonic Health Facilities, as well as their monetary contributions. Thanks also to Davenport Lodge No. 37 and Brubaker Lodge No. 675 for their interest and support of the facility.

Thanks also go to the Davenport Eastern Star Chapters for their faithful participation in the facility picnic and special projects each year and to the Mohassan Grotto and Scottish Rite for their generosity and continued support.

Residents: We also appreciate the several Masonic Village residents who contribute their time and talents to the Health Facilities and Village in so many ways and areas. Notes to Financial Statements July 31, 2013 and 2012

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Consolidated Statement

The accompanying consolidated financial statements included the accounts of the Trustees of the Grand Charity Funds of the Grand Lodge of Iowa A.F. and A.M. and the Masonic Village, Inc. (collectively known as the Organization). Inter-entity transactions and balances have been eliminated in the consolidation.

The companies are consolidated since the Board of Trustees of the Grand Charity Funds of the Grand Lodge of Iowa A.F. & A.M. and the Board of Directors of Masonic Village, Inc. consist of the same individuals.

Nature of Business

Trustees of the Grand Charity Funds of the Lodge of Iowa A.F. and A.M. (Iowa Masonic Health Facilities) is an Iowa non-profit corporation that was established for the purpose of providing housing and health care nursing services to residents through operation of a 79 bed nursing facility. The nursing facility beds are dually certified for Medicare and Medicaid participation and include 18 beds that are licensed for residents with chronically confused and dementing illnesses (CCDI).

The Masonic Village, Inc. is an Iowa non-profit corporation that provides housing for senior citizens through the operation of a retirement facility containing 40 independent living apartments.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses, including functional allocations, during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include certain investments in highly liquid debt instruments with original maturities of three months of less, excluding amounts whose use is limited by board designation.

Resident Receivables

Resident receivables are stated at the amount management expects to collect from outstanding balances. Management provides for probable uncollectible amounts through a provision for bad debt expenses and an adjustment to the valuation allowance based on its assessment of the current status of individual accounts. Balances that are still outstanding after management has used reasonable collection efforts are written off through a charge to the valuation allowance and a credit to the accounts receivable. Changes in the valuation allowance have not been material to the financial statements.

Assets Limited as to Use

Capital Improvements - Funds designated for capital improvements.

Field Financial Aid – Funds designated for funding Field Financial Aid distributions.

<u>Board Designated Funds</u> – Funds designated to be used at the discretion of the Board for specific purposes at Masonic Village, Inc.

<u>Charitable Assistance</u> – Funds designated to provide charitable assistance to residents of Masonic Village, Inc.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment is stated at cost and is being depreciated by the straight-line method over the following estimated useful lives:

Depreciation expense for the years ended July 31, 2013 and 2012 was \$476,683 and \$490,449, respectively.

Additions and betterments of \$5,000 or more are capitalized, while maintenance and repairs that do not improve or extend useful lives of the respective assets are charged to operations when incurred. When property, plant, and equipment are sold or otherwise disposed of, the asset account and related accumulated depreciation account are relieved, and any gain or loss is included in operations.

Investments

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the consolidated statements of financial position. Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest, and dividends) is included in operating income (loss) unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from operating income (loss) unless the investments are trading securities.

Refundable Advance Fees

For residents occupying independent living apartments under advance fee contracts, the Organization provides for a declining refundable advance fee amount based upon the length of the residency for residents occupying the apartments. The refundable amount will not decline to less than 50% of the deposit.

Deferred Revenue from Advance Fees

Fees paid by a resident upon entering into an advance fee contract, net of the portion thereof that is refundable to the resident, are recorded as deferred revenue and are amortized to income using the straight-line method over the contract term. Residents are also charged monthly apartment service fees for utilities, maintenance, and other services, which are recognized as revenue when the service is provided.

Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Organization has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Organization in perpetuity.

Operating Income (Loss)

The consolidated statements of activities include operating income (loss). Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from operating income (loss), consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets.)

Net Resident Service Revenue

Net resident service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amount from residents, third-party payers, and others for services rendered.

Revenue from certain third-party payor agreements is subject to audit and retroactive adjustment. Provisions for estimated third-party payor settlements are provided in the period the related services rendered. Differences between the estimated amounts accrued and interim and final settlements are reported in operations in the year of settlement.

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretations. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term.

The Organization recognizes on the date services is rendered. The related expenses are estimated and accrued accordingly.

Contributions and Donor – Restricted Funds

The Organization reports gifts of cash and other assets at fair value as restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. Donor-restricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reflected as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying financial statements.

The Organization reports gifts of land, buildings, and equipment at fair value as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gift of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, the Organization reports expiration of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are place in service.

Contributions not restricted by donors are recorded as revenue in unrestricted net assets.

Contributed Services

Volunteers provide assistance to the Organization for its programs and other activities. No value has been assigned to these services and, as such, the value of these services is not reflected in the financial statements as revenue and expense.

Advertising

Advertising costs are expenses as incurred. Advertising expense totaled \$9,328 and \$14,083 for the years ended July 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

Income Taxes and Accounting for Uncertain Tax Positions

Trustees of the Grand Charity Funds of the Grand Lodge of Iowa A.F. & A.M. and Masonic Village, Inc. are non-profit organizations are exempt under Code Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Therefore, no provision for income taxes is presented in these consolidated financial statements.

The Organization has adopted the accounting standard regarding "Accounting for Uncertain Tax Positions." This standard provides detailed tax guidance for financial statement recognition measurement, and disclosure of uncertain tax positions recognized in the entity's financial statements. It requires an entity to recognize the financial statement benefit of a tax position when it is more likely than not that the position will be sustained upon examination. The adoption of this standard had no material effect on the

Organization's financial position, results of operation, or cash flow. The Organization's Forms 990 for 2009, 2010, and 2011 are subject to examination by the IRS, generally for three years after they were filed.

Reclassifications

Certain items in the prior year's financial statement have been reclassified to conform with current year presentation. Such reclassifications have no effect on net income as previously stated.

Financial Accounting Standards Board for *Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures* establishes a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. This hierarchy consists of three broad levels: Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets and have the highest priority, and Level 3 inputs have the lowest priority. The Organization uses appropriate valuation techniques based on the available inputs to measure the fair value of its investments. When available, the Organization measures fair value using Level 1 inputs because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value.

Level 1 Fair Value Measurements

Fair values for assets limited as to use and investments are determined by reference to quoted market prices and other relevant information generated by market transactions.

Level 2 Fair Value Measurements

Valuation is based upon quoted prices for similar instruments in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar instruments in markets that are not active, and model-based valuation techniques for which all significant assumptions are observable in the market.

Permanently restricted net assets are assets that are endowed by the donor. The interest and dividend income from the Permanent Grand Charity Fund is required to be released annually to fund Field Financial Aid and the remaining interest and dividend income is restricted to the permanent fund. The interest income from the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities Endowment is available for use in the operations of the Organization. NOTE 7 - ENDOWMENT

The Organization's Permanent Grand Charity Fund was established to provide Field Financial Aid to Masons in the State of Iowa. The endowment consists of restricted endowment funds and the cumulative investment return on the funds after distribution of Field Financial Aid. The Organization's Iowa Masonic Health Facilities Endowment was established to provide income to be used to support the operations of the Organization. The endowment consists of donor-restricted endowment funds. As required by generally

accepted accounting principles, net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

Interpretation of Relevant Law

The Board of Directors and Trustees of the Organization has interpreted the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Organization classifies as permanently restricted net assets the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment. In accordance with the Masonic Code of lowa, the undistributed income from the Permanent Grand Charity Funds is permanently restricted and the income from the lowa Masonic Health Facilities Fund is unrestricted for operations.

Return Objectives and Risk Parameters

The Organization has adopted investment and spending policies for endowment assets that attempt to provide grow a stream of funding for programs supported by its endowments.

Strategies Employed for Achieving Objectives

To satisfy its long-term rate-of-return objectives, the Organization relies on a total return strategy in which investment returns are achieved through both unrealized gains and interest and dividends.

Spending Policy

Ninety percent of the earnings from the Permanent Grand Charity Fund are to be used for Field Financial Aid which is distributed through the approval of applications by the Board of Directors. These funds are to be used to support the cause of all Grand Lodge charity other than the operation and maintenance of the nursing facility, as approved by the Board of Directors. The remaining 10% of earnings is to be retained in the fund. All earnings from the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities Endowment are available for the operations of the Organization.

NOTE 8 - REFUNDABLE ADVANCE FEES AND DEFERRED REVENUE FROM ADVANCE FEES

Residents of Masonic Village, Inc. may either lease apartment units or pay an advance fee, which allows the resident lifetime residency rights to a specific apartment unit.

A portion of the advance refundable deposit is refundable to the resident. The refundable fee becomes non-refundable at a rate of 20% the first year and 5% each following year of the base amount not to decrease below 50% of the base refundable amount. Refunds are made subject to the residency requirement.

NOTE 9 – RETIREMENT PLAN

The Organization provides a 401(k) plan for its employees. The Plan covers all employees age 21 and older and worked at least 1,000 hours during the year. The Organization contributes 5% of gross compensation for all eligible employees and matches 50% of the first 2% of employee contributions. Vesting of employer contributions is based on years of service. During the years ended July 31, 2012 and 2011 employer contributions totaled \$157,315 and \$154,850, respectively and have been charged to salaries and benefits on the consolidated statements of activities.

NOTE 11 - CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

Most of the Organization's business activity is with residents of the facility. Trustees of the Grand Charity Funds of the Grand Lodge of Iowa A.F. and A.M. (Iowa Masonic Health Facilities) are under a contractual agreement with the Iowa Department of Human Services as a licensed provider of Title XIX care (Medicaid). Revenue received from this source approximated \$1,967,000 and \$2,114,000 for the years ended July 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. Included in revenue for the years ended July 31, 2013 and 2012 was provider tax revenue net of provider tax paid \$97,637 and \$103,619, respectively. Receivables from the Iowa Department of Human Services on behalf of residents at July 31, 2013 and 2012 were \$100,447 and \$154,004, respectively.

