A Tribute to Robert H. "Bud" Erickson

Robert H. "Bud" Erickson laid down his working tools February 18, 2021. He has completed his earthly tasks and has gone to his reward with the Grand Master of the Universe. We are all the better for having had him touch our lives in this Fraternity of Freemasonry.

Promote, Participate, and Perpetuate are key words that Grand Master Robert H. Erickson used to guide his Masonic career. The Craft elected him to the Office of Grand Master for the 2003-04 year. He challenged Iowa Masons to continue to work on membership, by attracting new men into the Fraternity, and to retain them by keeping them involved in their lodges.

Brother Erickson was born on January 17, 1941 at Des Moines. He attended schools in Des Moines graduating from Dowling High School, then Drake University. He retired from the United States Air Force/Iowa Air National Guard on February 1, 1996 after completing 33 years of service. He then became a school bus driver for the Des Moines Independent School District for seven years. He married Kristine Harlow on May 29, 1976 in Des Moines. He is survived by a daughter Renee (Chris) Schiller, and three grandchildren Andrew, Lars, and Hanna living in Golden, Colorado. He is a member of the First United Methodist Church in Des Moines. Brother Erickson received his symbolic degrees in Home Lodge No. 370 at Des Moines, which has relocated to Pleasant Hill. He was Raised on April 14, 1982 and has held nearly every office in the lodge. He was Worshipful Master in 1989 and was serving as Secretary. He was a dual member with Moingona Lodge No. 633 at Des Moines.

Brother Erickson served the Grand Lodge as Grand Tyler, 1991-92; Junior Grand Warden, 1997-98; Grand Lodge Visitors Committee, 1999; and Chairman of the Committee on Division and Reference, 2002-03. He proudly held District Lecturer Certificate No. 2968.

At the time of his passing, he was Secretary of the Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence and Chairman of the Trustees of the Grand Lodge.

Other Masonic affiliations included the York Rite Bodies in Des Moines, Des Moines Scottish Rite; Za-Ga-Zig Shrine, National Sojourners Chapter 88, Iowa Research Lodge No. 2, Des Moines Hi-Twelve Club No. 4, South Central MI-DL Club, Polk-Jasper Study Group, Red Cross of Constantine, and Auburn-Denova Chapter No. 449, Order of Eastern Star. He was awarded the DeMolay Legion of Honor in 2002.

The following are the words he used in his Grand Masters report September 17, 2004.

"A Strong Foundation Cannot Be Built on Shifting Sands." How swiftly the sands of time run and how almost imperceptible the days pass away. In this short space of one year, they are all gone, and while we think the time is ours that we should accomplish those things which were our goals, we have come, too soon, to the end.

"As this year comes to an end, there is a new begining and the reins will be handed over. The baton will be passed, and I hope the rapid pace will be maintained. We are confident that the next year will be a continued heightened enjoyment of this precious privilege we call Masonry."

The Craft has lost a true leader and servant. He will be missed but his memory will be revered in the annals of Masonry. Well done good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord

My project for this Grand Lodge year is in support of service dogs for military veterans through the Puppy Jake Foundation (PJF). PJF is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization dedicated to providing professionally trained service dogs to wounded military veterans. These dogs are trained to assist with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI), and mobility impairments. The service dogs act as a barrier (to provide a larger personal space), interrupt flashbacks, and navigate crowds for those suffering from PTSD. For mobility impairments, the service dogs turn on/off lights, open/close doors and drawers, and pickup and retrieve items as needed.

The design of my lapel pin is an oval shape with crossed hands with a dog's paw on top. The theme on the border edge is "When You Needed a Hand, I Gave You My Paw." This pin is available from all Grand Lodge officers and their ladies. All proceeds will go to the PJF. Plans are also being made to invite the PJF to Grand Lodge for a ladies program.

We will also be holding a bake sale during Grand Lodge.

Thank you to the Grand Lodge Officer Ladies who have provided much needed help and suggestions. Thank you to all in advance for your support and I'll see you in Davenport.

Rothlisberger chairs the Scholarship Selection Committee that sorted through over 260 completed applications and selected 35 applicants for interviews. Since the program began in 1970, 2,479 scholarships totaling \$3,689,900 have been awarded.



