2023 Iowa Masonic Scholarships

Pictures of the twenty-five recipients of our 2023 Grand Lodge of Iowa \$5,000 and \$2,500 Scholarships are shown throughout this issue of the Bulletin. All quotes are taken from the recommendations of high school staff members that accompanied the student's applications.

Brother Craig A. Bargfrede chairs the Scholarship Selection Committee that sorted through over 315 completed applications, and selected 25 applicants for interviews. From those interviewed, fifteen outstanding students were chosen to receive \$5,000 scholarships, and the other ten received \$2,500 scholarships. The interviews were held by Zoom. Since the program began in 1970, 2,590 scholarships totaling \$3,923,400 have been awarded.



Angelo Soliman, Father of Pure Masonic Thought By Amy Weiler



Due to the nature of Brother Soliman's origins, we cannot be certain about the specifics of his earliest years. It is generally believed that he was born in 1721 as Mmadi Make, a name with ties to a princely class of a state in modern Nigeria. Captured and enslaved by a Spanish ship at seven, he eventually came to be owned by a Marquise in Sicily Here he was baptized as Angelo Soliman, getting his first name from a kindly African woman in the household named Angelina.

Even when he was young, Soliman had a reputation as a highly intelligent individual and received an education as a youth, arranged by the Marquise. She later reluctantly gifted him to Johann Georg Christian, Prince of Lobkowitz, at the latter's urging. As an Imperial General for Austria-Hungary, Lobkowitz travelled across Europe on military campaigns. Soliman became his valet and companion. He remained with him for over twenty years, and received schooling from the Lobkowitz's own chamberlain between campaigns. Upon Lobkowitz's death in 1755, Soliman joined the Vienna household of Prince Joseph Wenzel I of Liechtenstein. He eventually became the chief servant of the household.

something of a personal secretary to Wenzel, and a member of the inner circle of the Empire. He also received a salary. He became known as an important advocate for the poor and a go-between for members of the lower-classes and the sovereign.

In 1768, Soliman married Magdelena Christiani, the sister of a French general who served as a marshal for Napoleon Bonaparte. Though their union was done secretly, it was discovered by Wenzel, who released Soliman from his service and barred him from the palace. He and his wife moved to the inner city in Vienna and had their only child, a daughter named Josephine, on December 18, 1772.

A couple years after Wenzel's death in 1772, his nephew Prince Franz Joseph dropped the restrictions, granted Soliman his former positions back, and was given free apartments in the palace along with a 600 Gulden salary. Soliman was put in charge of educating his son Aloys, who would later rule as Prince of Liechtenstein.

According to lodge records, by November of 1781, Soliman had become a Freemason, though he would be kept off the rolls until 1783 due to questions on his status as a free man (he was added after he received a pension on full salary for life that year). He joined "True Harmony" (Zur Wahren Eintracht), an elite Vienna Lodge. His fellow members included the poet Ferenc Kazinczy and musicians Joseph Haydn and Wolfgang Mozart (records kept by the lodge indicate Soliman and Mozart met on multiple occasions). He rose to the rank of Vice-Grand Master of Ceremony (Grand Master), today the equivalent of Worshipful Master. For his Masonic name, Soliman chose "Massinissa," taken from an ancient Numidian king in North Africa. Soliman added scholarly elements to Freemason rituals, which affected Masonic practices throughout Europe. He is known as "Father of Pure Masonic Thought" due to his contributions to Masonic rites.

Besides his native language of Igbo, Soliman was also fluent in French, Italian and German. Supposedly, he learned German in seventeen days. He was also proficient in English, Latin, and Czech and was an expert chess player.

Soliman passed away at the age of 75 from a stroke while taking a walk on November 21, 1796. Although Soliman had been a close friend of Holy Roman Emperor Joseph II they could be found walking in the capital's park together, Joseph had died a few years earlier and the one ruling at the time was Francis II. Over the objections of Soliman's daughter Josephine, Soliman was deprived of a Christian burial and Francis II instead ordered his body stuffed, mounted, dressed in a feather headdress and apron, and put on display in the Imperial Natural History Museum of the Imperial House of Austria. The indignity did not end until the October Revolution of 1848, when the museum caught fire.



Symbolism of the Beehive in Freemasonry By Wade E. Sheeler, P.S.G.W.

The bee is one of nature's most energetic creatures. It never appears to rest, working from sunrise to sunset gathering nectar. The bee and hence the beehive has long been considered symbols of work and industriousness. In former times, when work had to be done by hand and every large piece of construction required great numbers of men, they seemed at a distance to be as busy as a swarm of bees going about their work. Although the ant may have sufficed to show that kind of activity, they do not produce the edible honey and the ant hill is not nearly so attractive.

In the lecture of the Third Section of the Master Mason Degree, the lecture contains the following words: "The beehive is an emblem of industry and recommends the practice of that virtue to all created beings from the highest seraph in heaven to the lowest reptile of dust. It teaches us that as we came into the world rational and intelligent beings, so should we ever be industrious ones, never sitting down contented while our fellow creatures around us are in want, when it is in our power to relieve them without inconvenience to ourselves."

In Bernard Jones "Freemasons Guide and Compendium", he writes "On old jewels, tracing-boards, lodge furniture, banners, summonses, certificates, etc, the beehive with its flying bees is often a prominent symbol, and in at least one case is to be found in a lodge seal. As far back as 1724-1727, a Masonic pamphlet (Letter from the Grand Mistress) which is often attributed to Jonathan Swift (1667-1745), speaks at length of the bee and the beehive as a symbol, and apparently our 17th century brethren were taught that the beehive was an emblem of industry recommending the practice of that virtue to all created things.