The Organization is also under a contractual agreement with the Department of Health and Human Services – Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services as a licensed provider of Title XVIII (Medicare). Revenue received from this source approximated \$498,000 and \$738,000 for the years ended July 31, 2013 and 2012 respectively. Receivables from Medicare on behalf of residents at July 31, 2013 and 2012 were \$90,056 and \$155,309, respectively.

The Organization has funds deposited in certain banks, which at times exceed the FDIC Insurance provided in these banks of \$250,000 at July 31, 2013 and 2012. The increase of the FDIC insurance of up to \$250,000 is in effect through December 31, 2013 and is subject to change. At July 31, 2013 and 2012, the amount in excess of the FDIC Insurance totaled none and \$156,134, respectively.

At July 31, 2013 and 2013, the Organization had assets limited as to use and investments with a fair value approximate fair value of \$6,878,799 and \$6,693,897, respectively, which are subject to the market risks inherent in the individual investments.

NOTE 12 - CONCENTRATION IN STATE MEDICAID PROGRAM

The Organization has all of its nursing beds designated for care of patients under the state's Medicaid program. The current funding of that program is 30 days behind filed claims. The current state budget has no provision for reducing the lag, and the proposed budget for next year includes no assurance of increased funding.

NOTE 13 - THIRD PARTY RATE ADJUSTMENTS AND REVENUE

Revenue from the Medicaid program accounted for approximately 37% and 38% of total net resident service revenue for the years ended July 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. Revenue from the Medicare program accounted for approximately 9% and 13% of total net resident service revenue for the years ended July 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. Laws and regulations governing the Medicaid and Medicare programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term.

NOTE 14 – COMMITMENTS

The Organization has entered into a construction contract for campus renovations totaling \$1,058,042. Costs incurred under the contract at July 31, 2013 were \$602,267.

NOTE 15 - SUBSEQUENT EVENT

The date to which events occurring after July 31, 2013, the date of the most recent statement of financial position, have been evaluated for possible adjustment to the financial statements or disclosure is November 20, 2013, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

The following is the Trustees of the Iowa Masonic Scholarship Endowment Fund report for the fiscal year ending July 31, 2013.

The total gross receipts for the year were \$163,835.67 and were received from the following sources:

Income	<u>\$156,957.67</u>
Total Receipts	\$163,835.67

Contributions of \$6,878.00 were added to the Fund as required by the Trust Agreement. The investment income receipts of \$156,957.67 were used to pay the expenses of General Administration (\$4,600.89), Scholarship Selection Committee (\$927.99), the Annual Audit and Tax Service (\$0.00), Investment and Custodial Services (\$19,589.69), and sixty (60) Scholarships of \$2,000 each (\$120,000), for total disbursements of \$145,118.57 leaving an excess of income over disbursements of \$11,839.10. In addition, during the fiscal year the investments in the Endowment Fund increased in value by \$167,388.86 as a result of realized and unrealized gains and losses.

Based on the 8/1/2012 beginning value, total earnings before distributions and expenses were 8.98%. Net of distributions and expenses the account value increased 5.20%

The Endowment Fund is the remainder beneficiary of a Charitable Remainder Annuity Trust from Brother Roy G Thompson and his wife which provides an annual annuity payment to Mrs. Thompson during her lifetime and becomes the property of the Endowment Fund after her death. The present value of this Annuity Trust on July 31, 2013 was \$4,487.18.

Itemized lists of the Assets of the Endowment Fund and a schedule of Receipts and Disbursements for the fiscal year are attached hereto and are made a part of this report.

MASONIC CHARITABLE EDUCATIONAL CORPORATION Notes to Financial Statement

Note 1. Nature of Activities and Significant Accounting Policies

<u>Nature of activities:</u> The purpose of the Masonic Charitable Educational Corporation (Organization) is to solicit, receive and provide scholarships and low interest student loans to deserving persons who are sponsored by members of the Grand Lodge of Iowa, A.F. & A.M. and who are primarily residents of the State of Iowa. The foundation is legally a not-for-profit organization. The trustees of the Corporation are appointed by the Grand Master of Masons in Iowa.

Accounting estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

A summary of the Corporation's significant account policies follows:

Basis of presentation: The Corporation's policy is to prepare its financial statement on the modified cash basis of accounting with modifications for investments purchased, and a liability arising under a split-interest agreement. Consequently, certain revenues are recognized when received rather than when earned and certain expenses and purchases of assets are recognized when cash is disbursed rather than when the obligation is incurred. That basis differs from generally accepted account principles primarily because the Organization has not recognized accrued investment income or accrued expenses or amounts due vendors nor their related effects on earnings. In addition, when the Organization is a beneficiary of a perpetual trust that is held by a third-party those amounts are not recorded.

<u>Net assets</u>: Net assets are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restriction. The following is a description of each class.

Unrestricted. Unrestricted net assets include all net assets which are neither temporarily or permanently restricted.

Temporarily Restricted. Temporarily restricted net assets include contributed net assets for which donorimposed time and purpose restrictions have not been met and the ultimate purpose of the contribution is not permanently restricted.

Permanently Restricted Net Assets. Permanently restricted net assets include net assets subject to donorimposed stipulations that neither expire by passage of time, more can be met by actions of the Corporation. The Corporation has no permanently restricted assets at July 31, 2011 or July 31, 2010.

Support and Revenue. All contributions are considered to be available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor or by law. Amounts received which are designated for future periods or restricted by the donor for specific purposes are reported as temporarily restricted or permanently restricted support. However, if a restriction is fulfilled in the same time period in which the contribution is received, the Corporation reports the support unrestricted. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of support, revenue, expenses and changes in net assets – modified cash basis as net assets released from restrictions.

Contributions received by the Corporation under irrevocable split-interest agreements are recorded at their fair value when received. The date when the Corporation is considered to receive an irrevocable split-interest agreement depends on whether the Corporation or a third party is the trustee for the agreement. If the Corporation is the trustee or fiscal agent of the assets, the gift is considered received (and the split-interest agreement is recorded) when the donor executes the agreement. If an unrelated third party (such as bank, trust company, or private individual) is the trustee or fiscal agent of the assets, the Corporation records split-interest agreement when it is notified of the gift's existence.

If the Corporation holds or controls the assets contributed under an irrevocable split-interest agreement, if (1) records the assets received at their fair value, (2) records a liability for any portion of the assets that are held for the donor of other beneficiary equal to the present value of the expected future payments to be made to the donor of other beneficiary, and (3) records contribution revenue for the difference between the fair value of the assets received and the liability incurred.

<u>Cash and cash equivalents:</u> The Corporation considers all liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents.

<u>Student loan receivables</u>: Student loan receivables are carried at original invoice amount less an estimate made for doubtful receivables based on a review of all outstanding amounts on a monthly basis. Management determines the allowance for doubtful accounts by identifying troubled accounts and by using historical experience applied to an aging of accounts. Trade receivables are written off when deemed uncollectible. Recoveries of trade receivables previously written off are recorded when received. The provision for doubtful accounts at July 31, 2011 and 2010 was \$18,500 and \$20,584, respectively.

Interest is charged on the student loan receivables at a rate of approximately 5% at July 31, 2011.

<u>Investments:</u> Investments are carried at fair value, except for certificates of deposit which are carried at cost.. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 5 for discussion of fair value measurements. Absent donor specific requirement, unrealized gains and losses on investments are reported in unrestricted net assets. The board has elected to return ten percent of all investment income to the investment principal.

Proceedings of the Grand Lodge of Iowa, Des Moines 2013

Income taxes: The Organization is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and, accordingly no provision for income taxes is reflected in the financial statements. The Corporation is not a private foundation under provisions of Section 509(a)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

In accordance with Accounting in Income Taxes, management has evaluated their material tax positions and determined that there are no material uncertain tax positions. The Organization is no longer subject to US Federal income tax examinations by tax authorities for the years before July 31, 2008.

<u>Risks and Uncertainties:</u> The Corporation invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed at various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the account balances and the amounts reported in the Statements of Assets, Liabilities and Net Assets.

<u>Subsequent events:</u> The Corporation has evaluated subsequent events through May 31, 2013, the date the financial statements were available to be issued. Management has determined that there were no events or transactions that have occurred through this date that would require recognition or disclosure in the financial statements.

Note 3. Split-Interest Agreement

The Organization has been named trustee by the donor of assets held under a split-interest agreement. The agreement requires the Organization to retain 10% of the net earnings of the donated amount (to maintain values of original donation) and to provide scholarships with the remaining 90% of net earnings. The original donated amount plus the retained earnings are to be transferred to the Iowa Masonic Scholarship Fund ("IMSEF") in 2026 and are shown as a liability. The portion to be used to provide scholarships are shown as temporarily restricted.

Note 4. Linderman Trust

Since all assets are held by a third-party trustee under the modified cash basis of accounting, assets of the Charles Linderman Memorial Trust are not included in the financial statements. The trust agreement provides that all income received shall be distributed to the Masonic Charitable Education Organization.

Note 5. Fair Value Measurements

Fair Value Measurements, as described by the FASB Accounting Standards Codification, establishes a framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1 measurements) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3 measurements). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Organization has the ability to access as of the measurement date. Level 1 inputs would also include investments valued at prices in active markets that the Organization has access to where transactions occur with sufficient frequency and volume to provide reliable pricing information.

Level 2: Significant other observable inputs other than Level 1 prices such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in markets that are not active; or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data.

Level 3: Significant unobservable inputs that reflect a reporting entity's own assumptions about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing an asset or liability.

The asset's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimizes the use of unobservable inputs.