The Gentleman in the Room By David R. Ritchie, Junior Grand Warden Grand Lodge of Wisconsin



It has been said that "Being male is a matter of birth. Being a man is a matter of age. Being a gentleman is a matter of choice." Being a gentleman is as much a matter of choice as being uncivil is a matter of choice. The choice often centers around choosing self-centeredness or choosing empathy with others. Civilization is the idea of a group of people living and working together, within a common set of rules, to accomplish things for the greater good. For civilization to work we must be aware and work for something greater than ourselves. Two things that boost incivility are the ego and self -centeredness.

A classic example is the neighbor who plays his music at full volume at two in the morning. When asked to turn it down responds with, "It's my house, I have a right to listen to music as loud as I want." Granted we all have the same right to listen to music in our homes but the gentleman understands that he also has a responsibility to be a

good neighbor. The neighbor chooses a self-centered response benefiting only himself. The gentleman chooses to impose upon himself, for the benefit and comfort of his neighbors, limits on volume and time of day.

Ego is one of the other banes of civility and goes hand in hand with self-centeredness. If my ego is such that I see myself as more important than others then I will surely fail to treat others with the respect and dignity they deserve. Ego is also where so many good discussions turn to fruitless arguments. If I go into the discussion with the belief that I am better, smarter, more well informed than the other person then my ego will keep me from listening to the other side or conceding a point or even admitting that I was wrong.

In Masonry we have many "mysteries" that do not have definitive answers. As an example, "Do you wear your ring with the points in or the points out?" This question has led to some great discussions, because there is no established correct way. Each man chooses for himself. The personal reasons given for their personal choice are often informative, insightful, and many times entertaining. Yet, all it takes is one man whose ego won't allow him to accept other men's ideas. When a man makes the choice to allow his ego to rule his thoughts and actions, he by default makes a choice to move away from gentlemanly behavior. He also gains nothing from the conversation. His opinion and ideas are the same going in as coming out of the discussion. When he circumscribes the passions of the ego, and keeps them within due bounds, he probably won't have his mind changed, but he will be enriched by the other ideas, both pro and con, presented.

To a Mason meeting on the level is so important. If the gentleman chooses to view everyone in the room as his equal, his ego will be kept in due bounds as well as his sense of self. The ego tells us that to meet on the level we should talk down to others or lower ourselves to be where they are. In Masonry meeting on the level means bringing a brother and ourselves up to a common level. A gentleman seeks to raise others' abilities and self-esteem, things not found when the ego is in charge. Isn't it nice that we as individuals make the choice to come to lodge, to meet on the level, to share each other's ideas and company and then carry them out into the world?

50 Years: A Masonic Milestone By William C. Jacobson Past Grand Treasurer



Fifty years includes a total of 200 seasons of a lifetime. A fifty-year Mason can reflect at this milepost on the meaning of all his Masonic experiences.

I received my Entered Apprentice Degree in 1968. My impression of the First Degree was positive. It was given to me in a small, farmer dominated lodge in Castana, Iowa. These brothers took great pride in doing their work well. They gave me a good start in Masonry.



During the first regular lodge communication I attended after becoming a Master Mason, the lodge presented

another brother with his fifty-year pin. I wasn't aware of the significance of that event, yet it left a lasting impression on me.

The brother explained that becoming a Mason was a continuous journey of changing circumstances. He referred to his Masonic journey as one step forward and two steps back. He felt that the challenge of his Masonic journey was to find ways to integrate tradition and change.

He explained that his journey took a crooked road with many bumps and detours. Each step forward created new experiences. Two steps back represented the contemplation and reflection needed to understand what happened.

Recently, I received my fifty-year pin. My journey supports the brother's observations. The forward and backward analysis addresses the meaning of the words in Masonry.

Seeking perfection in life involves setting standards that determine what you will and won't do. The golden key in Masonry is using our working tools to develop one's character. That is displayed through words and actions that communicate who and what you are to others.

Growth involves learning the higher meanings of the words that explain Masonry. It is our words that create the images that define us.

The book of John in the Bible opens with this explanation. "In the beginning was the word, and the word was with God, and the word was God." We use words to explain who and what God is.

Emmet Fox, in his book The Sermon on the Mount, suggested seven words that describe the aspects of God. These are life, truth, love, intelligence, spirit, soul, and principle. Masonry expands on these words by using types, emblems, and allegorical figures to illustrate important life lessons.

We are all different. That is why the uses of working tools is private and secret. Private because they are best understood through individual experience. And, secret because experiences teach different things for each Mason.

