# A Tribute to Donald E. Mayer By Robert H. "Bud" Erickson P.G.M.



Donald E. Mayer was a man of high integrity, honor and dignity.

Brother Mayer was a life-long resident of Southeast Iowa where he was born on November 8, 1933 and raised in Van Buren County in the town of Farmington, where he graduated from high school. He was a carpenter/contractor in Farmington, then moved to Fort Madison to apply his trade. Brother Mayer married Rose M. Coleman on November 9, 1988 at Nashua. He has two daughters Allison and Diane. He was a member of St. Luke's Episcopal Church. He was a Veteran of the United States Army, serving from 1956-1958.

Don's theme in office as Grand Master was "Be a Builder " and as he completed an ongoing five year plan to raise 2000 members by the end of 2005, he was proud to announce that he exceeded that goal.

He was very instrumental in challenging members to use existing programs to enhance membership.

Don received his three degrees of Masonry in Claypoole Lodge No. 13 at Fort Madison where he was raised on July 25, 1969. He served as Worshipful Master and held all lodge offices except Tyler. His service to the Grand Lodge included wearing the Purple of the Fraternity as Grand Marshal in 1981-1982; Senior Grand Warden 1995-1996; and Deputy Grand Master, 2001-2002. Don served as Grand Master of Masons of Iowa 2004-2005.

His committee work included Visitor's Committee 1985-1986, the Committee on Division and Reference, 1986-1987 and Chairman of the Division and Reference 2003-2004. The Grand Charity Board 2000-2003. He held District Lecturer's Certificate No. 2735.

He was a member of Davenport Scottish Rite. His York Rite membership was in Potowonek Chapter No. 28, R.A.M. at Fort Madison, Zerubbabel Council No. 22 R. & S.M. at Burlington; and Delta Commandery No. 51 K.T.at Fort Madison. He was a member of Kaaba Shrine at Davenport, Research Lodge No. 2, the Southeast Iowa MI-DL Club, the Lee County Craft School and the Fort Madison Temple Board. He was awarded the DeMolay Legion of Honor in 2003.

Donald Mayer laid down the working tools of life on Thursday, February 7, 2019. The Masonic Memorial Service was held Sunday, February 24, 2019 at 2:00 P.M. at Barr Memorial Chapel in Fort Madison, Iowa. May the Great Architect of the Universe look over this good and faithful servant and welcome him home to that house not made with hands eternal in the Heavens.



# Grand Master's Message "Be A Mason"





One of the points of my program this year is to be aware of your Masonic experience and the Masonic experience you are creating for others. This article is meant to give you some food for thought about your lodge. Which of the following best describes your lodge?

Before becoming Grand Master, I had a chance to just stop in and visit lodges. One time I got to a lodge a little early, so I sat in the car waiting for the lodge to be opened. It was during warm weather, so I had the window down. As two brothers walked past one said to the other "what's he doing here?" You can imagine how welcome I felt. How often do we unintentionally do something that makes our brothers feel the same way?

I recently asked a group of lodge officers if their lodge was a "welcoming" lodge. Everyone raised their hands that they had a "welcoming" lodge. This

was to be expected. I am sure you feel the same way about your lodge, but does everyone feel welcome in your lodge?

Today most lodges feel fortunate to have ten percent of their members attend their meetings. We wonder why we don't see a brother more than once after his Third degree. Most people will not go where they do not feel welcome. There can be other causes for lack of attendance but one of the things we can control is how welcome someone feels in our lodge.

I had the opportunity to visit the Grand Lodge of Missouri. Having been Grand Master for less than twenty-four hours, traveling alone, and wearing a Masonic shirt I stopped to get gas. While I was filling the car, I noticed a man standing by the door to the station. He appeared to be waiting for his wife. When I approached the door to the store the man greeted me with a smile and a warm "Hello Brother". We visited for a little while. Just taking the time to visit with me made me feel welcome.

We all know how to make someone feel welcome. The question is do we take the time to do it? Do we treat our brothers like we would want to be treated if the roles were reversed? These questions are easy to answer but, if you are like me, to make the answers a reality takes constant attention and continued growth.

Let us not forget to strive to make everyone who enters our lodge feel welcome.

# Grand Lodge of Iowa Upgrades Membership Management



On February 1, 2019, the Grand Lodge Office upgraded to the Iowa Grand Lodge Masonic Membership Manager software by Grand View Systems. The Grand Secretary and Grand Lodge office staff have been working with Grand View

Systems to convert thousands of records to the new database. The system will allow office staff and lodge secretaries the ability to update member histories and statuses in real time. Currently 58 lodge secretaries are listed as Lodge Adminstrators and may update member data directly. There are many features of the system that are being turned on, tested and utilized during this transition period. Normal Monthly Returns and other information may be sent to the Grand Lodge as before and the Grand Lodge office staff will enter the data on behalf of the Lodge. All Iowa Masons may create an account on the system to view their Masonic history and memberships and update changes in personal contact information. Instruction on account creation located on page 17. More information on the system and secretary training opportunities will be distributed throughout the year and you may contact the Grand Lodge Office.

