The Grand Lodge of Iowa was opened in Ample Form on January 29, 2024, in the Temple of King David Lodge No. 407 in Altoona, Iowa, for the purpose of conducting final Masonic Rites for Brother D. Dean Johnson, Past Grand Master. Brother Johnson passed from this world of labor on January 20, 2024, at the age of 97 years.

He was born in Sigourney, Iowa, on October 19, 1926. After graduating from Mitchellville High School in 1944, he enlisted in the Navy and served his country on the aircraft carrier USS Wasp from 1944 to 1947. Dean was united in marriage to Lorraine M. Hunsicker on July 27, 1946. They were parents of two children, Pamela and Gary. Dean was the owner-manager of Klein's Department Store in Highland Park, Des Moines, Iowa for 38 years.

Dean was an active member of King David Lodge No. 407 for 68 years. He served as Worshipful Master in 1963. He was also a member of Operative Lodge No. 308 in Polk City where he served as Worshipful Master in 1994. A student of the Ritual, he was awarded District Lecturer No. 2394 in 1965. Dean served as an officer of the Grand Lodge of Iowa, A.F.&A.M. on four separate occasions: Senior Grand Deacon (1983-1984), Senior Grand Warden (1987-1988), Deputy Grand Master (1993-1994), and Grand Master of Masons in Iowa in 1996-1997.

Brother Johnson was a member of the Des Moines York Rite Bodies, Des Moines Scottish Rite and Za-Ga-Zig Shrine. He received the Knight Commander Court of Honor (KCCH) in the Scottish Rite and was a member and Past Sovereign of Saint Bartholomew Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine. He was a member of Altoona Chapter No. 284 and Polk City Chapter No. 361, Order of Eastern Star. He was active in the Order of DeMolay where he received the Honorary Legion of Honor and was an emeritus member of the Supreme Council, International Order of DeMolay.

Dean was preceded in death by his first wife, Lorraine, and by Ardis Lanzilotta. He is survived by his children, Pamela K. Johnson and Gary L. (Sherry) Johnson, two grandchildren, five great-grandchildren, one brother, John F (Helen) Johnson, and many Masonic Brothers and friends.

Hiram, King of Tyre Wade Sheeler, Past Senior Grand Warden



King Hiram and the Cedars of Lebanon

In the Second Section of the Master Mason degree, we are introduced to Hiram, King of Tyre. Who was Hiram and what was his relationship to King Solomon?

Hiram the First was the Phoenician king of Tyre (located approximately 140 miles northwest of Jerusalem). In Phoenician, his name was Hirom ("my brother is exalted"), in Hebrew, it was Hiram, and in Arabic, it was called either Hirom or Huram. Hiram reigned from approximately 980 to 947 B.C., a reign of approximately 34 years. He succeeded his father, Abibaal. King Hiram was succeeded by his son, Baal-Eser I. King Hiram lived a life of approximately 53 years, from the approximate date of his birth in 1000 B.C. to his death in 947 B.C.

During King Hiram's reign, Tyre grew from a small satellite of Sidon into the most important of the Phoenician cities and a dominant and thriving port and commercial center in the eastern Mediterranean. Hiram engaged in extensive building projects and colonized several Mediterranean islands such as Cyprus and Sicily. He also engaged in commercial maritime endeavors.

King Hiram and King David of Israel established a long and peaceful relationship. The Israelites were a pastoral people and supplied mutton and grain in exchange for imports from the Phoenicians. After the death of King David, in approximately 970 B.C., Hiram continued his relationship with King David's son, Solomon. 1 Kings 5:1 "Now Hiram King of Tyre sent his servants to Solomon when he heard that they had anointed him king in place of his father, for Hiram always loved David."

When Solomon began construction of the First Temple, Hiram sent timbers (from the forests of Lebanon), gold and craftsman to help with the construction and assemble the furnishings. In return, Solomon gave grain and oil to Hiram to supply his household. The two kings developed a commercial trading alliance. Solomon gave Hiram twenty cities in the area of Galilee, but when King Hiram surveyed these areas, he was not pleased with them and termed them the "land of Kabul", which roughly means the "good-for-nothing land.

Through the alliance between Solomon and Hiram, both men and their kingdoms became wealthy. Solomon ensured himself supplies for the Temple. Hiram ensured himself access to the major trade routes to Egypt, Arabia, and Mesopotamia. The two kings also jointly opened a trade over the Red Sea, connecting the Israelite harbor of Ezion-Geber with a land called Ophir. Some have theorized that Ophir might actually have been the port city of Sopara near modern day Bombay, India.