My fifty-year Masonic Journey produced many changes in the way I think. I benefitted from an active involvement in the conferral of Masonic Degrees. Presenting the words used in the ritual impacts one's soul. We all learn well through observational repetition.

Life's biggest challenge is to keep oneself in equilibrium. That fifty-dollar word means learning to balance life's positive and negative experiences.

Balance helps us defer crying today. When tomorrow comes, it provides an understanding of why things happened today. Patience is the key to situational awareness.

Learning becomes wisdom through time and experience. Wisdom is an awareness of an experience without the impact of the emotion that occurs when it happened.

There have been many changes in Iowa Masonry during my fifty years. Some were effective, others not so much. Determining effectiveness is easy. Just answer a simple question. Did it work?

Many changes in my fifty years were intended to increase membership and introduce Masonry in a different context to new Masons. Increased membership has not been happening.

My most beneficial fifty-year Masonic experience was memorizing the posting lectures of the three degrees. That expectation required effort, awareness of thoughts, and a mastery of the Masonic words that have guided my life. Practice establishes a baseline that helps us all acquire the words that are necessary to become a Master Mason.

Looking back there are many things in my journey that reveal Einstein was right when he observed: "There is a difference between genius and stupidity. There are limits to genius."

Ironically, both genius and stupidity are part of any fifty-year Masonic journey. What appeared to be stupid often turned out to be genius. And what was once considered genius later turned out to be stupid.

World War II. General "Vinegar Ben" Stillwell adopted this latin phrase as his motto. "Illigitimi Non Carborundum" An accepted definition is don't let the bastards grind you down.

During my career as an educator, I acquired a latin phrase that can sum up my fifty year journey. It is "Suprese Nothes Illigitimi." It means outlive the bastards.

The greatest benefit of my fifty years has been the many great men I have met through Masonry. For me Masonry is Fraternal fellowship. I did not travel my journey alone. That is why, as an old timer, I continue to work with and through others to become a Master Mason in fact as well as in name.

Step One on Lodge Public Relations By Public Relations Committee

What should your lodge be doing to get more into the public eye? You might say "our lodge doesn't do enough for the community" or "nobody knows Freemasonry exists in our community" or "our lodge used to do so much stuff and so many people would come" and on and on.

We've all participated in these discussions during a meeting that feels too short. Short business meetings are not a bad thing, but that is for another article. We've all been there when someone announces a community event and a longtime member stands up and reminisces or even chastises the rest of the attendees that the lodge doesn't do enough anymore. Or perhaps you're moving up the officer line and trying to decide how to improve the lodge or its standing in the community. Maybe you feel the lodge does so much already that it can't do very many of them very well. We've all been there. It's overwhelming and frustrating.

We all know that a strong lodge operates like a well-oiled machine, or at least appears to operate as such. What we often lose sight of is that machines come in all sizes. The engine of your lodge doesn't need to serve a Mack Truck. Mack Trucks take a lot of resources, a lot of quality processes to get built, a lot of regular, good





maintenance, and a lot of fuel to keep it moving down the road.

Small engines, however, can be high quality too. Sure, they may not haul as big of load as other engines. You may not always hear them impose their presence, but they can do some very specific, or even unique things, and very important things, very well, very efficiently, and most importantly, very effectively!

One of the most important things to do about being in the community, or in the public eye, is that

WHATEVER YOU DO, DO IT WELL.

It can be small if that's all your lodge can muster, or if that's all your current officers can muster, or if that's all your treasury can muster. Let's look at what this meant for one Lodge one particular year.

The ingoing Master that year remembered in his youth seeing photos hanging on the wall of other lodges. The photos appeared to be of those big celebrations of Masons marching in a parade, or huge crowds gathered



to lay the cornerstone of an important public building. Some photos might have shown Communications of the Grand Lodge, or some other appendant organization.

The incoming Master also had heard over his years of experience those Past Masters mention, on numerous occasions, that the lodge used to "fill the balcony" for installations and have to rent out a hall for receptions when the Grand Master would visit. It almost felt like these elder members were rubbing it in from time to time as "something we used to do" would come up at almost every meeting. The incoming Master grew nervous about reviving the experience and glory to his lodge. It would be his reputation on the line for the future when he would talk about "his" year just like all the Past Masters before him. It would be an impossible task to build a year like that. That kind of thing required already happening motion and momentum that the lodge just simply didn't possess at that time.