# System Highlights Safe Secure Reliable

When implementing new technology into an existing organization we've found, too often, that privacy and security have taken a back seat to functionality. Just because you need a password to log in or get permission to join a group doesn't mean the data is secure.

# DeMolay on Display at Grand Lodge by Bill Kreuger

The year 2019 not only marks the 175th anniversary of the Grand Lodge of lowa, it also marks the 100th anniversary of the Order of DeMolay. In 1919 an international youth fraternity for young men and boys was founded in Kansas City, Missouri. Frank S. Land, a prominent Mason there founded the Order. It began with 9 members from the Kansas City area and has grown into an international organization. The Order of DeMolay is a Masonic sponsored organization for boys ages 12 to 21, and no relation to a Mason is required to join. It provides young men with the opportunity to learn leadership and social skills. DeMolay derives its name from Jacques DeMolay, the last Grand Master of the Knights Templar.

In March, the Grand Lodge will open its new exhibit, entitled "Order of DeMolay: a 100 Year Retrospective." The exhibit includes artifacts and materials showcasing DeMolay's beginnings in Kansas City to the present. One of the items included in the exhibit is a brochure advertising the new Order of DeMolay that was published in 1919 in Kansas City. It is described as a "club for sons of Masons and their chums." That initial group was sponsored by the Scottish Rite Bodies of Kansas City (Missouri).

Other exhibit items include a certificate from one of the first members of the Cedar Rapids Chapter, Charles F. Ely. The certificate, dated June 17, 1921, was signed by Frank S. Land. It was sponsored by Iowa Consistory No. 2, A.A.S.R. in Cedar Rapids. Many items of regalia including medallions and jewels will be featured in the exhibit. Several were owned by Bill Durow, who served as State Master Councilor for Iowa in 1964. Later Brother Durow worked for the Grand Lodge of Iowa and was in charge of the Lodge Service Committee.

The exhibit is being constructed in the old Lodge Service Committee office, across the hall from the Library's entrance. It may become a semi-permanent exhibit gallery devoted to the Order of DeMolay International. We hope that you will have an opportunity to visit and see this new exhibition.

# Marking Iowa Masonry's 175 years: 1844-2019 by Bill Kreuger

This year, Freemasonry in Iowa turns 175, the dodransbicentennial year! Look it up and then try to pronounce it. Freemasonry in Iowa is actually older than that, going back to the first Masonic meeting that took place in lowa territory. Freemasonry is actually almost 179 years old. The very first Masonic meeting was noted in the Iowa Territorial Gazette, dated November 5, 1840:

Masonic Notice.

"The regular members of the Masonic Fraternity of the Territory of Iowa are requested to meet at the rooms over the store of Ralston and Patterson, near the National Hotel, in the city of Burlington, on Wednesday evening next, 11th November, A.D. 1840, A.L. 5840 at 6 o'clock p.m." signed, A Mason.

In Theodore S. Parvin's diary for November 12, 1840, he mentions attending a meeting of Freemasons. The group included Brothers from Burlington, Mount Pleasant and Bloomington (now Muscatine). From this was developed the first lodges in Iowa, which included Burlington, Muscatine, lowa City and Dubuque. This led to the organization of the Grand Lodge of Iowa in 1844 at a convention held in Iowa City in January of that year.

The Grand Lodge of Iowa has several events planned during the year. One of which is an exhibit showcasing the history of lowa's Grand Lodge. 175 years is a long time to cover in an exhibit, so we are planning on covering the history by looking at some of our important Grand Secretaries. Those include T.S. Parvin, Newton Parvin, C.C. Hunt, and others who were instrumental in the overall development and direction of the Grand Lodge of Iowa and the Iowa Masonic Library and Museums in its early years. Many of those individuals helped to make the Iowa Masonic Library one of the more important resources in the Masonic world.

The exhibit, tentatively titled "Freemasonry in Iowa, 1844 to 2019: a 175 year Retrospective," will open in early June 2019 and will run through December. More information about this exhibit will be forthcoming. We hope you will be able to visit the Grand Lodge of Iowa and help celebrate the dodransbicentennial.

