The lowa Epilepsy Foundation is the charity I have chosen for my fundraising endeavor this year. You ask, why this foundation? 53 years ago, I was diagnosed with Epilepsy. Our granddaughter, Atalea, was diagnosed with Epilepsy two years ago. Darrell and I are very passionate about educating all Masons and their families about Seizure Awareness and Epilepsy. Purple ribbon magnetic pins, purple represents Epilepsy, are selling for \$10.00 each. With each pin you will receive a wallet card with instructions on how and how not to assist a person during a seizure.



Taking time to learn about distinct types of seizures and how to respond effectively not only benefits individuals with seizures, but also empowers us as a community to offer a helping hand when needed. Please start by printing out the Seizure First Aid poster located in the

resource file of the membership portal and place it in a very visible location in your lodge. I personally challenge each Mason to complete the Seizure Recognition and First Aid Certification course. This course is found at epilepsy.com/firstaid and is 75 min in length. It is on demand and free of charge. Upon completion, you will be First Aid Certified for two years. Please print out the certificate and take a picture holding your certificate. Send your picture to Darrell or myself. The goal is to have 1000 completed certificates by Grand Lodge Annual Communication 2024. Brother Skylar Watson is putting together a collage of the photos for publication.

The Iowa Epilepsy Foundation is partnering with The Grand Lodge of Iowa by promoting these Masonic fundraising/educational efforts on their website. Three scheduled Walks to End Epilepsy are scheduled. April 27, 2024 - Valley West Mall, West Des Moines, June 1, 2024 - Iowa City, and September 14, 2024 - Cedar Rapids. The lowa Epilepsy Foundation has given us permission to set up a table to pass out Masonic literature during these walks. Saturday morning Terry Osborne announced the new Masonic Instructors and District Lecturers in Iowa.

Business of the Grand Lodge

Grand Master Theodore C. Wiley opened the 179th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Iowa on Friday, September 15, at 8:30 A.M. The Grand Master gave his report to the Craft in addition to the other reports that were given throughout the morning session. Election of the 2023-2024 Grand Lodge Officers was the first order of business after lunch. The Grand Master's Award was given to Columbus City Lodge No. 107 in Columbus Junction. Worshipful Brother Bill V. Northup, the Executive Director of the Masonic Charitable Education Corporation, gave a report about what has happened the past year and a proposal to change the name of the MCEC to "lowa Masonic Charities." Jeremy Davis gave the Finance Committee report on the financial situation of the Grand Lodge of Iowa.

The fifteen lodges that earned the Lodge of the Year Award were recognized. Twenty-one Lodges were recognized as recipients of the Plus One Award with Legacy Lodge No. 678 in Des Moines recognized as the lodge with the largest net gain of membership. The six Master Builder Awards and fifty-four Ashlar Award recipients were recognized. Brother Bryan A. York of Pymosa Lodge No. 271 in Atlantic was named the New Mason of the Year.

The Teacher of the Year was Peggy Hansen from Griswold Community School District. The T.S. Parvin Award was given to Brother Dwayne A. Feight of South Gate Lodge No. 657 in Des Moines. Following the presentations, Craig Davis, Past Grand Master of Iowa and Administrator of the Masonic Service Association of North America, presented Grand Master Wiley with a plaque acknowledging him as Grand Master of Masons in Iowa and thanking him for his continued support of the Masonic Service Association.

Legacy Lodge No. 678 Most Growth 2023

There were 5 pieces of Legislation this year, the per capita increase from \$65.00 to \$75.00 passed. Chapter 45 Section 1 and 2 were changed It takes the power away from the Grand Master to arrest Charters and gives it to the Grand Lodge. Chapter 42 there were many changes in the entire Chapter. It gives the Grand Secretary a new time-line to distribute billing and outstanding dues to local lodges and to send out notifications to each member if their lodge is behind in paying their per capita. Chapter 8 changed the name of Masonic Charitable Education Corporation to "lowa Masonic Charities." The final piece of legislation was created by the Jurisprudence Committee, Chapter 5 to require local lodges to submit copies of their by-laws and Articles of Incorporation as well as updates to their bi-annual filing with the Secretary of State.