Following are descriptions of the valuation methodology used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodology used at July 31, 2011 and 2010:

<u>Common and preferred stock</u>: are valued at the closing price reported in the active market in which the individual security is traded.

Money market funds: are valued at their net asset value (NAV) as calculated by the institution sponsoring the funds.

Mutual funds: are valued based on quoted market prices in the active market in which they were traded.

Corporate bonds: are valued at the closing price reported in the active market in which the bond is traded.

Government bonds: are valued by reference to other bonds of similar credit and duration.

The methods described above and on the previous page may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Organization believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Note 1. Nature of Activities and Significant Accounting Policies

<u>Nature of activities:</u> The purpose of the Masonic Charitable Educational Corporation (Organization) is to solicit, receive and provide scholarships and low interest student loans to deserving persons who are sponsored by members of the Grand Lodge of Iowa, A.F. & A.M. and who are primarily residents of the State of Iowa. The foundation is legally a not-for-profit organization. The trustees of the Corporation are appointed by the Grand Master of Masons in Iowa.

Accounting estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

A summary of the Corporation's significant account policies follows:

<u>Basis of presentation</u>: The Corporation's policy is to prepare its financial statement on the modified cash basis of accounting with modifications for investments purchased, and a liability arising under a split-interest agreement. Consequently, certain revenues are recognized when received rather than when earned and certain expenses and purchases of assets are recognized when received rather than when the obligation is incurred. That basis differs from generally accepted account principles primarily because the Organization has not recognized accrued investment income or accrued expenses or amounts due vendors nor their related effects on earnings. In addition, when the Organization is a beneficiary of a perpetual trust that is held by a third-party those amounts are not recorded.

<u>Net assets</u>: Net assets are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restriction. The following is a description of each class.

Unrestricted. Unrestricted net assets include all net assets which are neither temporarily or permanently restricted.

Temporarily Restricted. Temporarily restricted net assets include contributed net assets for which donorimposed time and purpose restrictions have not been met and the ultimate purpose of the contribution is not permanently restricted.

Permanently Restricted Net Assets. Permanently restricted net assets include net assets subject to donorimposed stipulations that neither expire by passage of time, more can be met by actions of the Corporation. The Corporation has no permanently restricted assets at July 31, 2012 or July 31, 2011.

Support and Revenue. All contributions are considered to be available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor or by law. Amounts received which are designated for future periods or restricted by the donor for specific purposes are reported as temporarily restricted or permanently restricted support. However, if a restriction is fulfilled in the same time period in which the contribution is received, the Corporation reports the support unrestricted. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of support, revenue, expenses and changes in net assets – modified cash basis as net assets released from restrictions.

Contributions received by the Corporation under irrevocable split-interest agreements are recorded at their fair value when received. The date when the Corporation is considered to receive an irrevocable split-interest agreement depends on whether the Corporation or a third party is the trustee for the agreement. If the Corporation is the trustee or fiscal agent of the assets, the gift is considered received (and the split-interest agreement is recorded) when the donor executes the agreement. If an unrelated third party (such as bank, trust company, or private individual) is the trustee or fiscal agent of the assets, the Corporation records split-interest agreement when it is notified of the gift's existence.

If the Corporation holds or controls the assets contributed under an irrevocable split-interest agreement, if (1) records the assets received at their fair value, (2) records a liability for any portion of the assets that are held for the donor of other beneficiary equal to the present value of the expected future payments to be made to the donor of other beneficiary, and (3) records contribution revenue for the difference between the fair value of the assets received and the liability incurred. <u>Cash and cash equivalents:</u> The Corporation considers all liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents.

<u>Student loan receivables</u>: Student loan receivables are carried at original invoice amount less an estimate made for doubtful receivables based on a review of all outstanding amounts on a monthly basis. Management determines the allowance for doubtful accounts by identifying troubled accounts and by using historical experience applied to an aging of accounts. Trade receivables are written off when deemed uncollectible. Recoveries of trade receivables previously written off are recorded when received. The provision for doubtful accounts at July 31, 2012 and 2011 was none and \$18,500, respectively.

Interest is charged on the student loan receivables at a rate of approximately 5% at July 31, 2012.

<u>Investments:</u> Investments are carried at fair value, except for certificates of deposit which are carried at cost. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 5 for discussion of fair value measurements. Absent donor specific requirement, unrealized gains and losses on investments are reported in unrestricted net assets. The board has elected to return ten percent of all investment income to the investment principal.

Income taxes: The Organization is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and, accordingly no provision for income taxes is reflected in the financial statements. The Corporation is not a private foundation under provisions of Section 509(a)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

In accordance with Accounting in Income Taxes, management has evaluated their material tax positions and determined that there are no material uncertain tax positions. The Organization is no longer subject to US Federal income tax examinations by tax authorities for the years before July 31, 2010.

<u>Risks and Uncertainties:</u> The Corporation invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed at various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the account balances and the amounts reported in the Statements of Assets, Liabilities and Net Assets.

<u>Subsequent events</u>: The Corporation has evaluated subsequent events through May 31, 2013, the date the financial statements were available to be issued. Management has determined that there were no events or transactions that have occurred through this date that would require recognition or disclosure in the financial statements.

Note 4. Split-Interest Agreement

The Organization has been named trustee by the donor of assets held under a split-interest agreement. The agreement requires the Organization to retain 10% of the net earnings of the donated amount (to maintain values of original donation) and to provide scholarships with the remaining 90% of net earnings. The original donated amount plus the retained earnings are to be transferred to the Iowa Masonic Scholarship Fund ("IMSEF") in 2026 and are shown as a liability. The portion to be used to provide scholarships are shown as temporarily restricted.

Note 6. Fair Value Measurements

ASC 820 defines fair value as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants. SC 820 also establishes a fair value hierarchy for valuation inputs that gives the highest priority to quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs. The fair value hierarchy is as follows:

Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Organization has the ability to access as of the measurement date. Level 1 inputs would also include investments valued at prices in active markets that the Organization has access to where transactions occur with sufficient frequency and volume to provide reliable pricing information.

Level 2: Significant other observable inputs other than Level 1 prices such as quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities; quoted prices in markets that are not active; or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data.

Level 3: Significant unobservable inputs that reflect a reporting entity's own assumptions about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing an asset or liability.

The asset's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimizes the use of unobservable inputs.

Following are descriptions of the valuation methodology used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodology used at July 31, 2012 and 2011:

<u>Common and preferred stock</u>: are valued at the closing price reported in the active market in which the individual security is traded.

Money market funds: are valued at their net asset value (NAV) as calculated by the institution sponsoring the funds.

Mutual funds: are valued based on quoted market prices in the active market in which they were traded.

Corporate bonds: are valued at the closing price reported in the active market in which the bond is traded.

Government bonds: are valued by reference to other bonds of similar credit and duration.

The methods described above and on the previous page may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Organization believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

If the Organization holds or controls the assets contributed under an irrevocable split-interest agreement, if (1) records the assets received at their fair value, (2) records a liability for any portion of the assets that are held for the donor of other beneficiary equal to the present value of the expected future payments to be made to the donor of other beneficiary, and (3) records contribution revenue for the difference between the fair value of the assets received and the liability incurred.

Revenues are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets unless use of the related assets is limited by donor-imposed restrictions. Expenses are reported as decreases in unrestricted net assets.

<u>Cash and cash equivalents:</u> The Organization considers all liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents.

<u>Student loan receivables</u>: Student loan receivables, that are generally unsecured, are carried at original loan amount less an estimate made for doubtful receivables based on a review of all outstanding amounts on a monthly basis. Management determines the allowance for doubtful accounts by identifying troubled accounts and by using historical experience applied to an aging of accounts. Student loan receivables are written off when deemed uncollectible. Recoveries of student loan receivables previously written off are recorded when received. The provision for doubtful accounts at July 31, 2013 was \$64,000.

Interest is charged on the student loan receivables at a rate of approximately 5% at July 31, 2013.

<u>Investments:</u> Investments are carried at fair value except for certificates of deposit which are carried at cost. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. See Note 8 for discussion of fair value measurements. Absent donor specific requirement, unrealized gains and losses on investments are reported in unrestricted net assets. The board has elected to return ten percent of all investment income to the investment principal.

Income taxes: The Organization is a nonprofit organization that is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and applicable state law. The Organization's Form 990, Return of

Organization Exempt from Income Tax, for the fiscal years ending July 31, 2010, 2011, 2012, and 2013 are subject to examination by the IRS for 3 years after they were due.

<u>Risks and Uncertainties:</u> The Organization invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed at various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the account balances and the amounts reported in the Statements of Assets, Liabilities and Net Assets.

Note 4. Split-Interest Agreement

The Organization has been named trustee by the donor of assets held under a split-interest agreement. The agreement requires the Organization to retain 10% of the net earnings of the donated amount (to maintain values of original donation) and to provide scholarships with the remaining 90% of net earnings. The original donated amount plus the retained earnings are to be transferred to the lowa Masonic Scholarship Fund ("IMSEF") in 2026 and are shown as a liability. The portion to be used to provide scholarships are shown as temporarily restricted.

Note 6. Endowment Funds – Linderman Trust

The Organization's endowment consists of one fund established for providing student loans. As required by the modified cash basis of accounting, net assets associated with endowment funds, are classified and reported based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

Absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary, the Board of Trustees of the Organization has interpreted the State Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (SPMIFA) as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds. As a result of this interpretation, the Organization classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Organization in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by that standard. In accordance with that standard, the Organization considers the following factors in making a determination to appropriate or accumulate donor-restricted endowment funds: (1) the duration and preservation of the various funds, (2) the purpose of the donor-restricted endowment funds; (3) general economic conditions, (4) the possible effect of inflation and deflation, (5) the expected total return from income and the appreciation of investments, (6) other resources of the Organization, and (7) the Organization's investment policies.