But, as Epictetus said "The chief task in life is simply this: to identify and separate matters so that I can say clearly to myself which are externals, not under my control, and which have to do with the choice I actually control. Where then do I look for good and evil? Not to uncontrollable externals, but within myself to the choices that are my own."

Or more simply put

If you focus on what you can do, Do That! and do it as best you can.

It is NOT about what is outside of your control.

So, the incoming Master of that lodge that year had a lot of goals for making the existing lodge activities better. But for his installation of officers he decided to apply two goals in particular with an eye toward making a memorable image like those he had seen on the walls of lodges in his youth. The goals would be simple to execute, take very few resources, and maximize the experience for participants.



1. Get a special photo

2. Catch the attention of the public

The lodge temple happens to be located in a prominent building on the City's Square. The simple move to accomplish the two goals would be known as "The Parade."

Led by the newly installed Marshal, the parade would begin with the newly-installed officers and lodge members



lining up in grand procession - 2×2 , something all lodge members already know how to do. Then, filing down the stairs across the street, make a loop around the park. One of the lodge members also carried a hand-held speaker and an music player so the procession could be set to music. The music was festive and created a bounce in everyone's step.

The parade would pause momentarily at a prominent location in the city's square, then complete the circumambulation back to the lodge building.

The lodge got the photo. It was a triumphant celebration for the new Worshipful Master and it took less than ten minutes. The public stopped traffic to honk and take pictures. The members were proudly on display. The lodge had fun in a unique setting by deciding to.

When was the Title "Grand Master" Created? Taken from the Emessay Notes, January 2021

"Grand Master" has become, almost universally, the prestigious, highest officer title in the Masonic Fraternity worldwide.

When was it used initially? Like many of the ancient traditions and practices, it is difficult to make a positive answer to the question.

But some studies and opinions agree that the title of Grand Master for the presiding officer was first used in A.D. 926, at a General Assembly held in New York.

According to Masonic Tradition, that first General Assembly was called by Prince Edwin, the son of King Athelstan. This tradition appears in all early manuscripts, and is dated around 1390, centuries after the event, and indicates the first use of the "Grand Master" as the presiding officer.

More Ancient Than the Golden Fleece or Roman Eagle, More Honorable Than the Star and Garter Wade Sheeler, Past Senior Grand Warden



On the evening that a newly initiated brother receives the first tangible gift of our Fraternity, we hear the Worshipful Master say these words: "My brother, I present you with a lambskin or white leather apron. It is an emblem of innocence and the badge of a Mason. More ancient than the Golden Fleece or Roman Eagle, more honorable than the Star Garter ..." Have you ever wondered what these other orders are and why our white leather apron predates them?

In Greek mythology, the Golden Fleece is the fleece of the golden-woolled, winged ram, **Chrysomallos**. The fleece is a symbol of authority and kingship. It figures in the tale of the hero Jason and his band of Argonatus who set out on a quest for the fleece by order of King Pelias in order to place Jason rightfully on the throne of lolcus. Through the help of Medea, they acquire the Golden Fleece. The story was current in the time of Homer (eighth century B.C.)

The Order of the Golden Fleece was founded by Philip III (also known as Philip the Good), Duke of Burgundy and the Netherlands in January 1429 on the occasion of his marriage with Isabella, daughter of King John I of Portugal.

This Order was instituted for the protection of the Roman Catholic Church and the fleece was assumed for its emblem. Contests arose between Spain and Austria for the possession of this Order. The issue was finally settled by introducing the Order into both countries.

The Order of the Eagle was founded in 1433 by Albrecht von Habsburg, Duke of Austria, who later became the Holy Roman Emperor. The Eagle as adopted by the Romans upon their banners, signified magnanimity and fortitude or as in the ancient Sacred Writings, swiftness and courage. The Romans were not the first to display the Eagle on their banners, for under the Persians, Cyrus the Younger, had borne the Eagle upon his standards. In modern times, France, Russia and the United States have adopted the Eagle as a National military symbol.

The Order of the Black Eagle (in Prussia) was instituted in 1701 on the occasion of the coronation of the king. The Order of the Red Eagle was founded in 1734 and was later made subordinate to the Order of the Black Eagle. Both of these Orders grew out of the original symbol of the Roman Eagle.