In addition, the conference initiates special projects such as collecting data on educational practices across all North American jurisdictions, as well as encouraging Masonic research and writing by individual educators.

The two day conference consists of workshops, speakers and other activities that will help Masonic educators to improve their skills and take home tangible new programs and methods that can be applied in their jurisdiction.

The conference is open to all Master Masons in good standing from any recognized jurisdiction that are interested in improving their skills as a Masonic educator!

The Grand Lodge of Iowa, A.F. & A.M. Iowa Masonic Charities

Iowa Masonic Charities, formally the Iowa Masonic Charitable Education Corporation (MCEC):

This Fund was originally created to provide low interest loans to students pursuing educational opportunities at an accredited College or University. Today, it awards Technical Scholarships and Grants to Senior applicants from Iowa Public High Schools who plan to enroll in a mechanical or trade course of study at an accredited Iowa Community College. Ten \$2,500 scholarships were awarded to deserving students in 2023.





Iowa Masonic Scholarship Endowment Fund:

This Fund awards College Scholarships to Senior applicants from Iowa Public High Schools. In 2023, the Scholarship Selection Committee considered 315 completed applications to select 25 finalists for interviews. From those interviewed, fifteen outstanding students were chosen to receive \$5,000 scholarships, and the other ten received \$2,500 scholarships. Since the program was initially funded in 1970, a total of 2,590 scholarships amounting to \$3,923,400 have been awarded.

Iowa Grand Lodge Charity Funds—Field Financial Aid:

This Fund awards Grants to Iowa families in need through an application process. Individual Iowa lodges have access to this fund by applying to the Grand Charity Board, providing an explanation of the need and any necessary supporting documents. Although it is not required,

of the need and any necessary supporting documents. Although it is not required, in most situations, the lodge also provides a matching donation to the same cause. Examples of recent requests include funding for wheelchair ramps at the homes of the elderly or infirm, Clothe-a-Child programs, the "Shop With A Cop" Holiday Gift



Drive, support for a worthy Brother who is suffering or in need, and general contributions to charitable endeavors in the local community. Over the last ten years, 94 grants totaling \$211,377 have been awarded.

Iowa Masonic Library & Museum Building Endowment Fund:



This Fund was established to create a permanent endowment designed to provide financial support for building upgrades and infrastructure needs of the Iowa Masonic Library & Museum, including such things as lighting improvements, heating and cooling repair, tuck-pointing, plumbing and fixtures.

Iowa Masonic Library Association:

This association established a fund to help finance special operational projects of the Iowa Masonic Library & Museum. The association annually supports a portion, if not all of the Assistant Librarian's salary, and recent funding priorities also include major digitization projects for the library collection, and the purchase of significant hardware and software for library and museum operations.

Current Grand Lodge Officer Jewels By Worshipful Brother Mike Shannon

Over the past year, it has been my honor and privilege to serve as the Senior Grand Deacon for the Grand Lodge of Iowa. Serving this honorable position, I couldn't help but think of all the Iowa Brothers who have worn the Senior Grand Deacons jewel before me. My research revealed a rich narrative about when the current Grand Lodge Officer jewels were purchased and other interesting facts about them.

I discovered that the Grand Lodge Officer jewels, currently in use by the elected and appointed Grand Lodge Officers, have been in use for over 114 years and offer a rich look into lowa Masonry's past. In my fact finding into this topic, I found a wealth of interesting information and had the exaltation of looking through the Grand Lodge of lowa Proceedings from 1907-2023.

At the Grand Lodge of Iowa Annual Communication in 1907, The Grand Master of Masons in Iowa, Most Worshipful Brother W. F. Cleveland, stated, "I would also call your attention to the present jewels of the Grand Officers, which have served their purpose well in the past, but should be replaced with new ones". Not too expensive, but of a quality and design befitting the dignity of the Grand Lodge of Iowa, and that the present jewels and vessels be deposited in the Iowa Masonic Library at Cedar Rapids, there to be preserved as mementos of a dead but cherished past".