The Organization has adopted investment spending policies, approved by the Board of Trustees, for endowment assets. Those policies attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment funds while also maintaining the purchasing power of those endowment assets over the long-term. According, the investment process seeks to achieve an after-cost total real rate of return, including investment income as well as capital appreciation, which exceeds the annual distribution with acceptable levels of risk. Endowment assets are invested in a well-diversified asset mix, which includes equity and debt securities, that is intended to result in a consistent inflation-protected rate of return that has sufficient liquidity to make an annual distribution of 5%, while growing the funds if possible. The Organization expects its endowment assets, over time, to produce an average rate of return of approximately 8% annually. Actual returns in any given year may vary from this amount. Investment risk is measured in terms of the total endowment fund; investment assets and allocation between asset classes and strategies are managed to prevent exposing the fund to unacceptable levels of risk.

The Organization has a policy of appropriating only the income of its endowment fund.

The State of Iowa enacted UPMIFA effective January 1, 2007, the provisions of which apply to endowment funds existing are established after that date. The Board of Trustees, on the advice of legal counsel, has determined that the majority of the endowment fund net assets meet the definition of endowment funds under UPMIFA.

Note 7. Fair Value Measurements

FASB ASC 820, Fair Value Measurements, provides a framework for measuring fair value that requires a Company to determine fair value based on the price that would be received in the principal markets for the asset or liability being measured. Fair value is defined as the exchange price that would be received on the measurement date to sell an asset or the price paid to transfer a liability in the principal or most advantageous market available to the company. The guidance establishes a three level fair value hierarchy that describes the inputs that are used to measure assets and liabilities.

Level 1 Inputs – Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the company has the ability to access at measurement date.

Level 2 Inputs – Inputs other that quoted prices included in Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly. These might include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active, or other inputs that are observable in the market and can be corroborated by observable markets data

Level 3 Inputs – Unobservable inputs for determining the fair values of assets and liabilities that reflect a company's own assumptions about the assumptions that the market participants would use in pricing the assets or liabilities.

Following are descriptions of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodology used at July 31, 2013 and July 31, 2012:

Common and preferred stock: are valued at the closing price reported in the active market in which the individual security is traded.

Money market funds: are valued at their net asset value (NAV) as calculated by the institution sponsoring the funds.

Mutual funds: are valued based on quoted market prices in the active market in which they were traded.

Corporate bonds: are valued at the closing price reported in the active market in which the bond is traded.

Government bonds: are valued by reference to other bonds of similar credit and duration.

Bond funds: are valued at the closing price reported in the active market on which the bond is traded

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Organization believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization

Herman L. Rowley Memorial Trust (the Organization) is an Iowa nonprofit corporation and was established by the Estate of Herman L. Rowley for the purpose of operating a Masonic Home for worthy and needy Masons in good standing. The Organization operates Rowley Memorial Masonic Home which consists of a 12 unit independent senior living apartment complex, 9 other independent living units and 57-bed nursing unit). The nursing beds are dually certified for Medicare and Medicaid participation.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses, including functional allocations, during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include certain investments in highly liquid debt instruments with original maturities of three months or less, excluding amounts whose use is limited by bond indentures or trust agreements.

Resident Receivables

Resident receivables are stated at the amount management expects to collect from outstanding balances. Management provides for probable uncollectible amounts through a provision for bad debt expenses and an adjustment to a valuation allowance based on its assessment of the current status of individual accounts. Balances that are still outstanding after management has used reasonable collection efforts are written off through a charge to the valuation allowance and a credit to accounts receivable. Changes in the valuation allowance have not been material to the financial statements.

Investments

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the statements of financial position. Investment income or loss (including realized gains and losses on investments, interest and dividends) is included in the operating income (loss) unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Unrealized gains and losses on investments are excluded from operating income (loss) unless the income to loss) unless the investments are trading securities.

Assets Limited as to Use

Bond Fund – This fund consists of funds set aside for the payment of principal and interest on the Organization's revenue bonds.

Reserve Fund - This fund consists of funds set aside in accordance with the bond document.

Property and equipment is stated at cost and is being depreciated by the straight-line method over the following estimated useful lives:

Buildings	5-40 Years
Equipment	3-20 Years

Depreciation expense for the years ended July 31, 2013 and 2012 was \$252,112 and \$263,431, respectively.

Additions and betterments of \$5,000 or more are capitalized, while maintenance and repairs that do not improve or extend the useful lives of the respective assets are charged to operations when incurred. When property, plant and equipment are sold or otherwise disposed of, the asset account and related accumulated depreciation account are relieved, and any gain or loss is included in operations.

Bond Issuance Costs

The costs associated with the issuance of debt are amortized using the straight-line method, which approximates the effective interest method, over the term of the related financing agreement. Amortization expense associated with deferred financing costs was \$2,027 for both years ended July 31, 2013 and 2012.

Refundable Advance Fees

The Organization provides for a declining refundable amount based upon the length of the residency. The amount will not decline to less than 50% of the deposit.

Deferred Revenue from Advance Fees

Fees paid by a resident upon entering an apartment contract, net of the portion thereof that is refundable to the resident, are recorded as deferred revenue and recorded as deferred revenue and are amortized to income using the straight-line method over the estimated remaining life expectancy of the resident.

Temporarily and Permanently Restricted Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are those whose use by the Organization has been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose. Permanently restricted net assets have been restricted by donors to be maintained by the Organization in perpetuity.

Operating Income (Loss)

The statements of activities include operating income (loss). Changes in unrestricted net assets which are excluded from operating income (loss), consistent with industry practice, include unrealized gains and losses on investments other than trading securities and contributions of long-lived assets (including assets acquired using contributions which by donor restriction were to be used for the purposes of acquiring such assets.)

Net Resident Service Revenue

Net resident service revenue is reported at the estimated net realizable amounts from residents, third-party payors, and others for services rendered.

Revenue from certain third-party payor agreements is subject to audit and retroactive adjustment. Provisions for estimated third-party payor settlements are provided in the period the related services are rendered. Differences between the estimated amounts accrued and interim and final settlements are reported in operations in the year of settlement.

Laws and regulations governing the Medicare and Medicaid programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term.

The Organization recognizes revenue on the date service is rendered. The related expenses are estimated and accrued accordingly.

Contributions and Donor-Restricted Funds

The Organization reports gifts of cash and other assets at fair value as restricted support if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assts and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. Donorrestricted contributions whose restrictions are met within the same year as received are reflected as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying financial statements.

The Organization reports gifts of land, buildings, and equipment at fair value as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used, and gifts of cash or other assets that much be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long those long-lived assets must be maintained, the Organization reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired longlived assets are placed in service.

Contributions not restricted by donors are recorded as revenue in unrestricted assets.

Contributed Services

Volunteers provide assistance to the Organization for its programs and other activities. No value has been assigned to these services and, as such, the value of these services is not reflected in the financial statements as revenue and expense.

Advertising

Advertising costs are expensed as incurred. Advertising expense totaled \$20,805 and \$18,403 for the years ended July 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively.

Income Taxes

The Herman L. Rowley Memorial Trust is exempt under Code Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Rowley Masonic Home Health Care, LLC has been organized as a limited liability company and is exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Therefore, no provision for income taxes is presented in these financial statements.

The Organization has adopted the accounting standard regarding "Accounting for Uncertain Tax Positions". This standard provides detailed guidance for financial statement recognition measurements, and disclosure of uncertain tax positions recognized in the entity's financial statements. It requires an entity to recognize the financial statement benefit of a tax position when it is more likely than not that the position will be sustained upon examination. The adoption of this standard had no material effect on the Organization's financial position, results of operations, or cash flow. The Organization's Forms 990 for 2009, 2010, and 2011 are subject to examination by the IRS, generally for three years after they were filed.

Reclassifications

Certain items in the prior year's financial statements have been reclassified to conform with current year presentation. Such reclassifications have no effect on net income as previously stated.

Financial Accounting Standards Board for Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures, established a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. When available, the Organization measures fair value using Level 1 inputs because they generally provide the most reliable evidence of fair value.

The City of Perry, Iowa, Elderly Housing Revenue Bonds contains certain restrictive covenants. The Organization must maintain a debt service coverage ratio of not less than 1.10 on July 31 of each year, and at the end of each fiscal year, the Organization must have and maintain 90 days cash on hand.

Total interest expense incurred for the year ended July 31, 2013 was \$173,060, of which \$24,501 was capitalized and \$148,559 was charged to operations. Total interest expense incurred for the year ended July 31, 2012 was \$186,480, of which \$9,013 was capitalized and \$177,467 was charged to operations.

NOTE 7 - SPECIAL ASSESSMENT PAYABLE

During 2013, the Organization entered into a cost sharing agreement with the City of Perry for the construction of a road that will serve as the primary entrance for a new campus. The Organization shall pay its share of project costs to the City of Perry in ten equal payments of \$28,335 over a period of ten years from May 2013 through May 2022. The total balance outstanding under the agreement was \$255,015 and none at July 31, 2013 ad 2012, respectively.

NOTE 8 - CHARITABLE REMAINDER ANNUITY TRUST

The Organization is the beneficiary and trustee of the Lankenau Charitable Remainder Annuity Trust. A charitable remainder trust provides the payment of the distributions to the grantor or other designated beneficiaries over the Trust's term (usually the designated beneficiary's lifetime). At the end of the Trust's term, the remaining assets are available for the Organization's use. The portion of the Trust attributable to the present value of the future benefits to be received by the Organization was recorded in the Statements of Activities as a temporarily restricted contribution in the period the Trust was established. Assets held in the charitable remainder annuity trust totaled \$191,339 and \$191,238 at July 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively, and are reported at fair value in the Organization's Statement of Financial Position. On an annual basis, the Organization revalues the liability to make distributions to the designated beneficiaries on actuarial assumptions. The present value of the estimated future payments (\$133,463 and \$156,860 at July 31, 2013 and July 31, 2012, respectively) is calculated using a discount rate of 7%.