The" Tomb of Hiram" (Qabr Hiram) dates from the Persian period, four to six centuries after the presumed time of King Hiram. It is six km southeast of Tyre. It has the form of a colossal limestone sarcophagus on a pedestal.

The base is fifteen feet long, ten feet high, and ten feet wide. The sarcophagus is cut from a single piece of stone. It is twelve feet long, six feet high, and eight feet wide, with a cover three feet thick. The sarcophagus has been opened on one end. Hiram's known wealth would have made h is sarcophagus a target of robbers. It is unknown rather Hiram remains actually rested here or is it simply a myth.

The Midwest Conference on Masonic Education was formed in 1949 at a gathering of interested Masons from Illinois (including Alphonse Cerza) and Iowa.

The outcome was to continue getting together by establishing its first annual meeting which was held in December 1950 in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. The organization is comprised of a loose and everchanging collection of Masonic educators from Grand Lodge jurisdictions located in twelve North Central States and the Province of Manitoba. Other participants frequently include chairmen of Masonic education committees as well as Grand Lodge officers.

The aim of the conference is to promote Masonic education, in part by providing a forum for educators to gather, freely discuss Masonic education issues, socialize, and learn from sharing experiences while building beneficial relationships.

Bloomington, Minnesota In addition, the conference initiates special projects such as collecting data on educational practices across all North American jurisdictions, as well as encouraging Masonic research and writing by individual educators.

Retired Librarian Receives Award By Bill Kreuger

Retired Assistant Librarian/Curator of the Grand Lodge of Iowa received news in early November that he is the recipient of the Candace Tangorra Metelic Award from the Midwest Open-Air Museums Coordinating Committee (MOMCC) for the best article published in Midwest Open-Air Museums Magazine for the year 2022. The article, entitled "American Fraternalism in the 19th and Early 20th Centuries," was published in Vol.43, No.2 Summer 2022 of the periodical. It was published while he was still employed by the Grand Lodge of Iowa, A.F. & A.M. Kreuger was aided by current Grand Master, Darrell Fremont, in photographing materials for the article.

Kreuger has been a member of the MOMCC, off and on, since the early 1980s and has presented at several annual and semi-annual meetings of the organization. This article was developed from a workshop he presented at the Fall 2012 Conference of the MOMCC that was held at Kirkwood Community College in Cedar Rapids. That workshop included a PowerPoint presentation of various Fraternal organizations, as well as aprons and regalia in the collection of the Grand Lodge of Iowa.

The article describes the vast resources of the Iowa Masonic Library and Museum collections. It covers Masonic, (including Prince Hall), Order of the Eastern Star, The Holy Virgin/Heroines of Jericho, Odd Fellows, Knights of Pythias, P.E.O., Z.C.B.J., C.S.P.S. (Czech Fraternal groups), Patrons of Husbandry (The Grange), Grand Army of the Republic, United Spanish War Veterans and Society of the Cincinnati. The article includes the reasons why Fraternal groups were popular during the period as well as the anti-Masonic movement that sought to disrupt the Masons and other Fraternal societies.

The award is presented annually and is named in honor of the first president of the MOMCC, Candace Tangorra Metelic. Kreuger currently serves as Program Chair for the 2024 MOMCC Fall Conference that will be held at Usher's Ferry in Cedar Rapids, Iowa in November 2024.

Nevada Mayor Brett Barker welcomed a very large crowd to the Ceremony.



Wear the Apron in Everything We Do By Tom Nash, Grand Marshal

You now stand as a just and upright Mason, and I give it you strictly in charge, ever to walk and act as such. This is our first instruction as a Mason. Perhaps one of the most overlooked parts of the Ritual. When we are in lodge, we all should be following the rules of conduct of the lodge. We should be subduing our passions and treating each other with Brotherly Love. Even in disagreement, Masons should be able to remain respectful towards each other. We all wear the Apron, We are all brothers.

When the apron comes off, when we are conducting business outside the lodge, are we still remembering the lessons of the First Degree? Many Masons are proud of the Fraternity. They wear the square and compasses on shirts, hats, jackets, car windows, tattoos, and social media. We like to think we are representing the Fraternity in a good light. But are we? Are we being rude to people, cutting them off in traffic, arguing on social media, or any other numerous things that might give Masonry a bad name? With the political season in full swing, there are many passions guiding the discourse in the country. People disagree, that is unavoidable in human nature. As Masons we are taught certain tenets and maxims that teach us to be respectful of the opinions of others, even if we disagree. There are plenty of examples of people or organizations that seek to foster such strife in the world. Masonry is not one of them.