Brother W.G. Newsome later presented his final report of the Finance Committee and stated "We your Committee on Finance, approve of the recommendation of the Grand Master in reference to the consecration vessels and jewels of Grand Officers. We recommend that the Grand Master, Grand Secretary, and Grand Tyler be authorized to purchase them and when the bill is approved by the Grand Master, the Grand Secretary shall issue an Order on the Treasurer in payment of the same."

Even though the purchase of a new set of Grand Lodge Officer jewels was approved in 1907, as stated above, the purchase of the jewels was not made and it came up again at the Grand Lodge of Iowa Annual Communication in 1909 when Brother W.F. Fidlar offered the following motion, "Whereas the jewels of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Iowa have served their purpose Iong and well, therefore be it – Resolved that the Trustees be authorized to procure a new set of jewels for this Grand Lodge, and that the old jewels be deposited in the Masonic Museum Department of the Iowa Masonic Library as heirlooms of a past generation."



Brother G. L. Schoonover then presented his final report of the Finance Committee and stated, "We have investigated the probable cost of the Grand Lodge Officer jewels, as approved in the resolution.....and recommend an appropriation of not to exceed \$500 for that purpose. We believe that the jewels of the Officers of the Grand Lodge should be in keeping with the dignity of the stations which they occupy and feel that it is the consensus of the opinion of the members of this body that its officers should have insignia of their rank which they will not be ashamed to wear at any Masonic gathering which they may be called upon to attend in their official capacity.

At the Grand Lodge of Iowa Annual Communication in 1910, The final report of the Trustees of the Grand Lodge of Iowa reported, "The Chairman of the Board of Trustees and the Grand Secretary were authorized to contract for a set of jewels for the Grand Lodge Officers, the purchase of same having been ordered by the Grand Lodge at the last session. A contract was made with Nabstedt & Sons of Davenport, Iowa for a complete set of jewels to be made of fourteen karat gold at a cost of \$500. The jewels have been accepted and will be delivered at this session to the proper officers, who will take great pleasure in showing them to you for your inspection and we trust your approval (see photo below from the 1910 Proceedings).



Also of interest, at the same Annual Communication in 1910, it was said, "Brother Gardner made a statement relative to the placing of a diamond in the jewel of the Grand Master, where upon Brother John W. Bary moved that the Board of Trustees be instructed to procure a suitable diamond to be placed in the jewel of the Grand Master. After some discussion, the motion was lost."

The Jewels were originally purchased to be pinned on the jacket pocket and were worn this way for many years. The pin-type fasteners are still visible on the back of the Grand Lodge Officer jewels.

At the Grand Lodge of Iowa Annual Communication in 1939, a supplemental report was included in the Annual Proceedings stating, "The Grand Master presented to the Grand Lodge orally Tuesday the question of changing the jewels used by the Grand Lodge Officers from the present pin-type fastener to a ribbon type to be worn about the neck of the officers. He stated that the cost of making the change would be offset by the saving in gold reclaimed. This presents a change in Grand Lodge equipment or property and is therefore a matter that should receive attention and action of the trustees of the Grand Lodge. The matter is respectfully referred to the Board of Trustees for their consideration, with power to act."

At the Grand Lodge of Iowa Annual Communication in 1940, The Board of Trustees issued the following statement, "Your Board of Trustees studied the matter and after full consideration, it was decided to make no change in the form of the jewels."

Later, at the Grand Lodge of Iowa Annual Communication in 1967, Brother Joe Johnson introduced a resolution pertaining to the gold neck collars stating, "The Board of Trustees of the Grand Lodge be and are hereby authorized and directed to obtain appropriate gold jewel collars containing a replica of the seal of the state of Iowa to be furnished to each Grand Lodge Officer during his term of office, upon which, shall be affixed the jewel of his office and that a similar collar shall be presented to each past Grand Master."