NOTE 9 - REFUNDABLE FEES AND DEFERRED REVENUE FROM ADVANCE FEES

The Organization has units that are provided to individuals or couples through contractual agreements. The contact provides for the use of a unit until the person dies or moves to the nursing facility. The agreement requires a one-time non-refundable fee, a refundable payment (base amount) which becomes non-refundable, and a monthly service charge and property tax payment. The refundable fee becomes non-refundable at 7% a year of the base amount not to decrease below 50% of the base refundable amount.

NOTE 10 - MINERAL RIGHTS LEASE

The Organization owns mineral rights to property located in Oklahoma. The property has not been explored; therefore no value has been recorded in the financial statements. The Organization has an oil and gas agreement that grants an exploration company the sole and exclusive right to explore by geophysical and other methods, mining and operating for oil and gas, and for laying pipe lines for a preliminary three year term through July 22, 2016. The agreement provides that the Organization will receive 18.75% of gross proceeds from any production of oil and gas from the property. The agreement provides a one-time payment to the Organization of \$104,000 to be paid during 2014 and royalties of 3/16 of any gas production. There was no production during the years ended July 31, 2013 and 2012.

NOTE 12 - RETIREMENT PLAN

The Organization sponsors a 401(k) plan that covers all employees who have attained the age of 21 and have earned one year of service as defined by the Plan. Employees may elect to defer up to 19% of their compensation, subject to statutory limits. For all eligible employees, the Organization will contribute 5% of gross compensation and provide a matching contribution of up to 50% of the first 2% of employee contributions. Vesting of employer contributions is based on years of service. During the years ended July 31, 2013 and 2012, employer contributions totaled \$118,320 and \$109,179, respectively.

NOTE 13 - CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

Most of the Organization's business activity is with residents of the facility. Herman L. Rowley Memorial Trust is under a contractual agreement with the Iowa Department of Human Services as a licensed provider of Title XIX care (Medicaid). Revenue received from this source approximated \$1,229,000 and \$1,234,000 for the years ended July 31, 2013 and 2012. Receivables from the Iowa Department of Human Services on behalf of residents at July 31, 2013 and 2012 were \$118,320 and \$81,140, respectively.

Herman L. Rowley Memorial Trust is also under a contractual agreement with the Department of Health and Human Services – Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services as a licensed provider of Title XVIII care (Medicare). Revenue received from this source approximated \$87,000 and \$34,000 for the years ended July 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. Receivables from Medicare on behalf of residents at July 31, 2013 and 2012 were \$34,097 and \$14,096, respectively.

At July 31, 2013 and 2012, the Organization had investments and assets limited as to use and a charitable remainder trust with a fair value of \$4,145,133 and \$4,480,548, respectively, which are not federally insured and are subject to the market risks inherent in the individual investments.

NOTE 14 - CONCENTRATION IN STATE MEDICAID PROGRAM

The Organization has all of its nursing beds designated for care of patients under the state's Medicaid program. The current funding of that program is 30 days behind filed claims. The current state budget has no provision for reducing that lag, and the proposed budget for next year includes no assurance of increased funding.

NOTE 15 - THIRD PARTY RATE ADJUSTMENTS AND REVENUE

Revenue from the Medicaid program accounted for approximately 34% and 33% of total net resident service revenue for the years ended July 31, 2013 and 2012. Revenue from the Medicare program accounted for approximately 3% and 1% of total net resident service revenue for the years ended July 31, 2013 and 2012, respectively. Laws and regulations governing the Medicaid and Medicare programs are extremely complex and subject to interpretation. As a result, there is at least a reasonable possibility that the recorded estimates will change by a material amount in the near term.

NOTE 16 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

The date to which events occurring after July 31, 2013, the date of the most recent statement of financial position, have been evaluated for possible adjustment to the financial statements or disclosure is October 18, 2013, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Subsequent to July 31, 2013, the Organization committed to a major campus renovation that includes the construction of a new facility. As of October 18, 2013, the Organization is in the process of obtaining financing through a local banking institution for construction costs. The estimated total cost of the project is \$16,300,000, to be completed in 2015.

REPORT OF THE LODGE SERVICE COMMITTEE

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

The Committee assisted Grand Master Bryce Hildreth in facilitating, coordinating and presenting the 12 Grand Master's Area Meetings held across the jurisdiction in October and November. The theme was "Freemasonry: The Ties That Bind." Presentations were given on Membership/Public Relations; Philanthropy; Education; Fraternity; and Questions /Wrap up. The presentations were well received and the Brothers were very appreciative of the Grand Master setting down and having a conversation with them during the questions and wrap up.

The Lodge Service Committee conducted a series of 17 Neighborhood Area Meetings in April. The topics were:

A. The Investigation Committee, its importance and how it should function.

B. Governance of the Lodge by the Code and By-Laws and what is appropriate.

C. Decorum and Order within and without the Lodge Room.

D. Knowledge about individual and lodge Award Programs.

These meetings were conducted as a facilitated round table discussion group. The discussions were lively and informative. By what was said and what was not said it will help the committee in the development of future programs to meet the craft's needs. A mailing of educational materials containing supporting information for the topics discussed is being prepared.

On Saturday, April 27 the "Iowa Conference on Masonic Education" was held in Cedar Rapids at the Iowa Masonic Library and Museums. The program included presentations on: "Selling the Masonic Treasure – The Challenge for Masonic Education" by Jeff Heimensen; "Web Based Educational Opportunities" by George Harrison; "What Happens in Cedar Rapids" by the Grand Lodge Office Staff; "Ritual in Iowa" by Art Crandon and Loren Stein, Custodians of the Work; "Masonic Jurisprudence" by Grand Master Bryce Hildreth, Donald Mosier and Eric Rozeboom; and a discussion forum "Duties of the Investigating Committee." Tours were provided prior to and following the presentations. All in attendance agreed that it was a wonderful day filled with Masonic education, enlightenment, great food, and fellowship.

We continue to increase our web presence by updating our sites. A new site was added this year to help inform potential candidates and the general public about Freemasonry. It can be accessed at: <u>http://www.iowafreemasonry.org/</u>.

The Iowa Masonic Library began indexing the articles of its Masonic periodical collection in 1905. We are nearing the conclusion of the electronic indexing of that periodical collection. To date over 350,000 articles have been added to the online library catalog. This is an invaluable resource for anyone doing Masonic research. The catalog can be accessed at: <u>http://www.iowamasoniclibrary.org</u>

We are continuing to experience very good participation and great results from the following programs:

The "Ashlar Award" helps to enroll a Brother into his lodge by setting criteria and expectations for the new Mason. It teaches the benefits of becoming an involved active member of a lodge. It also assists the lodge by requiring them to be responsible to their new members. To date we have received 24 applications.

The "Master Builder Award" helps to enroll brothers into their lodge by setting criteria which includes lodge, family and community involvement. To date we have received 8 applications.

The "Golden Trowel Award" is laden with service opportunities to the lodge, community and Fraternity as a whole. It is difficult to achieve by design, but the satisfaction obtained by the journey to achieve it will repay the effort. Since inception two Brothers have earned this prestigious award.

The "Lodge of the Year Award" continues to have a very positive influence on the lodges that work to achieve it. Lodges that net one more

member than they lose to SNPDs and Demits are proud to receive the "Plus One Award."

The members of the committee have been busy visiting and offering assistance to lodges throughout the year. If your lodge has a need please do not hesitate to contact a member of the Lodge Service Committee and we will assist as we are able.

To the members of the Lodge Service Committee; your commitment, resourcefulness, giving, caring, selflessness and love for our Craft which inspires you to go beyond what is expected and do the many things that help our great Fraternity to prosper, for assisting lodges to grow and prosper and for traveling the many miles it takes to make these things possible, Thank You. You are an inspiration!

In conclusion, Masonic Education is an integral part of the tradition of our great Fraternity. The members of the Lodge Service Committee are committed to the success of the Masonic Fraternity in Iowa and we will continue to go the "extra mile" to help fulfill the needs of Iowa Lodges.

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

The Pension administrators met for their annual meeting on September 19, 2012 in the Black Room at the Ramada Hotel in Waterloo. Martin Chipps from Principal Financial conducted a Fiduciary Review of the Plan. This review is required under existing laws and is designed to keep administrators up to date on their responsibilities as well as the responsibilities of the Plan providers. The review included a summary of the investments made by Principal with retirement money they have in their control. He was accompanied by John Blattner, agent of record for the Grand Lodge of Iowa 401(k) Plan along with Terry Vrieze who spoke on the services that are provided.

John Blattner meets annually with all employees of the Grand Lodge of lowa, the Rowley Home, and the Iowa Masonic Health Facilities to review their options with the retirement plan, answer their questions, and provide a link between employees and the Principal Group. All employees of the Grand Lodge (Bettendorf – Cedar Rapids – Perry) are covered by this retirement plan.

The Grand Lodge of Iowa 401(k) Retirement Plan is audited by Honkamp, Krueger & Co. P.C., CPA firm. The Plan operates on a fiscal year basis with fiscal year ending August 31. The current audit and all previous audits are on file with the Grand Secretary's office in Cedar Rapids.

REPORT OF SCHOLARSHIP SELECTION COMMITTEE

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

The Grand Lodge Scholarship Program was established in 1970 to promote the continued education of deserving graduates from lowa's public high schools and since that time has awarded 1925 scholarships with a total value of \$2,930,900. The program demonstrates Masonry's commitment to lowa public education, lowa's future, and especially to the youth who will provide the leadership that will meet the challenges America and Iowa will face in the coming years. The scholarship program also provides many non-Masons with an insight into Masonry that they would not have had without this program. The money shows that Masonry has a heart and the interviews showed parents and students the warmth, friendship and smiling faces of Masons who are willing to dedicate their time and money to assist Iowa students, many of whom have no Masonic During the interviewing process at the host lodges, many affiliation. students and parents commented about the friendliness and courteousness of their reception and their appreciation for the program. The students and parents who were interviewed in Cedar Rapids were in awe of the facility, the material it contains and the friendly reception they received. All of these factors combine to provide a positive impression of Masonry by those who gualified for the interviews.