The Order of the Star was founded in France in 1350 by John II. The name of the Order alludes to the Star of Bethlehem.

The Order of the Garter dates from 1344 when the first knights were knighted. King Edward III formally founded the Order in 1348. The Order of the Garter is the most senior order of knighthood in the British honours system. The Order is dedicated to the image and arms of St. George, the patron saint of England.

Various legends surround the origin of the Order. The most popular involves the Countess of Salisbury, whose garter is said to have slipped while she was dancing at a court ball. The surrounding courtiers are said to have snickered. The king picked the garter up and returned it to her, exclaiming "Honi soit qui mal y pense!" (Shame on him who think ill of it), the phrase which has become the motto of the Order. Another legend dates to King Richard I who was inspired in the 12th century by St. George the Martyr while fighting in the crusades to put garters around the legs of his knights which subsequently won the battles.

Membership in the Order is strictly limited and includes the Sovereign, the Prince of Wales and no more than 24 companion members. Currently Queen Elizabeth II is the head of the Order. Only the monarch can grant membership. Male members are known as "Knights Companions" and female members "Ladies Companion". Appointments are made on St. George's Day (April 23). Investitures happen on Garter Day (early June) in the throne room at Windsor Castle. Each knight is entitled to display their heraldic crest and banner in St George's Chapel (the mother church of the Order). At the investiture ceremony, a garter is placed around the left leg of the new knight. Each knight wears an elaborate mantle, hat, and collar.

In comparing all of these orders, the Golden Fleece, the Roman Eagle, The Star and Garter, Freemasonry may well claim to predate any of them. For Freemasonry has existed from time immemorial.

The position of Deputy Grand Secretary is being vacated by Darrell G. Fremont at the end of his 2021 term. The position requires a working knowledge of Microsoft Office products, especially extensive use of Word, Excel, Outlook and PowerPoint. The Deputy Grand Secretary along with the membership support duties for the Grand Secretary and the Grand Lodge office also serves as the Executive Director of the Lodge Service Committee. Duties of the Lodge Service Committee are outlined in the Code.

Laws of the Grand Lodge, Chapter 11, Committees of the Grand Lodge, Section 12. Lodge Service Committee

a. Creation and Term. There shall be a Lodge Service Committee consisting of fourteen (14) members plus an Executive Director, who shall serve as Chairman of this Committee. The fourteen (14) members will be appointed by the Grand Master for a term of one year. They shall be selected as nearly as feasible with three from each of the four geographical quadrants of the State of Iowa and two additional members from the Polk County area. Beginning with the appointments made in 2010, no member shall be appointed for more than six (6) consecutive terms. (Amended 2010)

b. Executive Director. The Executive Director shall be a full-time employee of the Grand Lodge with offices at the Grand Lodge Library and Administrative Building. He shall be appointed by the Grand Secretary subject to approval by the Grand Master and the Grand Lodge Trustees. The Grand Lodge Trustees shall set his salary.

c. Duties of the Executive Director.

- 1. To prepare and distribute Masonic educational material.
- 2. To assist subordinate lodges in setting up lodge programming.
- 3. To review and analyze membership trends.
- 4. To develop, recommend, and implement short, intermediate, and long term goals for membership retention and growth.
- 5. To be responsible for the Grand Lodge Speakers Bureau.
- 6. To schedule and arrange annual Neighborhood Meetings.
- 7. To assist the Grand Master in scheduling and arranging the Grand Master Area Meetings.
- 8. To schedule, set the agenda, and chair the Lodge Service Committee meetings.
- 9. To coordinate the various activities of the Lodge Service Committee which are conducted at the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge, including the Fellowship Banquet.
- 10. To coordinate the activities of individual members of the Lodge Service Committee in the performance of their responsibilities.
- 11. To prepare the report of the Lodge Service Committee for presentation at the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge.

d. Duties of the Committee. The duties of the Committee shall include, but not be limited to, assisting the Executive Director in conducting the various activities of the Committee: including personal visitations of lodges in their areas; Grand Master Area Meetings; Lodge Service Committee Neighborhood Meetings; the various activities of the Committee at Grand Lodge; the development and distribution of Masonic educational materials; review and analyze membership trends; recommend, develop and implement short, intermediate, and long term goals for membership retention and growth; and to provide appropriate assistance to subordinate lodges for the improvement and betterment of Freemasonry in Iowa. (*Amended 2001*)