# Farmer's Lodge No. 168 by David B. Jackson

After years of research, and a cold and snowy Sunday morning to sit home and do a bit of artwork, below is a pretty accurate depiction of what the first real Farmers Lodge No 168 lodge building looked like. I researched the building for years, right down to the details of the lightning rods noted in our lodge minutes! It was built in late 1866 and the lodge took actual title to the 2nd floor in March 1867. There are no known photos but a member of the A. Walton family had a crude sketch from 1920's or 30's, when it was a house. Ike Farley who was first station agent west of lowa City on the Underground Railroad built the store and lived there. The Farmers Lodge met in 2nd floor and had steps going up the outside. I was able, many years ago, to actually go inside the building as it was moved straight up north on the same road and used as a basis for Raymond Britten's house, Raymond now being several years deceased. He told me the story of moving in this building off the river and some lodge met in the top. When I said there were steps up the outside he took me to one of the house additions and showed me the original part of the clapboard siding, still exposed inside his house, and sure enough, you could see the painted outlines of the steps on the north siding. I also researched our lodge minutes and found many entries about the place. The Marengo Republican newspaper mentioned it in a 1871 article. And I was able to interview a few people who remembered it when they were little kids. It was fun researching the building. This building actually sat 100' north of the river bank of the English River, and this view faced the road. There was a cold storage cave 20' south and close to the road. The road was 6' lower then and there was an old iron bridge across the river at that time. When they built-up the road bed and put all those culverts in, it really changed the whole landscape, now everything floods. But this is what it would have looked like back in the 1800's. They used to have big deals up on the 2nd floor back in those days, when they had only candles and oil lamps to do Degree work, and held big meals with those oysters that only cost 23 cents! Often they did multiple degrees for various candidates up there in one night,



starting as early as 5:00 PM, staying as late as 2:00 AM, to open and close on all three degrees, plus the actual degree work! I think I counted six or seven candidates one night! Can you imagine coming down those steps late at night to hitch up your horse and ride home? The actual sketch I did is much smaller than this and I scanned and blew it up, so that is why it looks a bit rough, but it was a really sharp pencil. This is what happens when it is well below zero and snowy outside, and I have nothing better to do! Hope you enjoy. DJ

And I found the reference to our Farmers Lodge Webb Custodian and Webb Ritual Work from our April 1865 minutes for Farmers Lodge 168. It looks like the Webb School of Instruction was held at Farmers Lodge every Saturday evening during the winter of 1864-65:

Report of Nelson Rogers, Worshipful Master, to the Grand Lodge of Iowa April 30, 1865:

Farmers Lodge No. 168, located at Foote P.O. lowa County, is in a flourishing condition, and doing good and square work. The hall is in the second story of a frame building, has all the necessary apartments for work, and is secure. Webb School of Instruction was held in the hall during the present winter with good success and a full attendance. The officers were: Nelson Rogers, W.M., Preceptor; J.F. Lodwig, Sect.; and R.R. Miller, Tyler. They held their meetings every Saturday evening, and made good progress in the Work. This new lodge will compare favorably to any lodge in this jurisdiction and bids fair for future usefulness.

As I have moved out of the jurisdiction of my district, and will be unable to attend to the duties of Custodian therein, I therefore respectfully offer my resignation as such, hoping there may be a more able brother to supply the place. - Yours Fraternally, Nelson Rogers, District Deputy Custodian, 21st District.

This history is so neat. I drive by the old place on the riverbank where the lodge used to be, every day on the way to work. The brother who built our new lodge building in 1866, Ike Farley, was the first station agent west of lowa City on the Underground Railroad. His virtuous sayings are still valid today: Ike Farley Quotes: "We well remember when the U.S. government warned everybody not to feed or shelter a poor human being, who was fleeing from his task master, and who had committed no crime whatever, except to desire personal freedom." - Isaac Farley — April 27, 1893

"People should learn if they do not already feel, it is better to have the strength of the Union (of States) at the sacrifice of some local interest than to have disintegration without any sacrifice. It is a big thing to say I am an American." - Isaac Farley – September 7, 1893

# Valentines Dinner at Star Lodge No. 115 by Kurtis Kruse, Secretary

Star Lodge Mason's led by Jeff Fisher and Payton Pringle invited their wives/significant others/daughters and as you can see their children were invited to a Sweetheart/Valentines meal on Tuesday the 12th of February which turned out to be a very frigid, snowy and windy night which may have brought the attendance down some but the families in attendance dined on spaghetti

with meat sauce, salad, garlic bread and incredible peach, cherry and apple pies. Drinks were provided and several Mason's banded together including Brian Ahrens, Benjamin Badgley, Dave Cook and Kurt Kruse to purchase a couple of dozen red roses to assure every lady or gal regardless of age left with a flower of their own.
