#### 2022 Iowa Masonic Scholarships

Pictures of the twenty-five recipients of a 2022 Grand Lodge of lowa \$5,000 Scholarship and \$2,500 Scholarships are shown throughout this issue of the "Bulletin." All quotes are taken from the recommendations of high school staff members that accompanied the student's applications.

Brother John C. Rothlisberger chairs the Scholarship Selection Committee that sorted through over 350 completed applications, and selected 25 applicants for interviews. From those interviewed fifteen outstanding students were chosen to receive \$5,000 scholarships, and the other ten received \$2,500 scholarships. The interviews were held by Zoom. Since the program began in 1970, 2,565 scholarships totaling \$3,823,400 have been awarded.

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#### Help Me Get Out of My House!! By Todd Morgan, Mount Hermon Lodge No. 263



Imagine this: You are told you cannot leave your house for several months with no chance of this situation changing anytime soon. You need to see your doctor because you have significant health issues that need to be monitored and managed. These situations have nothing to do with Covid-19. It goes on year after year after year. What will you do? Individuals faced with this scenario are those who use wheelchairs and do not have a way to enter or exit their house or trailer. In some cases, the local fire department is called to help them get out of and into the place where they live. Kudos to our first responders for being there when our neighbors need them.

All of us were in this situation in April 2020 when the Covid-19 pandemic was in its infancy. The rest of us worked through the issues and eventually made it out to the other end. But our neighbors who are homebound find themselves in this situation for not only months, but often years. Their relatives support them the best way they can. Over time, though, the supporting family members are getting older and are not physically able to help their loved one get out of or into their home.

There is a solution! There is Wheelchair Ramp Assistance Program (WRAP)! Their mission is: To provide affordable, flexible home access on a timely basis to individuals in need. WRAP is a 501.c.3 non-profit organization governed by a volunteer Board of Directors. WRAP's target population is individuals in need of cost-effective, timely, safe, and effective home access. The ramps or other home access solutions provide our neighbors an opportunity for a long-term, independent, and healthy life.

In addition to ramps, WRAP designs and builds exterior steps for clients using walkers; these steps are modified by depth and height. Other clients' needs can be met by adding handrails to already existing exterior steps. We provide repairs for all our construction projects when needed. WRAP will remove and recycle ramps and other projects when no longer needed at the client's home, and we recycle materials to further lower costs for our clients.

WRAP utilizes volunteers to design and build permanent, weather-resistant, wooden accessibility ramps on homes during our build season, weather permitting. The use of skilled volunteers keeps the cost of the project more affordable, with clients' costs only for lumber, fasteners and other supplies, and building permit costs. Most ramp projects are built in one day by a team of ten volunteers.



WRAP typically installs 70-80 wheelchair ramps and other accessibility projects per year. Those in need have little, if any extra funds to pay for these assemblies to be designed and installed. Additionally, since the derecho, the cost of building materials has risen 30-40%. With some project costs starting at \$2000 and others costing upward of \$4500, how does WRAP get the resources to help our neighbors in need? The answer is donations! The large majority of these projects are paid for by donations. In short, you are the answer! So, The WRAP organization is supported by in-kind and financial donations by generous individuals and groups like you.

Recently, there were two WRAP projects installed and financially supported by a partnership between Mount Hermon Masonic Lodge No. 263 at Cedar Rapids and the Grand Lodge of Iowa. WRAP provided the design and physical work with the two Masonic organizations providing approximately \$2000 on one project and \$2500 on the second project to get the work completed.