The purchase of the gold jewel collars was finalized at the Grand Lodge Annual Communication in 1968 when the Trustees reported, "In compliance with the resolution adopted by the Grand Lodge in 1967, the Trustees authorized Brother Charles T. Jackson, Deputy Grand Secretary, to order 30 gold jewel collars to supply to the Grand Lodge Officers and Past Grand Masters. The order was placed with the Luther Company of Berlin, Wisconsin, and there is ample evidence that these collars are now in use."

The Grand Lodge Officer jewels, are a true testament to the rich history of the Grand Lodge of Iowa, are a historic link to our celebrated past, and continue to be a commitment to preserving the ideals of Masonry into the future. They are a true testament to the rich history of the Grand Lodge of Iowa and its steadfast support to the traditions of days of old.

Items from the Collection

Hello Iowa Masons!

In small talk the most common question I get asked is, "did you find anything cool yet?" Well, I found four items that I think are pretty nest. I recently found a Masonic apron worn by Dr. F. F. DeSouchet, of France. DeSouchet was a soldier under Napoleon I. He came to America where he fought in the War of 1812 and later with President William Henry Harrison at the Battle of Tippecanoe. I found two issues of the Boston Gazette from 1813 in a drawer as well. As far as I can tell, they do not have any Masonic articles, but when I have more time, I plan to read the whole paper and I'll see what I can find!





I found the original Trowel used during the cornerstone ceremony of the Iowa Masonic Library in 1955. To me, the trowel is unbelievably cool. It might not seem like it with how many items we have in the collection, but I worry things like the trowel will get lost to history. I also found T.S. Parvin's Past Grand High Priest of the Grand Council of Royal Arch Masons of Iowa jewel that was presented to T.S. Parvin in 1854-1855. He not only served as our Grand Secretary from 1844-1851 and 1853-1901 but served in seemingly as many appendant bodies as he could while in Masonry.



Grand Master Wiley presented Michael with his pin. Worshipful Master Bush presented Michael with a Bible,



And the Greatest of These... Wade E. Sheeler, P.S.G.W.

The three great tenants of Freemasonry are Brotherly Love, Relief, and Truth. The practice of Charity has been so inextricably linked to the Masonic Fraternity, that one could easily claim that it is one of the landmarks of our Order. Charity is a universal characteristic of Freemasonry. It has been said that a Mason should give without remembering and receive without forgetting.

The Old Charges or Gothic Constitutions outlines a Mason's duties to God, his master, his family and society in general. It was from these Old Charges that the Reverend Dr. James Anderson drafted the "Antient" Charges (1723) which prefaced the Book of Constitutions. In operative terms the Old Charges directed stone masons to assist a strange mason with up to two weeks' worth of work and lodging. In speculative terms, they enjoined a Mason to assist the needy and act with Charity towards all mankind.

There has been some speculation that Charity may have at least been one of the reasons for the founding of Freemasonry. Box clubs were known to have existed in many of the trades and crafts in the 1600s. Members of a particular trade or craft would meet on a regular basis in a local inn or tavern to socialize and discuss the affairs of their craft. In a prominent location at these meetings would be a box which the members would pay their dues and into which fines for misdemeanors that a member may have committed could be paid. If a member became ill or was prevented from working for lawful reasons, he could claim support from the box until such time as he had regained his health or secured gainful employment. Many of these "box clubs" are said to have had primitive initiatory ceremonies and to have begun to admit men who had no particular connection with a particular trade or craft. Freemasonry may have developed out of such a series of box clubs original to operative stone masons. In 1725, the immediate Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of England (FRANCIS, 2nd DUKE OF BUCCLEUCH) proposed that the Grand Lodge should form a central fund of Charity to provide financial relief to distressed brethren and their dependents. After much debate, the Committee on Charity was established in 1727. It is of particular interest that Anthony Sayer, the first Grand Master applied for charity on three separate occasions prior to his death in 1742.

The word "charity" originated in Old English to mean a "Christian love for one's fellows" and until at least the beginning of the 20th century this meaning remained synonymous with charity. The word "charity" is linked to Christianity with the word originally coming into the English language from the Old French word "charite", which derived from the Latin word "caritas", a word that can be traced back to the Ancient Greek word "agape", the highest form of love, and "the love of God for man and of man for God". Over time the meaning of "charity" has evolved from Christian love. Modern translations usually translate "agape" as love.