The bee and the hive have long been symbols of industry and regeneration, wisdom, and obedience with a place in Egyptian, Roman, and Christian symbolism. In Hinduism, Gods were frequently associated with bees, including Vishnu, Krishna, and Indra. These three are referred to as the Madhave, the nectar born ones and are represented by the bee. In Ancient Egyptian culture, the bee represented both royalty and the obedient subject. Horapollo stated "of all insects, the bee alone had a king". While we now know that that the "king" is actually a "queen", it is understandable how the hive structure contributed to this ancient symbolism. In a story of Egyptian mythology, Ra, the Sun God cried and his tears fell on the ground and turned into bees to convey messages to humankind. People in Egypt believed that bees represented one's soul.

The bee has long been admired as a builder and geometrician. Each comb consists of two layers of hexagonal cells arranged back to back. The partition is not a plane, but a collection of rhombs (a parallelogram with four equal sides and opposite equal acute angles). Three rhombs form the base of each cell. If a pin is stuck through each of the rhombs at the base of a cell, the points will penetrate three different cells on the opposite side of the comb. Thus each cell base is supported by three of the walls of the opposite cells. Bees were mentioned among the ancient Greeks as well. They believed that bees constructed the ancient site of Delphi. In the Temple of Apollo, there is a stone carved beehive. In the Christian tradition, the bee is even regarded as a symbol of Jesus Christ. The Paschal candle lit before Easter is made of pure beeswax to represent Christ. Christians associate the sweetness of honey with Christ's forgiveness of our sins and the sting of the bee to his justice. In Judaism, honey is considered a kosher food.

The Emperor Napoleon had bees stitched into the fabric of his robes. Clovis I (first king of the Franks) also used the bee as one of his symbols.

The earliest mention of the bee in Masonic ritual goes back to 1724 in Ireland. The early Masonic catechism

reads "A bee has in all ages and nations been the Grand Hieroglyphic of Masonry, because it excels all other living creatures in the contrivance and commodiousness of its habitation or comb."

Bees are mentioned 66 times in the Bible and honey is mentioned 61 times. A swarm of bees has often thought to be a divine occurrence. Honey bees have many characteristics which emulate various religious teachings:

- They are industrious and purpurposeful as they work.
- Their lives are short, but they are willing to serve their community.
- They respect leadership and serve one queen in their hive.
- They work together to prosper the hive. Each member has it's role.
- They are fiercely protective of the queen.
- They are peace-loving and only attack when threatened.
- They produce honey, which is valued for it's sweetness and is regarded as a sign of wealth and plenty.

Exodus 3:17 refers to Israel as "a land flowing with milk and honey".

Proverbs 16:24 "Gracious words are like a honeycomb, sweetness to the soul and health to the body".

Bees serve others. Being a part of a colony, bees help to sustain each other by gathering nectar from flowers to feed the young and build the honey comb. Bees also polinate crops and plants which benefits humans and other animals.

The beehive appears in the seals of the Grand Lodges of Alabama, Virginia and Utah. It is one of the symbols that the Mormons borrowed from Freemasonry and can also be found in the seal of the State of Utah.

Do's and don'ts for Making Contributions to the Iowa Masonic Library By Julia Wells



This quarter let's discuss some best practices regarding donating to the library and museum. In the past few months, we've had all kinds of new items donated to the library and museum. While we are so thankful for these items, I hate having to reject items when people made the trip all the way to the building. So here are some simple do's and don'ts when it comes to donating items.

Do call ahead, while the staff in the Grand Lodge love visitors, we are all doing our best to further lowa Masonry so please call ahead before arriving for donating or visiting. Do consult with the Grand Secretary or Assistant Grand Librarian before visiting with items for donation. If you discuss with one of us about your item, we are less likely to reject your items or waste your time coming over. Do make a note

as to what your donation is and why it is important. Donations come in waves, and often I must set your item down to answer a phone call or do something urgent and I would hate to forget who it came from or its history. If you are donating photographs, newspaper clippings, or other small items please use the label suggestion to help those cataloging have as much information as possible. Do utilize the online catalogue via the Grand Lodge website to help determine how many of the items you are considering donating that the library and museum already has in the collection. It is because of overcrowding with particular items that the lowa Masonic Library and Museum does not want certain books or items. As I mentioned in a previous bulletin, I have created a collections management policy. Inside the policy states we aim to only collect items regarding Freemasonry and Masonic Youth; books of relevance to Freemasonry, lowa, and religion; periodicals and proceedings regarding to Masonic history and its various orders; Rituals and cyphers for the various bodies within the Fraternity. The collections policy regarding the general museum is still in the works but is narrowed down to artifacts of historical significance and no more natural history specimens.

Please don't just show up with items or leave items at any of the entry doors. Those of us cataloging already have enough on our plates trying to support the collection, please do not add onto our workload without giving us any information about what we are now taking ownership of. Dropping items and leaving will result in being barred from donating in the future. Please don't assume that just because something is Masonic or you deem it cool enough to be displayed, it is something the collection can handle. Along with that, please don't bring anymore aprons, Masonic Bibles, swords, gavels, or copies of Morals and Dogmas by Albert Pike that are not of historical significance. It is hard to remember sometimes that we are an institution for the betterment of Masonry, not a catch-all for discarded items from loved ones. Another don't to remember when donating to the library is don't use staples or rubber bands. Staples, if not removed, will rust, and deteriorate the document it is holding together. I cannot tell you how many staples I have removed from items being dropped off.

In the end, please just be mindful that the library and museum are continuously a work in progress. Hopefully with these suggestions, everyone can be as excited as I am for the future of the library and museum.