A small, core group of 25-40 individual volunteers produces much of the build work for these home access

projects. In addition, WRAP partners with organizations providing team building and Volunteer Time Off (VTO) opportunities. WRAP provides the design, support, mentors, and tools to complete the project in one day for these team builds. #### Theodore Roosevelt Jr., Veteran and Mason By Amy Weiler

Theodore "Ted" Roosevelt Jr. was born on September 13th, 1887 at Oyster Bay, New York. He was also known as the third, but was known as junior, because he was the son of the President. Officially he was Junior or the second, but never went by that. So, this Teddy was, incorrectly, called Junior. He was the eldest son of America's 26th President, Theodore Roosevelt, the first child of First Lady Edith Roosevelt Ted had several siblings – Kermit, Ethel, Archibald, Quentin, and their half-sister Alice from President Roosevelt's first marriage. From an early age, Ted had high expectations placed on him. Much of this was on the part of his father who expected him to carry on his legacy of military service in general, and the Rough Riders in particular. There was also the constant scrutiny of the general public, as Roosevelt's unexpected presidency brought with it a great deal of media attention. The family was thrust into the limelight that most of them quickly became thoroughly sick of.



Ted's early education was private schools, followed by Harvard University. His first career after graduating in 1909 was investment banking and business. Though some of his relatives had a low opinion of such things,

Ted's success secured the family financial security for years to come. From 1917 to 1919, he served on the front lines in World War I, during which he was injured and his brother Quentin was killed. Later, Ted went into politics, and the offices he held included Assistant Secretary of the Navy, March 10, 1921 to September 30, 1924, Governor of Puerto Rico, September 9, 1929 to January 1932, and Governor-General of the Philippines, February 29, 1932 to July 15, 1933.

Ted had a decorated military career, particularly during World War II. He was promoted to the rank of Brigadier General in 1941, the highest he would achieve. Known for always wanting to be on the frontlines as opposed to behind a desk, it took him three attempts to gain permission to be there personally at the Normandy Invasion, the first two requests were verbal and were denied. The last one was written and was approved with reluctance). Initially, Ted was refused due to his poor health (a recent case of pneumonia, arthritis likely caused by injuries he suffered during World War I, and even heart problems, though that was something Ted had kept hidden. The commanding officer finally allowed it, convinced Ted would die on the beach. At the age of 56, Ted was the oldest member of the invasion, the only General to personally be part of the first wave, and one of the first off his vessel. Wielding a pistol and utilizing a cane, Ted personally did reconnaissance and directed troops on Utah Beach. Though General Eisenhower selected Ted for a promotion to Major General, this would not come to pass. Ted Roosevelt Jr. passed away of a heart attack on July 12, 1944 in Normandy, France. He was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor for his actions on D-Day, making Ted and Theodore Roosevelt plus Arthur and Douglas MacArthur the only father and son pairs to both receive this honor. Ted Roosevelt Jr. was buried at Normandy American Cemetery and Memorial in France, and his brother Quentin would be interned next to him in 1955.

Sadly, much of the Masonic-related history during Roosevelt's time has been lost. In 2003, a fire occurred at the Temple of Roosevelt's home lodge, destroying many of their records, so our knowledge is limited. We do know that Ted was Initiated on December 17, 1919 and Passed on May 19, 1920. He became a Master Mason on July 7, 1920, and a member of the same lodge as his father - Matinecock Lodge No. 806 of Oyster Bay, New York. It's an Initiation Theodore would not live to see, as the former president passed away on January 6, 1919. Ted's Fraternal membership wasn't limited to the Grand Lodge. He was one of 502 people Initiated in 1923 as a member at Kismet Shrine Temple of Brooklyn, New York, and was also a member of the Scottish Rite in Washington, D.C.

#### The Rite of Circumambulation Wade E. Sheeler Past Senior Grand Warden

The act of making a circuitous movement about a sacred idol or object dates to the early history of mankind. Circumambulation comes from the Latin words (circum, which means around) and (ambulatus which means to walk).

The prevalence of this rite appears to have been almost universal among the ancients and alluded to the path of the sun in the heavens, from east to west by way of the south. The assembled people generally walked three times around the Altar of sacrifice and the turns are said to have always been to the right or with the right hand towards the Altar. Circumambulation also became identified with the rite of lustration (or purification by water). Since the path imitated that taken by the sun through the heavens, it was often identified with Sun-worship. The Greeks called this ceremony "from the right to the right". The Romans applied the term dextrovorsum to this movement. The Druids, whose mystical dance about the cairn (sacred stones), was essentially a circumambulation. The priest always made three circuits.