The Grand Lodge came up with a set of guidelines for social media postings a few years ago. They are found on the Grand Lodge webpage. Here is an excerpt.

- A Mason should conduct himself with the same courtesy he would in front of the general public.
- As a Mason, he must be aware that his postings are a permanent record; therefore, his conduct may influence the world with a positive or negative opinion about him personally and about the organizations to which he belongs.
- A Mason should never use disparaging comments, profanity, etc. when posting; including, but not limited to, graphic, video, and audio recordings.
- A Mason should not post "ritual" or "tyled" information.
- Masonic pages are to be supportive of the organization and its members, promote upcoming events, discuss past events, video sharing, and discussion of times of fellowship and promotion of Masonic bodies.
- A Mason should not use social media to obtain personal advantage in promoting political, religious or business activities by targeting other Masons.
- A Mason should not use social media to contact other Grand Jurisdictions unless you are a member of that jurisdiction. Remember that all inter-jurisdictional communication is, by Masonic protocol, conducted by and between Grand Lodge offices.
- No discussion or other information regarding to an application, background, or investigation of an applicant is ever appropriate or condoned.
- There should never be discussion regarding the ballot on a candidate.
- Nothing should ever be written or discussed relative to the business of a Lodge or of any discussions/actions which have occurred behind Tyled doors.
- Information about lodge or district social activities must comply with the Grand Lodge regulations already in place for them (for example no reference to alcohol or games of chance).
- Masons should advise a brother if something he has posted is improper within the framework of our Grand Constitution, Rules and Regulations, etc.

Ultimately, your actions as a Mason online should promote the highest standards of morality and integrity. You should always be mindful of the penalties as described in the Grand Constitution relating to trial, suspension, and/or expulsion for any un-Masonic behavior. Posting a comment related to the Fraternity and then posting a disparaging comment about a social or political stance can easily be misconstrued by readers that your stance is representative of Masonry and all Masons. Remember that the public and members of the Masonic Fraternity are reading your posts online.

When we take off the apron, that is the most important time to remember the lessons of our ritual, for that is what building our spiritual temple is all about. The image we project to the non-mason does indeed have an effect on the whole Fraternity. Peace and harmony is the strength and support of all societies. Respectful discourse is more important than any social issue, for when you become disrespectful, you harm yourself, and possibly Masonry as a whole.

Remember, Live the Ritual, whether you are wearing the Apron or not.

Quarterly Update from the Library and Museum By Julia Wells

I visited with the Decorah Scottish Rite Club and gave a talk on the library. I also spoke at a few different lodge meetings in 2023 with Albert Pike being the most well attended. I am happy to come out to lodges or clubs to talk about the library. Call the Grand Lodge and talk to me about scheduling the time for me to come out to your event.

The exhibit that I hope to open this April is "Masons in Space." The process of getting artifacts is going slower than I anticipated so it might open a little later than I hoped. I am excited to show everyone the dues card I received for Buzz Aldrin from Tranquility Lodge. For those who do not know, when Buzz Aldrin and Neil Armstrong made it to the moon, Aldrin helped constitute a lodge, Tranquility No. 200, on the moon in 1969. Tranquility No. 200 is under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Texas. Some other famous Masons who have made it to space include John Glenn and Col. Leroy "Gordo" Gordon Cooper, Jr.

In late January, the state officers of Iowa DeMolay spent some time volunteering to work with me cataloging part of the museum. I had two young men doing data entry with me in my office and one taking photos upstairs. In the few hours they were able to stay, they we got 78 artifacts cataloged into the PastPerfect museum software and 209 photos taken. This saves me multiple days of work. On a day where I have limited distractions, I can usually get about 60-100 artifacts cataloged and 200 photos taken. Anyone who wants to volunteer with the library is welcome to come out. All we ask is that you can pass a background check, seeing as we have some of the rarest items in the world in our collection.

I am currently working on cataloging as well as going through the old accession records to find when items were donated into the collection. The records of when things were added into the collection span over multiple books, binders, and areas. It is interesting to see the differences in handwriting and note taking shorthand over the last 136 years.

I am very thankful for the curators I have met here in Cedar Rapids, and their connections. We recently ran into some hurdles with making sure some artifacts were labeled correctly and what others might be. Thankfully one of the curators in town knew the right person to call to help me make these distinctions. Just like the fact that I sometimes need help identifying Masonic artifacts, sometimes artifacts in the collection just slipped through and were not labeled or the label is no longer attached to the artifact.

I look forward to what the next quarter will bring, and hope to have some fun things to tell you in the next bulletin!