Most forms of charity focus on providing the basic necessities of life such as food, clothing, and shelter, but other actions also are considered forms of charity, such as visiting the imprisoned, the elderly, and the sick, educating orphans, and supporting social movements.

Christians believe that their giving is a reflection of the love of Christ that resides in them. In the flesh, we are takers, ever since the days of Adam and Eve. Even our very act of giving can be corrupted by self-serving motives. Christ's life in us reverses this trend. We become givers when in close communion with his Spirit. Not just givers of money, but of everything: time, energy, love, talents, emotions, and on and on.

In Judaism, "Tzedakah", a Hebrew term that literally means righteousness but commonly used to signify charity-refers to the religious obligation to do what is right and just. Jews give "tzedakah", which can take the form of money, time, and resources to the needy out of righteousness and justice, rather than benevolence, generosity, or charitableness. The Torah requires 10% of a Jew's income to be allotted to religious deeds or causes, regardless if the recipient is poor or rich.

In Islam three are two methods of charity..."zakat" and "sadaqa". Zakat is one of the five pillars upon which the Muslim religion is based. 2.5% of one's savings is compulsory to be given as "Zakat" per each Islamic calendar year. Sadaqa is a voluntary charity. It can be given using money, personal items, or other resources. Even smiling to another person is considered "sadaqa".

The practice of charity in Hinduism, Buddhism, and Jainism is call "dana". It is the virtue of generosity or giving. In Pauls' first Epistle to the Corinthians, he places the greater emphasis on Charity (Love). "So faith, hope, and charity remain, but the greatest is love" or ("charity").

In the Third Section lecture of the First Degree, we hear these words:

"The covering of a lodge is a clouded canopy, or starry decked Heaven, where all good Masons hope at last to arrive by the aid of that ladder which Jacob, in his vision, saw ascending from earth to heaven, the three principal

rounds which are Faith, Hope, and Charity, which admonishes us to have faith in God, hope in immortality, and charity to all mankind. The principal of these is Charity, because Faith may be lost in sight, Hope ends in frustration, but Charity extends beyond the grave, through the boundless realms of eternity.

We often fall into the too common error that charity is only the sentiment of commiseration which leads us to assist the poor and destitute. The word as used by the apostle is "love", denoting that kindly state of mind which renders a person full of good-will and affection towards one another. John Wesley expressed his regret that the ancient Greek had not been correctly translated as love instead of charity, so that the triad of virtues would have been not "faith, hope, and charity", but rather "faith, hope, and love".

Charity is a beautiful gift of giving without expecting anything in return. It is a simple yet powerful gesture that can make a world of difference to those in need. It can unite, people, and communities, alleviate suffering, bring hope to those who have lost it. In a world where greed and self-interests often reign superior, charity reminds us of our shared humanity and collective responsibility to love and care for one another.

I would like to share a couple stories on the meaning of charity.

In Dorothy Lipson's book "Freemasonry in Federalist Connecticut 1789-1835, she describes how Masonic charity differed in it's underlying assumptions and style than civic charity. Remaining vestiges of Puritan times, which associated misfortune with divine retribution made appeals to civic charity particularly painful. Masonic charity, more broadly defined than civic charity, was available to it's members wherever they were. Masonic charity was secret, unlike civic charity whose administration made the entire town privy to the needs of each recipient.

Federal Lodge in Watertown, Connecticut purchased a cow for the use of a widow and her children, and the cow was carried on the books of the lodge for several years as a lodge asset, presumably to spare the family the embarrassment of accepting charity.

Another story comes from a small town in the mid 19th century.