Each year, the trustees of the Iowa Masonic Scholarship Endowment Fund determine not only the number of scholarships to be awarded under this program, but also the dollar amount of these scholarships. It is then the responsibility of the Scholarship Selection Committee to initiate those procedures that result in the selection of scholarship recipients. The committee was informed that the Grand Lodge of Iowa could award sixty (60) - \$2000 scholarships in the year 2013.

In September, informational brochures and applications were sent to the guidance department of each public high school within the state. The counselors were asked to inform eligible students about the Grand Lodge Scholarship Program. Also in September, copies of these same materials were sent to the Worshipful Master of each subordinate lodge asking his lodge's help in promoting the scholarship program within the community. Additionally the applications and informational brochures available on the Grand Lodge web site. Due to Iowa Masonic Scholarship Endowment Fund Trust and IRS rules, no advantage can be given for applicants with a Masonic affiliation nor are they restricted to race, creed, color, sex, or national origin.

By the time of the February 10 closing date, the committee had received 719 applications. Each application was carefully read and evaluated. Broad-based criteria are used in the selection process. An applicant's academic record, communication skills, and financial need are carefully considered. Service to school and community with special emphasis upon leadership roles in these areas also has considerable weight. This is because the Grand Lodge of Iowa is particularly looking for those students who have exhibited the greatest potential to be not only of service to their communities in the future, but also, to be leaders in these Karen Davies from the Grand Lodge Office and the communities. members of the committee spent many hours processing and carefully analyzing each of the applications. Early in March the committee selected 71 finalists to be interviewed at four locations across the state. These interviews were conducted in Cedar Rapids at the Iowa Masonic Library on April 2, in Des Moines at South Gate Lodge No. 657 on April 3, in Exira at Exodus Lodge No. 342 on April 4, and in Waverly at Tyrrell Lodge No. 116 on April 9. The committee wishes to extend their appreciation to the host lodges for making the students, parents, and members of the committee welcome. The lodge members perform a vital part of the interviewing process by registering the students and making them feel relaxed and comfortable before their interviews. In Cedar Rapids, Bill Crawford, Karen Davies, and the other staff members at the Grand Lodge Library and Museum also went out of their way to make everyone feel welcome and the special tours of the facility and vault were especially appreciated. REPORT OF THE MASONIC CHARITABLE EDUCATIONAL CORPORATION SCHOLARSHIP SELECTION COMMITTEE

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

The Masonic Charitable Educational Corporation Scholarship Selection Committee, with assistance from Karen Davies at the Grand Secretary's office, has completed its work for this year.

As in past years eligibility is open only to students planning to attend one of the fifteen lowa Community Colleges, and then only if they were enrolling in a two year course and not planning to use the community college for the first two years of a four year degree.

This year the Trustees and the Grand Master determined we should award 20 scholarships of \$1,250 each.

We received 67 applications for scholarships this year. On initial review, several of the applications were found to be incomplete or ineligible for some reason. After evaluating the remaining applications, the committee met, on April 7, at the Holiday Inn Express in Altoona, to determine the 20 who would receive scholarships.

We are still disappointed in the number applications we received this year, and the low numbers of applicants, who indicate they or their parents are members of a Masonic Organization.

REPORT OF THE LONG RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

The Grand Lodge of Iowa's Long Range Planning Committee had a number of discussions throughout the year regarding long-range and strategic planning for the Grand Lodge. As a result, the Committee submits this as its report and as a proposed resolution for consideration and the Annual Communication.

The Grand Lodge of Iowa's Long-Range Planning Committee submits the following Strategic Goals, Objectives and Action Steps for consideration as a resolution by the Grand Lodge of Iowa at its 2013 Annual Communication.

Strategic Objective #1: Enhance our Communications

- The Grand Lodge will provide a dynamic, regularly-updated, and visuallyappealing website.
- Maintaining a Committee assigned with the responsibility to develop, deploy and regularly review the visual look, content, and usability.
- Ensure relevant information is regularly updated on the website and provided for the website.
- Integrate new/social media as a supplement to the website for up-to-date notifications.
- Integrate the ability for Masons to pay their annual dues online.
- The Grand Lodge will strive to increase lodge communications.
 - Development of "templates" for lodge newsletters.

- Development of a Wordpress "template" for lodges to utilize for the creation of simple, effective websites.
- Increase the usage of "GoogleDocs" for administrative items to be shared with local lodges (Grand Lodge Code, Annual Proceedings, etc.).
- The Grand Lodge will revamp and update the look of the Grand Lodge Bulletin to ensure its text is easier to read and is visually appealing to its audience.
- Continue to publish four editions of the Grand Lodge Bulletin annually.
- Investigate the cost implications of continuing to publish in "print form" four editions annually as compared to publishing in "print form" two of the four editions and posting all editions on the website.
 - Increase the amount of Masonic education-related articles in each bulletin.
 - Encourage the Grand Lodge staff/trustees to issue an RFP for printing services to ensure the Grand Lodge is getting the best rates possible.

Strategic Objective #2: Educating the Ritual

- Memorizing and effectively delivering the ritual is a critical component to freemasonry.
- The Grand Lodge is encouraged to create a Committee with the assigned task of educating the meaning of the ritual.
 - Simply telling our brothers that they must memorize the ritual will not increase the number of Masons who know the ritual.
 - When Masons "understand" the meaning of the ritual they will have a stronger desire to memorize the ritual so that they can more effectively deliver the ritual.
 - New Masons, when they join a lodge, have a desire to learn about what freemasonry is and its teachings--telling a new mason to memorize the ritual does not meet the needs/desires of new Masons. By effectively teaching the meaning of the ritual to our new Masons, we will likely reduce the number of SNPDs that occur within the first three years of initiation.

Strategic Objective #3: Enhance our Membership and Financial Well-Being

• Encourage the Grand Lodge Trustees and Finance Committee to implement a programmatic approach to budgeting rather than a line-item budgeting process. This approach will show financial deficiencies in operational areas and will provide a more-robust view of the Grand Lodge finances and how operational areas of the Grand Lodge are funded.

- Encourage the Finance Committee to utilize a data-driven model for projecting membership counts.
- The Grand Lodge accurately forecasting membership trends for 2, 3, 5, 10 and 20 year intervals on an annual basis based on membership demographics (known trends, anticipated/projected initiations, SNPDs, death and demits). This will allow for a "target membership goal" to be identified annually for the Grand Lodge and will provide the Finance Committee with better insights regarding budgetary decisions.
- The Grand Lodge must develop strategies to address and overcome the following issues:
 - As the membership of the Grand Lodge continues to mature, the number of 50-year Masons continues to increase; thereby resulting in a negative financial impact to the Grand Lodge. Addressing the 50-year dues exemption is critical, while maintaining an effective recognition program for those Masons who have achieved 50 years of membership.
 - Suspension for Non-Payment of Dues (SNPD) is a significant problem affecting lodges. The Grand Lodge shall develop strategies to assist local lodges and membership committees in overcoming the SNPD issues locally through communication protocols, activities, etc.
 - Generational differences found in local lodges and how lodges can overcome the negative issues that may arise.

Strategic Objective #4: The Long-term Plans for the Grand Lodge Library, Museum and Administrative offices.

The Grand Lodge Trustees are encouraged to select a consultant that will identify the building's accumulated deferred maintenance needs and projected costs, building rehabilitation/renovation needs and costs, and costs to bring the building to ADA code compliance.

- The Grand Lodge Trustees, as a result of the above-referenced consultant's report, shall develop a plan to address the costs and needs of the Building.
- The Grand Lodge Trustees are encouraged to develop a Continuity Of Operations Plan (COOP) to maintain the quality of the Grand Lodge Library & Museum should the building become uninhabitable due to natural disaster or other action that limits the usability of the facility.

The Iowa Academy of Masonic Knowledge spent 2012-13 trying to define its role, establish goals and refine a format in which it can operate. We met twice during this Grand Lodge year. The first meeting ended with what seemed like four different opinions on each of aspects stated above. Oddly enough, the second meeting began and ended in full agreement.

Role: The role of the Masonic Academy of Knowledge is to provide education to individual or groups of individuals interested in all aspects of Masonic Education. **Goal:** It should be the goal of the Masonic Academy of Knowledge to provide a planned, but self-defining course of education for the Masons of Iowa. **Format:** The course material should be computer based, with the ability for members of the Academy to freely share their work in a protected format, similar to that provided by the Masonic Research Network. The operating system must be seamless in its operation.

The elements defined above are complex and will be difficult to establish. In fact, it can be said that the Committee has not made any inroads toward their achievement. First, course material has been laid out, reading lists and goals for each subject in the first two levels have been defined and, most importantly, a small cadre of interested Masonic Scholars have registered and are working their materials. In considering our progress, we should remember that the Iowa Masonic Library began with a \$5.00 allotment.

Legislation will be introduced to make the Academy a permanent Grand Lodge committee. To become successful, this committee needs the support of the Grand Lodge and the Technology Committee.

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

The Directors of the Iowa Masonic Library Association met at the Iowa Masonic Library on November 16, 2012. Those in attendance were: President John M. Klaus, P.G.T.; Duane S. Munson, P.G.T.; Dennis M. Zahrt, P.G.M.; Robert H. Erickson, P.G.M.; Craig L. Davis, P.G.M.; Grand Master Bryce B. Hildreth; Raymond E. Clause, P.G.M.; Eric R. Rozeboom, P.S.G.W.; Bill V. Northup; Assistant Librarian William R. Kreuger; Deputy Grand Secretary Tim S. Anderson; and Grand Secretary William R. Crawford.

