

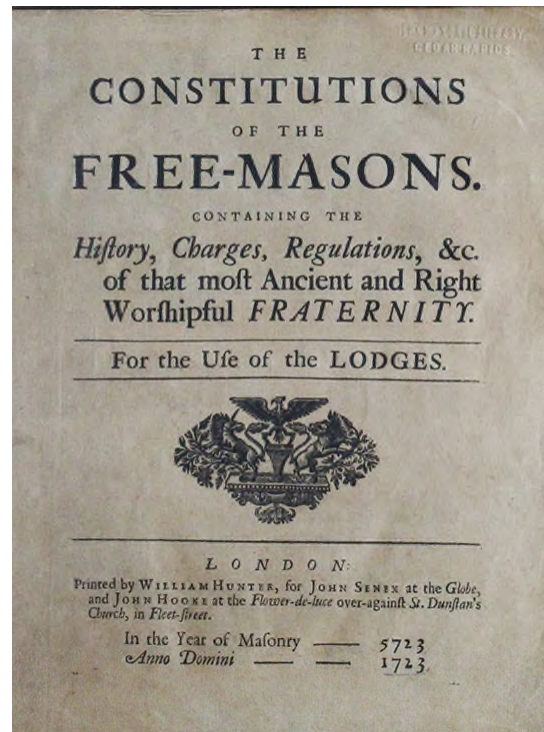

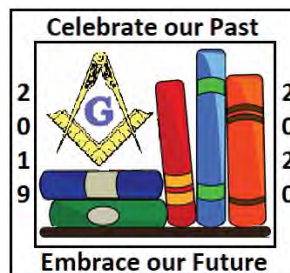

The Masonic Quiz bowl is being held again this year and shows how much knowledge high school students have at their fingertips. Also, a golf outing is planned for June.

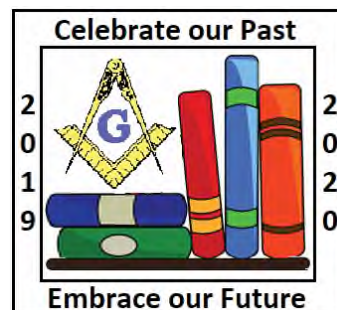
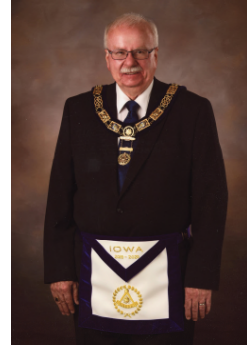
Your Grand Lodge Officers have been outstanding ambassadors for the Fraternity. When you see any of them be sure to thank them for their efforts.

Forty and Two Thousand

Q. Following a lodge meeting at which we had heard an explanation of the Second Degree Tracing Board, a discussion arose as to the story of Jephtha's battle and the death of "forty and two thousand" warriors. Some said the figure was 2,040 and others that it should be 42,000. Which is correct?

A. The King James "Authorized Version" of the Bible (at Judges XII, 6) gives the number as "forty and two thousand" and that is the source of some confusion, although it is a precise translation from the original Hebrew, with each word in its correct place. It is perhaps necessary to explain that it is not possible in Hebrew to say "forty-two"; one could say "two and forty" (as in German) or "forty and two", but the "and" must be there. For the remainder of the argument, I quote from a recent Lodge newsletter by Brother C. T. Holmes, Secretary of United Technical Lodge No. 8027: The 1st Chapter of the Book of Numbers gives an unequivocal answer to this problem. The Lord commanded Moses to number each of the twelve tribes of the children of Israel "every male from twenty years old and up-ward, all that were able to go forth to war". Verse 21 says: "Those that were numbered of them even of the tribe of Reuben were forty and six thousand and five hundred." Verse 46 gives the final figures of all the tribes "So were all those that were numbered of the children of Israel, by the house of their fathers, from twenty years old and upward, all that were able to go forth to war in Israel. .All that were numbered were six hundred thousand and three thousand and five hundred and fifty." The figures for each of the twelve tribes are given in verses 21 to 43, and the wording of the final total leaves no room for error, 603,550. That total can only be achieved when we calculate the census of the individual tribes by the same method as we use for the 42,000 in Jephtha's battle. Finally, one hears a great deal of criticism, nowadays, of the New English Bible and it is only fair to add a word of praise. In its account of the slaughter of the Ephraimites (Judges XII, 6) it gives the figure in modern terms—"forty-two thousand".

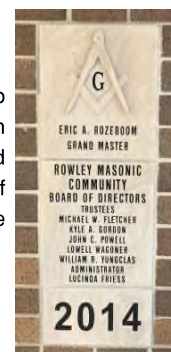

History of Hiram in the Hills By Harry Dolder

Tradition has it that, in ancient times:

Masons met on the highest hill and in the lowest vales to secure privacy. The tradition alone has been sufficient to stir the imaginations of modern Masons with the result that Masonic meetings have been held in many "strange and weird places." According to Harry Carr's "The Freemason at Work," early Masonic manuscripts tell of Masons meeting in the open air, but in a remote and quiet place. This emphasis on isolation and solitude is illustrated in the "Laws and Statutes" of the Lodge of Aberdeen in 1670: "Wee ordaine lykwayes that no lodge be holden with-in a dwelling house wher ther is people living in it but in the open fields except it be ill weather, and then let ther be a house chosen that no person shall heir nor see us. . ." One ancient document stated: "A lodge is two interprentices, two fellow crafts and two masters-----on the highest hill or the lowest valley of the world without the crow of a cock or the bark of a dog, a day's journey from a borough town." Obviously, the idea was that the lodge should be far away from any human dwelling, far enough so that a watch dog or a crowing cock could not be heard.

