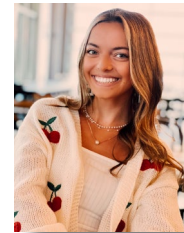

2024 Iowa Masonic Scholarships

Pictures of the twenty-six recipients of a 2024 Grand Lodge of Iowa \$5,000 Scholarship and \$2,500 Scholarship are shown throughout this issue of the Bulletin. All quotes are taken from the recommendations of high school staff members that accompanied the student’s applications.

Brother Craig A. Bargfrede chairs the Scholarship Selection Committee that sorted through over 330 completed applications, and selected 26 applicants for interviews. From those interviewed, fifteen outstanding students were chosen to receive \$5,000 scholarships, and the other eleven received \$2,500 scholarships. The interviews were held by Zoom. Since the program began in 1970, 2,616 scholarships totaling \$4,025,900 have been awarded.

The Masonic Cable Tow

In Freemasonry there are many indirect mentions of the word cord. Jewels hang from cords around our necks. The apron is tied by means of two cords. A silver cord appears in the scripture of the Third Degree. The anchor and ark doubtless had a cord to secure the ship. In the Past Master's degree of the York Rite there is reference to a three fold cord. The stones that were quarried for King Solomon's temple and the timbers of Lebanon that were used in construction of the temple, were doubtless towed by ropes. The sheaf of corn that hung near the waterford was hung by a cord.

There is a symbolism of the rope or cord that while not taught directly in the Ritual is understood by every Brother who understands the "Mystic Tie" of our Fraternity. That is the twisting together of many fibers to make an unbreakable cord.

The term cable tow is strictly Masonic in usage. If you look for the word in Webster's dictionary, you will not find it. Even in Freemasonry, the word cable tow varies in form and usage. In Samuel Pritchard's "Freemasonry Dissected" (1730), the cable tow was referred to as a "cable rope". In another edition, the tow line.

In English lodges, the hoodwink and cable tow are only used in the First Degree and have no symbolical meaning. In American lodges, it is used in all three degrees and has numerous meanings. The appearance of the cable tow in the Second and Third Degrees in American lodges possibly came about in 1843 with the meeting of the Baltimore Convention where it was defined as the scope of a man's reasonable ability. In the early days of American Freemasonry, the cable tow was considered to be as long as an hour's journey, roughly three miles.

Albert Pike was dissatisfied with the standard definition of the cable tow. He felt that it should represent a man deprived of light, knowledge of reason, of God, nature or even himself. To him it was a symbol of bondage. When the cable tow is lifted, the candidate receives light both physically and symbolically and he becomes bound to his brethren by a stronger obligation. Joseph Fort Newton saw the releasing of the cable tow as the moment a brother becomes bound to his lodge and brothers.

The origin and form of this word can be traced back to various sources. In Hebrew, it is "Khabel", in Dutch "cabel", both meaning a rope. In India and in Egypt as well as many other ancient mysteries, a cord or cable was used in the same way. Its' meaning was to have been some kind of pledge, a vow that a man pledged his life to. Even outside rites of initiation, the mention of ropes may be found. In I Kings, 20: 31 & 32, we read the following description: The King of Syria, Ben-hada, had been defeated in battle by the King of Israel and his servants are making a plea for his life. They approach the King of Israel "with ropes upon their heads," and speak of his "Brother Ben-hada." The King of Israel inquired if he was still alive? He is my brother. The servants brought the King of Syria before the King of Israel and his life was spared and a new pledge was given between the two men.

The cable tow is an outward and visible symbol of a vow in which a man has pledged his life or has pledged himself to save the life of another at the risk of his own life. If the lodge may be considered as symbolic of the world, then the cable tow may be considered like the cord which unites a baby to its mother at birth. As the umbilical cord is cut at birth and replaced by a tie of love and obligation between a child and his mother, so may a Brother be tied to the lodge at his time at the Altar of Obligation. The physical cable is replaced by a tie of love to his fellow Brothers. Outer authority is replaced by inner obligation.

A new Brother pledges his life to service to the Craft. He agrees to go to the aid of a Brother, using all his power on his behalf if within the length of his cable tow.

Remember though that the cable tow has two ends. If it binds a new Mason to the Fraternity, then by the same token it binds the Fraternity to each man in it. One obligation needs to be emphasized as much as the other. The Fraternity is under vows to its members to guide, instruct and train them for service to the Craft and humanity in general. We are all under a vow to share fellowship, friendship and charity with our fellow brethren.

Masonry rules men as beauty rules an artist, as love rules a lover. It does not drive; it draws. It exercises its' influence upon us by its' human touch and moral nobility. At the Altar we take solemn vows to follow and obey its' principles and ideals. Masonic vows are not simply empty words. They are vows in which a man pledges his life and his sacred honor.

The prophet Hosea wrote in the Book of Hosea (Chapter 11, verse 4), "I drew them with cords of a man, with bands of love".