Charles Weber of Robert W. Baird & Co. met with the Directors, performed a fiduciary review, and discussed the investments and cash flow needs of the Association.

Treasurer Duane S. Munson presented his report for the fiscal year ending August 31, 2011. The report showed investments valued at \$665,319.26, plus cash of \$18,308.53, for the Association's total asset value of \$683,627.79 as of that date. It was also reported the Association had been the beneficiary of a bequest from R. Dean Metcalf, P.G.M., of \$42,000.00.

Assistant Librarian William R. Krueger gave the annual report on the Library and its usage. All Masons are encouraged to read the Grand Librarian's Report to learn of the remarkable work accomplished at the Library and Museums.

The Iowa Masonic Library Association assists the Iowa Masonic Library in its operations by providing funds equal to approximately one-half of the salary of the Assistant Librarian, and supports the Library in paying for one-time needs.

On April 27, the Iowa Masonic Library Association sponsored the Iowa Conference for Masonic Education at the Library and Museums. The wellattended Conference featured an excellent group who brought further light to the attendees. The day began with an open house giving time for attendees to tour the Library and Museums. The list of speakers and their topics included Senior Grand Steward Jeffrey D. Heimensen on "Selling the Masonic Treasure - The Challenge for Masonic Education;" Grand Marshal George J. Harrison on "Web Based Educational Opportunities;" Brothers Arthur G. Crandon, P.J.G.W., and Deputy Grand Master Loren C. Stein on "Ritual in Iowa". The Grand Lodge Office staff shared some of the duties and areas of responsibility. They were Administrative Assistant Karen Davies, Assistant Librarian William R. Kreuger, Membership Records Coordinator Ivette Radziunas, and Deputy Grand Secretary Tim S. Anderson. Grand Master Bryce B. Hildreth; Donald E. Mosier, P.G.M., and Eric A. Rozeboom, P.S.G.W., discussed and answered questions on the Iowa Masonic Code and any other questions that the brothers asked. Discussion forums were held on "Duties of the Investigating Committee."

The Education Conference was made possible through a generous grant from the Masonic Charitable Educational Corporation.

The Library staff report continuing use of the book digitizing equipment purchased by the Association. Our Prince Hall Brothers have made great use of it having Proceedings digitized as they rebuild their libraries to reclaim their history.

The Association continued this year a project of almost inestimable value, made possible by a generous grant from the Masonic Charitable Educational Corporation. Your Library is unique in the world in having a catalogue of all articles in all Masonic periodicals in its collection. These periodicals are *not* indexed in any of the usual periodical indices, and that the Iowa Masonic Library holds one of the most nearly complete collections of such periodicals.

Work on the digitizing of the catalogue of these articles—called the *Index Rerum*, literally the "Index of Things"—has proceeded ahead of schedule, and will be completed this summer. This treasure trove of information will be available on-line through the Grand Lodge website.

The Association continues to underwrite the binding of periodicals so that they may be placed on library shelves. In addition, the Association supported the moving of books within the Library to both free up space and to rearrange books into their proper locations.

Our sincere thanks and appreciation go to all who supported the Iowa Masonic Library so generously during this Masonic year, for those who have used the Library, and for those who visited the Museums. We particularly recognize that the staff of our Library and Museums, while small in number, is, in their own right, heroes of Iowa Masonry who seek to preserve our history and extend our knowledge. They deserve praise and recognition from all Iowa Masons.

If our goal is to bring Masonic light to the world, then we are well on the way to doing our part in that grand and glorious work.

The Iowa Masonic Library and Museums continue to be among the most valuable, if least well-known, intellectual resources in Iowa, and are among the very finest Masonic resources in the world. Every Iowa Mason can take justifiable pride in the Library and Museum—and should promote their use. Iowa Masons unfamiliar with the collections of the Library and Museum are urged to become familiar with them, because they represent collectively one of the greatest treasures, and a priceless one, of Iowa Freemasonry.

REPORT ON MASONIC JURISPRUDENCE

Donald E. Mosier, P.G.M. and Chairman of the Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence, presented the proposed Amendments to the Code for action.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION (Amendments to the Constitution require a two-thirds majority vote at two consecutive Annual Communications for adoption – Article IX Constitution of the Grand Lodge) (ADOPTED)

BE IT RESOLVED: That Article VIII, Section 4 of the Constitution be cancelled and the following enacted in lieu thereof:

Section 4. CONFERRING OF DEGREES.

With the exception of Grand Master's One-Day Classes, the First Section of the First and Second Degrees and the First and Second Sections of the Third Degree shall be conferred upon but one person at a time. The Second Section of the First and Second Degrees, the Monitorial Lectures of the First and Third Degrees and all the Charges may, at the option of the Master, be given to more than one candidate at the same time. In no instance is any abbreviation of the work allowable, each candidate being entitled to the degrees in full.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CODE (ADOPTED)

Section 1. CLASSIFICATION

Committees of the Grand Lodge shall be standing or special committees.

Standing Committees are as provided by the Iowa Masonic Code. They are the Appeals and Grievances Committee, Credentials Committee, Division and Reference Committee, Finance Committee, Fraternal Review Committee, Lodae Service Committee, Masonic Charitable Educational Corporation Scholarship Selection Committee, Jurisprudence Masonic Committee, Masonic Youth Committee, Public Relations Committee, Public School Support Committee, Recognition of Grand Bodies Committee, Scholarship Selection Committee, Technology Committee, Visitors Committee, Long Range Strategic Planning Committee, and Iowa Academy of Masonic Knowledge Committee.

BE IT RESOLVED: That Chapter 11, Section 24 be added to the Iowa Masonic Code:

Section 24. IOWA ACADEMY OF MASONIC KNOWLEDGE COMMITTEE.

D. Creation and Term. There shall be an Iowa Academy of Masonic Knowledge Committee consisting of five members. The term of the five members shall be for five years. The Grand Master elected in 2013 shall appoint one member for a term of one year, one member for a term of two years, one member for a term of three years, one member for a term of four years, and one member for

a term of five years. Successors shall be appointed for a term of five years, provided, that when a vacancy occurs the appointment shall be for the unexpired term. A member of the Technology Committee shall serve as an *ex officio* member of this committee to assist with maintaining the Web Site.

E. Duties.

- a. To administer the Iowa Academy of Masonic Knowledge which has the following mission statement: "The Iowa Academy of Knowledge will provide an environment that will enable Masons to explore an understanding of the nature, history, philosophy and purposes of Freemasonry, its past, present and future and will provide them with opportunities to share those understandings with others."
- b. To assist individual Masons in a leveled program of home study that will allow the individual Mason to work at his own pace and in his own area of interest through readings and responses to those readings for advancement through three levels of study.
- c. Maintain records and develop methods for sharing information and acknowledging completion of various levels of study.

No annual dues shall be assessed against any member who had, prior to January one of that year, completed an aggregate of at least fifty (50) years as a member in one or more lodges of this Grand Jurisdiction or one recognized by the Grand Lodge of Iowa and provided he was raised prior to January 1, 1964. However, in determining the aggregate years of membership in any lodge or lodges, no lapse shall have been deemed to occur for time between demission from a lodge and the following election into a lodge if both the demission and election are within a period of one year and for which dues have been fully paid or remitted. This method of computation shall be retroactive for past years for determination of eligibility for brethren reaching Fifty Year status after January 1, 1973.

CHAPTER 10A

BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE IOWA MASONIC CHILD IDENTIFICATION PROGRAM

Section 1. CREATION AND TERM.

There shall be a Board of Directors of the Iowa Masonic Child Identification Program consisting of five members who shall be appointed by the Grand Master and shall hold office for a term of five years. The Grand Master elected in 2013 shall appoint one member for a term of one year, one member for a term of two years, one member for a term of three years, one member for a term of four years, and one member for a term of five years. Successors shall be appointed for a term of five years, provided, that when a vacancy occurs the appointment shall be for the unexpired term. No member shall serve more than two consecutive terms. The Grand Master shall designate the Chairman. The Board of Directors shall elect a Vice Chairman, Secretary, and Treasurer.

Section 2. DUTIES.

It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors of the Iowa Masonic Child Identification Program:

- a. To administer the Iowa Masonic Child Identification in accordance with the provisions of the Articles of Incorporation creating said program and its Bylaws.
- **b.** To receive and administer contributions and gifts in accordance with the provisions of the Articles of Incorporation creating said program and its Bylaws.

PROPOSED RESOLUTIONS (WITHDRAWN)

BE IT RESOLVED: That the Grand Lodge of Iowa's Long-Range Planning Committee submits the following Strategic Goals, Objectives and Action Steps for consideration as a resolution for adoption by the Grand Lodge of Iowa at its 2013 Annual Communication:

Strategic Objective #1: Enhance our Communications

- The Grand Lodge will provide a dynamic, regularly-updated, and visuallyappealing website.
- Maintaining a Committee assigned with the responsibility to develop, deploy and regularly review the visual look, content, and usability.
- Ensure relevant information is regularly updated on the website and provided for the website.
- Integrate new/social media as a supplement to the website for up-to-date notifications.
- Integrate the ability for Masons to pay their annual dues online.
- The Grand Lodge will strive to increase lodge communications.
- Development of "templates" for lodge newsletters.
- Development of a Wordpress "template" for lodges to utilize for the creation of simple, effective websites.
- Increase the usage of "GoogleDocs" for administrative items to be shared with local lodges (Grand Lodge Code, Annual Proceedings, etc.).
- The Grand Lodge will revamp and update the look of the Grand Lodge Bulletin to ensure its text is easier to read and is visually appealing to its audience.
- Continue to publish four editions of the Grand Lodge Bulletin annually.
- Investigate the cost implications of continuing to publish in "print form" four editions annually as compared to publishing in "print form" two of the four editions and posting all editions on the website.
- Increase the amount of Masonic education-related articles in each bulletin.
- Encourage the Grand Lodge staff/trustees to issue an RFP for printing services to ensure the Grand Lodge is getting the best rates possible.