In keeping with this, it is recorded that tinnars assembled at Crockentor, in the county of Devon, England, in the 17th century. This was a rocky hill rising to a height of 1300 feet, littered with granite boulders, and was a wild and remote spot, ten miles from any town. The spot was a natural amphitheatre where boulders on the rising sides could have provided seats for one hundred or more, while a table and seats were hewn from the moorstone.

In a low dale...

For the 40th year, the Old Capitol Past
Masters are hosting a Timber Lodge.

Set in a natural amphitheater,
surrounded by trees and bordered by a
small brook, we open a lodge of
Master Masons, and a Brother
Fellowcraft is raised to the sublime
degree of a Master Mason.

Since 1965 the Past Masters of the
various lodges in and around Johnson
County have presented the 3rd Degree
in this special setting amidst the
beauties of Iowa's countryside. The
place for the Timber Lodge is just
north of the village of Amana, where
the degree and a meal are presented to
any interested Master Mason.

After lodge is opened, the First Section
of the degree is presented by a team
selected by the president of the Old
Capitol Past Masters.

On June 30, 2008, Worshipful Master Larry Cochran and Past Master Harry Dolder attended the Iowa City Past Masters meeting held at Iowa City Lodge No. 4.

After the meal the meeting was opened and the necessary business was dispensed with, WM Cochran discussed that Canopy Lodge was interested in resurrecting Hiram in the Hills.

The Iowa City Past Masters were gracious in turning over the project and offered the furniture and fixtures that were left.

Saturday, July 25, 2009 was the culmination of weeks of work in preparation for the event.

After too much rain much too often, the weather finally cooperated but with the grazing cattle and tractors entering and leaving the site, the site was nearly impassable.

After brother Don Larson worked at grading with his tractor, we ordered a load of gravel. The first dump truck got stuck and had to be pulled out by a second truck load of gravel.

Most Worshipful Brother Ray Chamberlain was chairman of the National Masonic Campers and he planned their meeting to coincide with the outdoor lodge and as a result there were nearly 100 Masons on hand.

Canopy Lodge opened lodge and conducted the First Section and the Grand Lodge performed the Second Section.

The next year, 2010, it rained again, and the site was again deemed impassable so the degree was moved to the elementary school in Amana.

A better plan was then devised, and a shelter was reserved at F. W. Kent Park between Oxford and Tiffin where there were hard surface roads and it has been held there ever since.

The First Section of the Third Degree has been presented by a team from Canopy Lodge and in 2019 was presented by a team from the Hawkeye Study Group with assistance from two brothers from Iowa City Lodge No. 4.

The Grand Lodge Officers have traditionally presented the Second Section, and all have enjoyed lunch either between sections or following the degree.

Book Restoration Project By Bill Kreuger

This year, the Grand Master has selected for one of his fundraising projects, the rebinding/restoration of books from our Rare Book collection. As you may be aware, the Grand Lodge of Iowa started its Library through the efforts of Theodore S. Parvin, our first Grand Secretary and Grand Librarian. This was started in 1845; the Library grew slowly and remained with Parvin during its formative years.

In about 1882-83 the Grand Lodge of Iowa acquired the collection of Robert F. Bower of Keokuk after his death in 1882. At the time, Bower's collection was viewed by many in Masonic circles as the largest and most valuable collection of Masonic books in the world. The collection was valued at around \$12,000 and the Grand Lodge of Iowa obtained this library at a fraction of the cost. A good part of the Bower collection includes many of the books and materials in our Rare Book collection. Sadly, through the many years, some of these books have come into disrepair through use, environment and time. It is these books that we would like to have repaired/rebound and/or restored.

The work will be done by the Book Restoration Company of LaFarge, Wisconsin. The owner, James Twomey is a professional associate of the American Institute for Conservation as well as a Wisconsin Freemason. He has repaired and conserved many other books in our collection, including Franklin's edition of the Constitutions of the Free-Masons (1734), Ahiman Rezon (1817) and the Joseph Smith Manuscript ledger (daybook, 1840).

Through the fundraising efforts of the Grand Master, we will be taking several more books to Brother Twomey for conservation work. This group of books include:

Freemason's Magazine, vol. 10-11 (1797-1798)

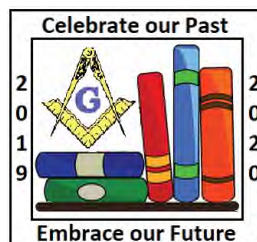
Sentimental and Masonic Magazine (1793-1794)

American Museum or Universal Magazine (1790)

Anderson's Constitutions (Kilwinning, 1723)

The Freemasons Monitor (1797)

Depending upon the weather, we hope to hand deliver these books to Brother Twomey on Saturday February 29. The estimated cost is \$500 per book, and possibly more or less depending upon the overall condition and what must be done. As the year progresses, we hope to take other books up to have them repaired, rebound and/or restored. This is a great project and one that will help preserve books in the Iowa Masonic Library for years to come.

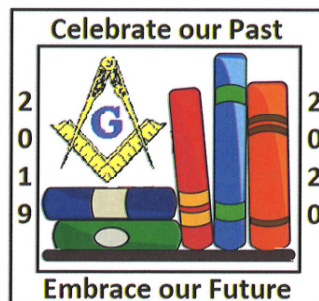