Circumambulation around the Altar was generally accompanied by singing or chanting of a sacred ode. Of the three parts of the ode, the strope, the antistrophe, and the epode were each to be sung at a particular juncture of the procession. The analogy to our Masonic scriptures given in the circumambulation is obvious.

Ritualized circumambulation occurs today in many of the world's religions and is an integral part of both Hinduism and Buddhism as well as Christianity, Judaism, and Islam. In many Hindu temples, the temple structure reflects the Hindu belief that the transition from daily life to spiritual perfection is a journey through stages. Walking around the shrine, by keeping time, is a common form of Hindu prayer.

In Zen Buddhism, jundo means any ritual circuit. At Tassajra each morning, the officiating priest visits four different altars on their way to the zendo where people go to practice Zen. In Judaism, Jewish brides often circumambulate their grooms during the wedding ceremony. Much Jewish dancing at weddings and Bar Mitzvahs is done by moving in a circle.

Tawaf is one of the Islamic rituals of pilgrimage. During the Hajj, Muslims are to circumambulate the Kaaba, the most sacred site of Islam located in Mecca, Saudi Arabia, seven times in a counterclockwise direction. This is to demonstrate the unity of the believers in the worship of One God.

Christianity also uses circumambulation in many of its' various practices. In the Catholic Church, a priest sometime circumambulates an Altar while incensing it with a thurible. At some Catholic shrines, it is a practice to circle the relic of a saint or an image of Jesus or the Virgin Mary. This is often done three times to reference the Holy Trinity. On Palm Sunday, many Christian churches have a procession of parishioners who carry palm leaves about the sanctuary.

Although we do not know with certainty how the act of circling the Altar became a part of Masonic ritual, there is speculation that the practice began during the time of Operative Masonry and was intended to allow for a proper inspection of new candidates for physical deficiencies.

Carl Claudy in his book "Introduction to Freemasonry" writes "Among the first religions were sun and fire worship. Worship of the sun in the sky was done symbolically by worship of fire upon piles of stones which were the first Altars. Early man imitated the movements of his God."

In traditional observance lodges in America and most European lodges execute an officers' procession whereby the officers enter in a solemn procession and proceed about the Altar before assuming their stations. In the Third Section lecture of the Entered Apprentice Degree, we are taught the meaning of the point within the circle. This point represents the individual brother, the circle is the boundary line of duty which we are never to suffer our prejudices or passions to betray us. Symbolically, the point is the Volume of Sacred Law, the parallel lines representing St. John the Baptist and St. John the Evangelist and the circle is made by the Candidate led by the Senior Deacon in a procession about the Altar.

#### St. Louis World's Fair Souvenir By William R. Kreuger, Assistant Librarian





On April 30, 1904, the Louisiana Purchase Exposition was opened to the public in St. Louis to mark the 100th Anniversary of the Louisiana Purchase. The Exposition, also called the Saint Louis World's Fair stood on what had been a wooded park. It included about 1,500 buildings on 1,270 acres of a newly redesigned Forest Park. The Fair lasted about 7 months with 50 foreign countries and 43 of the then 45 states participating.

By the time the fair closed in December 1904 an estimated 20 million people had visited. Many souvenirs were available to fairgoers, one of which was recently donated to the Iowa Masonic Library and Museums. It is a pressed glass hatchet that has an embossed profile of George Washington on the blade. The profile is surmounted by the words, "The Father of His Country." On the opposite side of the blade is embossed "World's Fair 1904, and at the end of the glass handle are the words "Saint Louis."

Some may ask why a glass hatchet? The glass hatchet may have been used at the turn of the 20th century as a symbol of "taming" the west. They were produced, not only for the Saint Louis World's Fair, but for the 1893 Chicago World's Fair as well. Although it is not known who produced this hatchet, according to research information, it may have been produced by the Libbey Glass Company.

Although not specifically a Masonic artifact, the hatchet is currently in storage with our General History Museum collection. It is an important and interesting artifact from the turn of the 20th century.