A young man said to his wife, "Mary, you have a shawl you never use. May I have it? She was puzzled for a moment, but got the shawl and gave it to her husband. He thanked her and left the house. She was suspicious, because several evenings during the past few months he had left after dinner without any explanation. He was never gone long and when he returned he seemed to have an inner peace about him. He said nothing and neither did she A few days later, Mary was shopping in the village when she saw her shawl again. She was shocked. It was on the shoulders of a beautiful young lady. Angrily Mary followed the young girl to her home, a shabby shack. Mary knocked on the door. The girl opened the door and smiled when she saw the visitor. She held the door open and Mary stomped in. As Mary looked around the small shack, she saw an elderly lady propped up on a cot. The lady smiled and said: "How nice of you to visit" Mary was stunned and without words. Mary said, "I do not know what to say, so I will tell you the truth. I saw my shawl on your daughter and I was furious. Last week my husband asked me for it, but didn't tell me why. I still don't understand how you have it". The mother said "We have no idea who left it. We have no idea who has been doing some nice things for us these past few months." It started soon after my husband died. We had no money and I am unable to work. My daughter could not find a job. We were desperate. We had no food and no fuel. Then one morning when my daughter opened the door, she found several packages of food, clothing and coal on the porch. You have no idea what it meant to us. A short time later more packages arrived. My daughter found a note to call upon Mr. Tompkins and ask about a job. Mr. Tompkins soon hired her. He also sent a doctor to come and see me and has been coming regularly ever since. He won't take any money. We still find packages, but we have no idea where they come from. Suddenly Mary asked: "Was your husband a Mason?" "Yes, he was" the lady replied. "He loved his lodge, and his brothers". A short time later Mary left, promising to visit again. After dinner that evening Mary looked up from her knitting and said to her husband, "I think I learned the great secret of Masonry today". Her husband looked at her and asked, "And what is it". Mary answered, "to do good unto others and do so quietly.

Charity should inspire our lives and actions as brothers of this great Fraternity. It should encourage us to do a little bit more than what we would otherwise do and be a little better than what we would otherwise be.

Sometimes all that is needed by someone who is sad, or lonely, or in distress is a kind word or a gesture, a smile, a handshake, a pat on the back, or a hug. It is the little things my brothers, the little things that can add up. Charity is giving our love to others to brighten their day or make their lives a bit better.

Charity is about what our giving means to others. It should be given freely and with an open and giving heart. Our charity should be given without hope of recognition or notoriety, but only with love towards our fellow man. This my brothers is the greatest of these... love one another.

Legends of Iowa Masonry


The "Legends of lowa Masonry" is an award that can be presented to a Master Mason who has served their community, local lodge and the Masonic Fraternity with devotion over and above their standard, normal obligations. The "Legends of Iowa Masonry" is not given for service as Worshipful Master or any elected or appointed office or committee. The recipient is recognized by his brethren in Masonry for his service to the Fraternity, because of his efforts to support one or more Masons, a lodge or lodges, the Grand Lodge, or the Fraternity as a whole. It is a singular distinction, and indicates the esteem, respect, and admiration of the Brothers of their local lodge. Any Masonic lodge in lowa may bestow a maximum of one "Legends of Iowa Masonry" award each year.


Brothers receiving this award will be honored at the Grand Lodge Annual Communication every year. Submissions must be written and submitted to the Grand Lodge of Iowa Grand Secretary and Deputy Grand Secretary, no later than 15 August of each year, and must include:

- Nominated brother's full name and mailing address
- Nominating lodge name, phone number, and email address
- High quality photo of the brother being nominated in jpeg format
- Summary of the nominated brother's accomplishments and contributions
- \$35 check made out to the Grand Lodge of Iowa for a 16x20 inch, foam board wall plaque and a certificate.

The award recipient is not required to be an officer of the lodge, or any special lodge committee, but they often are. The recipient must be a Master Mason in good standing with his lodge, as well as the Grand Lodge lowa. The nominated brother will receive a 16x20 inch foam board wall plaque and a certificate at the Annual Communication, after which, the lodge can take this plaque back to their lodge to be displayed with distinction as they see fit.

A lodge may elect the award to be given only once per year and the award may only be received once in a lifetime, by a Master Mason. It is a great honor and pleasure to receive such an award, knowing it comes directly from the brethren of your lodge, friends, and community.