Strategic Objective #2: Educating the Ritual

- Memorizing and effectively delivering the ritual is a critical component to freemasonry.
- The Grand Lodge is encouraged to create a Committee with the assigned task of educating the meaning of the ritual.
- Simply telling our brothers that they must memorize the ritual will not increase the number of Masons who know the ritual.
- When Masons "understand" the meaning of the ritual they will have a stronger desire to memorize the ritual so that they can more effectively deliver the ritual.
- New Masons, when they join a lodge, have a desire to learn about what freemasonry is and its teachings--telling a new mason to memorize the ritual does not meet the needs/desires of new Masons. By effectively teaching the meaning of the ritual to our new Masons, we will likely

reduce the number of SNPDs that occur within the first three years of initiation.

Strategic Objective #3: Enhance our Membership and Financial Well-Being

- Encourage the Grand Lodge Trustees and Finance Committee to implement a programmatic approach to budgeting rather than a line-item budgeting process.
- This approach will show financial deficiencies in operational areas and will provide a more-robust view of the Grand Lodge finances and how operational areas of the Grand Lodge are funded.
- Encourage the Finance Committee to utilize a data-driven model for projecting membership counts.
- The Grand Lodge accurately forecasting membership trends for 2, 3, 5, 10 and 20 year intervals on an annual basis based on membership demographics (known trends, anticipated/projected initiations, SNPDs, death and demits). This will allow for a "target membership goal" to be identified annually for the Grand Lodge and will provide the Finance Committee with better insights regarding budgetary decisions.
- The Grand Lodge must develop strategies to address and overcome the following issues:
- As the membership of the Grand Lodge continues to mature, the number of 50-year Masons continues to increase; thereby resulting in a negative financial impact to the Grand Lodge. Addressing the 50-year dues exemption is critical, while maintaining an effective recognition program for those Masons who have achieved 50 years of membership.
- Suspension for Non-Payment of Dues (SNPD) is a significant problem affecting lodges. The Grand Lodge shall develop strategies to assist local lodges and membership committees in overcoming the SNPD issues locally through communication protocols, activities, etc.
- Generational differences found in local lodges and how lodges can overcome the negative issues that may arise.

Strategic Objective #4: The Long-term Plans for the Grand Lodge Library, Museum and Administrative offices.

- The Grand Lodge Trustees are encouraged to select a consultant that will identify the building's accumulated deferred maintenance needs and projected costs, building rehabilitation/renovation needs and costs, and costs to bring the building to ADA code compliance.
- The Grand Lodge Trustees, as a result of the above-referenced consultant's report, shall develop a plan to address the costs and needs of the Building.
- The Grand Lodge Trustees are encouraged to develop a Continuity of Operations Plan (COOP) to maintain the quality of the Grand Lodge Library & Museum should the building become uninhabitable due to natural disaster or other action that limits the usability of the facility.

We ask now that you keep us safe as we return to our homes that we may all come together again to promote the beauties of this great Fraternity.







MOST WORSHIPFUL ERIC A. ROZEBOOM **GRAND MASTER**



RIGHT WORSHIPFUL LOREN J. PIERCE SENIOR GRAND WARDEN





FRATERNAL REVIEW

GRAND LODGE OF IOWA, A.F. & A.M.

To the Grand Lodge of Iowa:

The doings of our brothers around the country and the world run the gamut from the important to the mundane, but they are diverse and they are uniformly illuminating. To study the proceedings of other jurisdictions is to learn from their experiences. To learn from those experiences is to have the chance to apply those lessons to the practice of Masonry here in lowa, and for that reason I would like to thank Most Worshipful Grand Master Bryce Hildreth for giving me the opportunity serve as the Chair of the Committee on Fraternal Review this year and to share some of these lessons.

This year your committee reviewed dozens of reports and proceedings from around the United States and the world and is pleased to report that in general the various jurisdictions are reporting optimistically about the future of the craft. This doesn't mean there aren't still many challenges to face, but the proceedings usually discuss those too. Included in this report are some of the highlights from this year's review.

Grand Lodge of New Jersey 2008

2/3rds ballot for dual affiliations changed to unanimous ballot.

Grand Lodge of Nevada 2011

Net loss of only 50 masons for the year.

Georgia 2011

Approved recognition of Ukraine and Rumania.

Minnesota 2012

Approved a standing resolution recognizing the Masonic Society. Suspended recognition of GLNF. Withdrew recognition of the United Grand Lodge of Bulgaria. Granted recognition to the Federal District of Brazil. Granted recognition of Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Alaska.

Wisconsin 2012

Dedicated a new Wisconsin Masonic Heritage Museum in Dodgeville.

New Brunswick 2012

Is considering a new lodge concept called a "Home" Lodge which would be set up through a Grand Lodge. The purpose of such a lodge would be to give members of lodges that have gone dark a place to house their membership until such time as they can affiliate with a new lodge. New Brunswick also recognized the Grand Lodges of Azerbaijan and Mauritius.

Wyoming 2012

Granted full recognition to the Grand Lodge of Albania, Bulgaria, Croatia, and Cyprus. Took no action on GLNF. Granted visitation rights to Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Alaska.

Pennsylvania 2011

Granted recognition to Azerbaijan, Monaco, and Ukraine.

Utah 2011

Held a second annual statewide Masonic Open House to which the public was invited as an outreach measure.

Tennessee 2012

Recognized the Grand Lodge of Malta. Has published in the proceedings a sample last will and testament showing the brethren there how to leave a bequest to an endowment fund.

Nebraska 2012

Has instituted mandatory background checks of petitioners. Refused to recognize United Grand Lodges of Serbia, Grand Lodge of the State of Guanajuato (Mexico), Grand Lodge du Niger, the Grand Lodge of Estado de Aguascalientes (Mexico), the Grand Lodge of Estado de Guerrero (Mexico), the Grand Lodge of Montenegro, the Grand Lodge of Baja California (Mexico), and the Gran Logia Occidental Mexicana (Mexico).

Louisiana 2012

Allowed lodge business to be conducted in EA and FC degrees in addition to MM degree. Refused to adopted a resolution recognizing our Prince Hall brothers. Recognized the Grand Lodge of Slovenia. Recognized the Grand Lodge of Slovenia. Recognized the Grand Lodge of Azerbaijan. Recognized the Grande Loja of Maconica de Estado do Espirito Santo (Brazil). Refused to recognize the Gran Logia of Mexicana de Antigous, Libres Y Aceptados Masones (Mexico). Recognized the Grand Lodge of Croatia.

Delaware 2010-2011

Recognized the Grand Lodge of Cyprus, the Sovereign Grand Lodge of Malta, and the National Grand Lodge of Azerbaijan. Recognized the Grand Lodge of Mauritius and the Grand Lodge of Croatia.

California 2011

Conferred 4,700 degrees, raided the most Master Masons in more than 20 years, saw the greatest membership gains since 1999, and the lowest declines in membership since 1925.

Massachusetts 2011

Granted recognition to the National Grand Lodge of Azerbaijan, The Grande Loge Nationale Reguliere de la Principaute de Monaco and moved that the usual procedure be followed in exchanging Grand Representatives.

Oklahoma 2009

The Grand Secretary writes: "Another major increase in activity has been in inquiries to the Grand Lodge, primarily through the web site. So far this year we have responded to more than 400 inquiries. A majority of those are men asking questions about joining the fraternity. W e have no way of knowing how many of them ultimately petition for the Degrees, but it is encouraging that so many are asking. That number is likely to show a sharp increase following the publication of Dan Brown's book The Lost Symbol."

Washington D.C. 2011

Celebrated the Bicentennial of Masonry in the District. Made actor Richard Dreyfuss a Mason at sight.

Illinois 2011

Recognized the Grand Lodge of Malta. Recognized the Grand Loja Maconica de Minas Gerais (one of multiple Brazilian Grand Lodges). Recognized the Grand Lodges of Azerbaijan and Ukraine.

Delaware 2011-2012

Received no requests for recognition from other jurisdictions. Considered a proposal to establish a nonprofit foundation to support the Delaware Grand Lodge.

Washington 2012

The Membership Development Committee was asked to focus their energies on marketing the Fraternity, and the Public Relations Committee was asked to focus on our name recognition, or branding. Reached an agreement with the Grand Encampment in regard to a dispute over the Rectified Rite.

Missouri 2011-2012

Reports that Lodges continue to benefit from a renewed interest in our Fraternity. Initiations are increasing, more work is being done all over the State and there is an increased interest in the gifts of our Craft.

Indiana 2012

Voted to eliminate the \$10.00 charge per new initiate donation to the George Washington Masonic Memorial and instead increase the per capita charge for the support of the Memorial from \$0.50 to \$1.00.

New York 2010

Reports that in the beginning of the year, they started with some 49,000 members. They Initiated 1,624 Members. 1,380 Members were Passed and they Raised 1,338. But, unfortunately, they un-Affiliated, due to Non-Payment of Dues, 1,445 Brothers.

Scotland 2013-2014

Following the presentation regarding various Social Websites at a meeting of the committee guidance regarding this aspect of the internet would be incorporated into the existing website guidelines and circulated for comment before the next meeting of the Committee. The Grand Lodge website was discussed and it was agreed that a more proactive approach was necessary with regard to posting news of forthcoming Grand Lodge events and reporting on significant and noteworthy occasions.

Nevada 2012

Reports that the state of the Fraternity good and improving rapidly. They have attempted to be a good steward of this inheritance and to continue to guide it in the same positive direction. They still reap the benefits of various books, movies and increased public awareness of our Fraternity. Most of our Lodges are initiating new members. They were fortunate enough, this past year, to have raised so many new Brothers that the total number of losses during the year was completely offset.


